Sophie Stone from Rotary Club of Paramus Sunrise in New Jersey. Sophie originally

comes from Myanmar, and her husband is also a Rotarian. She gave us a brief introduction to both her club and also her country of origin, and was given a warm welcome and exchanged club flags with President Norman.



There was a birthday boy, namely PP George, who invited Rtn Peter Yeung to lead the birthday song. Acting SAA Jason then announced the Red Box takings for this week, and given the topic for the day's speaker, it was heartwarming to see once again a healthy \$7,000 raised in the name of the earthquake relief, which was the exact same amount as the previous week. In which case it was with great pride that President Norman was able to pass a cheque to the guest



speaker Kevin Chiu for \$14,000 in the name of our club as a donation towards the relief efforts.

The guest speaker then took to the stand to give us all a reality check and show exactly where and how the donations are needed. Having been there on April 28th, 3 days after the actual tragedy took place, naturally he had much to report, sharing photos and reporting on the challenges facing the relief efforts, in particular with actually getting help and supplies into the country, with



its tiny airport and limited road access. It was a somber scenario and revealed the size and scale of the operation. After the presentation, PP George thanked Kevin on behalf

of all of us before the meeting adjourned at 2pm for the group

SPOTLIGHT ON: The earthquake in Nepal



The huge 7.8 earthquake struck Nepal on April 25th, destroying buildings, including some of great historical significance and triggering avalanches in the Himalayas. To date, more than 7,500 people have died, and these numbers are expected to rise as more remote areas are accessed. Some 8 million people have been affected by the quake. According to UNICEF, 1.7 million children urgently need aid, and World Vision is working to provide aid to 100,000 people, initially helping those in the worst-affected areas of Bhaktapur, Gorkha, Kathmandu, Lalitpur, and Lamjung.

World Vision has distributed supplies that were pre-positioned in Nepal, including more than 2,000 tarps, 600 blankets, and 400 corrugated roofing sheets. The next round of distributions will depend on the arrival of relief supplies being airlifted in from Dubai. The shipments include 5,000 tarpaulins that are loaded and waiting to fly. But planes are having difficulty landing because the airport is highly congested and aftershocks continue.

Additional supplies are being airlifted from a regional warehouse and include hygiene kits,

cooking kits, mosquito nets, sleeping bags, sleeping mats, buckets, and water purification tablets.

A lack of access to toilets and clean water supply means affected residents, especially in hard-to-reach places, face higher risk in the coming weeks of waterborne diseases like cholera. And more than 1.4 million people are in need of food assistance.


"We know the clock is ticking for those impacted by the earthquake in some of the most remote areas; aid is a matter of life or death for many at this point," says Phillip Ewert, operations director for World Vision in Nepal. "Our staff — as part of the humanitarian effort — are pushing to deploy aid under extreme conditions, well aware of that urgency."

World Vision has set up 10 Child-Friendly Spaces and temporary learning centers to provide a safe space for children to play and study while their families are in transition.

"Many children lost everything they knew when the earthquake struck," says Arpanah Rongong, World Vision's child protection specialist in Nepal. Child-Friendly Spaces offer a place for children to start coming to terms with the loss they have experienced. "Young people often begin expressing their emotions through artwork, which helps them start to make sense of the devastation around them," Rongong explains.

Forty-four youth volunteers drawn from churches and other community groups participated in training to staff the Child-Friendly Spaces. Nepal is among the countries in the world that are most vulnerable to quakes

and has long ranked at the top of the list of places most vulnerable to earthquakes, according to experts.



World Vision has been in Nepal for more than a decade, preparing for the "big one" with training for communities to help reduce the risks associated with earthquakes, and pre-positioning supplies. Preparedness activities took place in the Lalitpur and Rupandehi Districts for about 65,000 people.

The aid agency has 73 projects in Nepal managed by 205 staff, for the past 10 years working with communities in Nepal and focusing on:

- · Maternal and child health
- Education
- Child protection
- Livelihoods
