Rtn RF presented a Video titled "Pathways of Promise". Through examples of World Community Service Projects around the world, the video explored different aspects of WCS programmes including information on the Information Clearing House for Donations-in-kind Network.

ENJOY

World Community Service falls within the area of responsibility allocated to the International Service Committee. What generally happens is that contact is made with a Rotary Club in another country and assistance is offered in completing jointly, a Community Service Project in that area. Usually the assistance is by way of financial aid which is controlled and monitored by the recipient Rotary Club.

Examples"--

- 1.0 Combining with a Rotary Club in India to build a "tube well" in order to improve the water supply of a village.
- 2.0 Combining with a Rotary Club in Thailand (or India) to assist with eye operations being carried out by Rotarians in remote areas.
- 3.0 Assisting a Rotary Club in Malaysia send a young person to Singapore for heart surgery (Gift of Life Programme).

Financially the cost of WCS projects need not be a burden and it is amazing how far a relatively small sum such as US\$1,000 can go.



WHAT HAPPENED LAST WEEK

- Seasons festivities and holidays took their toll last week. Our attendance of members present worked out at 43% (36 out of 83).
- Pres. Dave was looking for his "chain of office", no doubt it will be happily back in place this week. Pres. Dave opened the meeting with a special welcome back to PP Ramesh who was visiting us from Bangkok where he is spending much of his time.
- Rtn Gary then introduced our 9 visiting Rotarians and two of them introduced their wives who were attending as guests for the day.
- Banners were exchanged (3 out and 1 in from Kyoto Rakunan).
- Welcome back Rtn Walter Yuen from Manila.
- Rtn Murray told us the deadline for registration for the 1990 RI Convention in Los Angeles (via our District Office) had been extended to 15 January 1990. To date, PDG Peter had registered from our Club.
- Pres. Dave reported the Community Service Project "Rainbow People" took place last week.
 PP's Andrew, John, Pres. Dave, Rtns David Li and Tony Rackham gave our prizes. Several thousand young people attended.
- Rtn Tony Crow updated us on the efforts to "get back" the money paid in advance for the Manila trip which was postponed due to the uprising down there.
- Many thanks to Rtn Leslie and Molly for all their work in organising the Christmas function on 20 December.
- On 30 December, HK telephone numbers will change. PP Con told us all about it. For every 3 people in Hong Kong, there is 1 telephone line. In short, the new system to include area code for those numbers with 6 digits and to delete the area code for those which have 7 numbers, has been introduced as part of a project to introduce a very advanced telecom system. As of 31 December, all telephone numbers in Hong Kong will have 7 digits and with effect from 1993, should we change residence, our telephone number will go with us. PP Con advised us there will probably need to be a change in 5 years' time, to 8 digit telephone numbers to be uniform with the worldwide system at that time.
- Incidentally, we believe congratulations may be due to PP Con. We hear a whisper that in successfully restructuring himself "out of a job" at CSL, he has found himself "elevated" within HK Telephone Co. All will be revealed in the new year.
- Rtn R.F. introduced the video tape on World Community Service.

Mr Devereaux

Mr. Devereaux advised us on what was being done to meet the Technical Education and Industrial Training needs in Hong Kong.

ENJOY

The Vocational Training Council of Hong Kong has 4 Government and 18 non Government Council Members who are drawn from a cross section of the community here. Working under the council are 19 Training Boards and 7 General Committees. In all, there are over 300 people working on the Boards and Committees.

Manpower survey is a major Council responsibility. Mr. Devereaux advised this was a very difficult and sometimes hazardous exercise, but as a result of their efforts, the Council is able to prepare a report for Government and Industry generally, which forecasts manpower needs in the years ahead and shows how these needs can be met.

Another important responsibility of the Council is training and there are 12 Industrial Training Centres in Hong Kong, — all highly organised and well equipped. Instructors are now being trained overseas. Student Training also extends to the commercial sector (i.e. Banking/Insurance) and this is aimed at upgrading/retraining existing personnel.

The Council operates 8 technical Institutes which put through some 34,000 students annually.

Problems in the future are seen in the area of staff recruitment and in finding the required number of students of the right calibre with a good knowledge of English.



STORY OF THE 4-WAY TEST

By Herbert J. Taylor

Back in 1982 I was assigned, by the Creditors of the Club Aluminum Company, the task of saving the company from being closed out as a bankrupt organization. The company was a distributor of cookware and other household items. We found that the company owed its creditors over \$400,000 more than its total assets. It was bankrupt but still alive.

At that time we borrowed \$6,100 from a Chicago

bank to give us a little cash on which to operate.

While we had a good product or competitors also had fine cookwate with well-advertised brand names. Our company also had some fine people working for it, but our competitors also had the same. Our competitors were naturally in much stronger financial condition than we were

With tremendous obstacles and handicaps facing us we felt that we must develop in our organization so thing which our competitors would not have in equal amount. We decided that it should be the character, dependability and service mindedness of our personnel. We determined, first, to be very careful in the selection of our personnel and, second, to help them become better men and women as they progressed with our company

We believed that "In right there is might" and we determined to do our best to always be right. Our industry, as was true of scores of other industries, had a code of ethics -- but the code was long, almost impossible to memorize and therefore impractical. We felt that we needed a simple measuring stick of ethics which everyone in the company could quickly memorize. We also believed that the proposed test should not tell our people what they must do, but ask them questions which would make it possible for them to find out whether their proposed plans, policies, statements or actions were right or wrong.

We had looked in available literature for such a short

measuring stick of ethics but could not find a satisfactory one. One day in July, 1932, I decided to pray about the matter. That morning I leaned over my desk and asked God to give us a simple guide to help us think, speak and do that which was right. I immediately picked up a white cord and wrote out The 4-Way Test of the things we think, say or do as follows:

1. Is it the truth?

Is it fair to all concerned?

Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

placed this little test under the glass top of my desk and determined to try it out for a few days before talking to anyone else in the company about it. I had a very discouraging experience. I almost threw it into the wastepaper basket the first day when I checked every thing that passed over my desk with the first question, "Is it the truth?" I never realized before how far I often was from the truth and how many untruths appeared in our company's literature, letters and advertisin

After about sixty days of faithful constant effort on my part to live up to The 4-Way Test I was thoroughly sold on its great worth and at the same time greatly humiliated, and at times discouraged, with my own performance as president of the company. I had, however, made sufficient progress in living up to The 4-Way Test to feel qualified to talk to some of my associates about it. I discussed it with my four department heads. You may be interested in knowing the religious faith of these four men. One was a Roman Catholic, the second a Christian Scientist, the third an Orthodox Jaw and the fourth a Presbytarian.
I asked each man whetheror not there was anything

The 4-Way Test which was contrary to the doctrines and ideals of his particular faith. They all four agreed that truth, justics, friendliness and helpfulness not only with their religious ideals, but that if constantly applied in business they should result in greater success and progress. These four men agreed to use The 4. Way Test in checking proposed plans, policies, statements and advertising of the company. Later, all emplovees were asked to memorize and use The 4-Way Test in their relations with others.

The checking of advertising copy against The 4-Way Test resulted in the elimination of statements the truth of which could not be proved. All superlatives such as the words better, best, greatest and finest disappeared from our advertisements. As a result, the public gradualplaced more confidence in what we

advertisements and bought more of our products.

The constant use of The 4-Way Test caused us to change our policies covering relations with competitors. We eliminated all adverse or detrimental comments on our competitors' products from our advertisements and literature. When we found an opportunity to speak well of our competitors we did so. Thus we gained the confidence and friendship of our competitors.

The application of The 4-Way Test to our relations with our own personnel and that of our suppliers and customers helped us to win their friendship and goodwill. We have learned that the friendship and confidence of those with whom we associate is essential to permanent success in business.

Through over twenty years of sincere effort on the part of our personnel, we have been making steady progress toward reaching the ideals expressed in The 4-Way Test. We have been rewarded with a steady increase in sales, profits and earnings of our personnel From a bankrupt condition in 1932 our company within a period of twenty years had paid its debts in full, had paid its stockholders over one-million dollars in dividends and had a value of over two-million dollars, All of these rewards have come from a cash investment of only \$6,100. The 4-Way Test and some good hard working people who have faith in God and high ideals.

Intangible dividends from the use of The 4-Way Test have been even greater than the financial ones. We have enjoyed a constant increase in the goodwill, friendship and confidence of our customers, our com-petitions and the public - and what is even more valuable, a great improvement in the moral character of our own personnel.

We have found that you cannot constantly apply The 4-Way Test to all your relations with others eight hours each day in business without getting into the habit of doing it in your home, social and community life. You thus become a better father, a better friend and a better citizen.

Rtn Dr Tao Ho

Dr Tao Ho explained he was addressing two aspects of "Energy" — Macro and Micro energy. "The sun is the source of life and everything is related to it in one form or another". This is how Dr Tao Ho explained Macro energy, whereas Micro energy referred to electricity, heat, fire etc.

ENJOY

We need to conserve energy and this can be achieved by using it more effeciently. "Energy is finite" said Dr Tao Ho.

"By the year 2000 it is probable we will need 4 times as much energy as we need today and serious consequences could result if we do not take positive steps to conserve energy now."

We also need to control environmental pollution and Dr Tao Ho commented on global warming (the Greenhouse Effect); acid rain problems; noise and visual pollution and the age old argument re nuclear danger.

We were told inefficiencies in the present system in Hong Kong resulted in considerable energy wastage. There must be greater Public awareness of the problem and there must be open collaboration between Government(s) and the community at large. Education through TV, newspapers, school syllabus should be instituted.

We need better hardware such as co-generation, solar hot water collectors for housing/hospitals etc. We also need improved energy effective lighting and other energy efficient devices, Dr Tao Ho said.

Legislation should be introduced to change Building Ordinances so as to ensure energy saving measures are made compulsory. Government incentives should be offerred to Developers so as to encourage energy efficient architectural designs.

Dr Tao Ho advocated the introduction of the professional services of an "Energy Accountant" for buildings to determine where and how to save energy or to determine how to make the same amount of energy perform more efficient work.

Professor Albert Weale Policy Approaches to **Environmental Problems**

Professor Weale

Professor Albert Weale was visiting Hong Kong from U.K. and he told us what was happening, and what still needed to happen as Europe grappled with its environmentai problems.

ENJOY

Prof. Weale advised us control of the environment was intertwined with economic development. The population in Europe is now looking at environmental issues and the quality of life they enjoy. Public surveys revealed a high degrees of public interest in the environment and policy makers were feeling the pressure of this Public opinion.

"Pollution knows now boundaries". In Europe, a tremendous amount of pollution is imported and exported from countries due to the close proximity of each. Major emphasis is being placed on how to anticipate pollution and how to stop it at source.

"Another important move is towards integrated pollution control at least in the sense of integrated 'permitting'". Europe is a collection of nation states each with its own traditions, styles and ways of doing things. U.K. is very flexible on pollution, West Germany is much more regulated and Holland is working hard at getting co-ordination, on environmental problems, between the various Governmental Departments.

Co-ordination between Governments of different countries is very important when dealing with pollution issues. "Ways must be found to integrate in order to produce a coherent whole" said Professor Weale. Much needs to be done on an international inter-government scale. "The world community has to share out responsibilities in a fair way".

Environmental control is a very challenging and urgent task now facing all Governments today.

Most of the time when we talk about P.P. Bill Nichol of our club, our younger members have no knowledge about this dedicated Rotarian.




Bill is now enjoying retirement life with his wife, Moira in Richmond, Canada. He is really "Johnnie Walker" - still going strong.



PP Con Conway

PP Con told us each one of us is probably recorded on 10 different data bases in Hong Kong all of which have varying particulars and the concern is that in view of modern day telecommunication technology, these could all be merged in about 10 seconds.

ENJOY

Concern about the misuse of Data Base Information was expressed to Government some 17 years ago when it was considered desirable for a Data Protection Law to be introduced. It costs in the region of HK\$2 million to bring in a new major law and the Government were reluctant to proceed. Then came June 4 1989 and on June 6th 1989 it was decided such a law will be introduced and a committee to advise on this has been established.

The intention of the law will be to ensure data is obtained legally and fairly and that it must be used for the purpose intended. Information must not be given to a third party without express permission and furthermore the data must not be retained after its purpose has been satisfied.

The Law would be intended to apply to the operations of Government, Public Utilities, Credit Card Operators, Credit Bureaux, Insurance Companies etc and it is not intended for it to extend to individuals or business generally.

In answer to a question as to what would happen to the proposed Law after 1997, PP Con pointed out the China had signed an International Agreement which in effect gave the undertaking that Laws in force in Hong Kong as at handover date would continue for 50 years beyond 1997. More importantly the historical records will show that since 1949. China has honoured all International Agreements signed by them without exception.

ROTARY VILLAGE CORPS - By PP Harold Lee

The Rotary Village Corps was initiated by past R.I. President Mat Caparas for a 3-year pilot period. The programme has been so successful, the R.I. board has now confirmed RVC as an official programme for Rotary International.

RVC is a non-political and non-sectarian body sponsored by Rotary clubs. Its members are non-Rotarians, with men and women membership.

The goals of RVC programme are:

- To encourage people to mobilize in self-help activities in order to improve their own community and quality of life;
- To help people develope their abilities and talents to the fullest while preserving their own culture and community;
- 3. To recognise the dignity and value of all occupations.

tt undertakes at least two projects each year, one serving the community and the other, an educational project.

HOW CAN WE START A RVC?

RVC can be started anywhere in the world, from developed nations to developing countries, such as slum area in the U.S.A., drought stricken farming village in Mexico, depressed manufacturing centre in France, a community in Kenya without health care, also village in India lacking drainage and clear water.

The RVC programme is designed for urban areas as well as rural ones, the R.I. board has approved the use of the alternative names, such as ROTARY COMMUNITY CORPS AND ROTARY NEIGHBOURHOOD CORPS for areas in which the term "VILLAGE" might not be appropriate.

At present, there are 2,329 RVC in more than 34 countries, ranging from Zambia to U.S.A. The programme has achieved its greatest popularity in India and the Philippines.

Let us try to organize at least one Rotary Village Corps in our district by please ask our district governor for more detailed information if our Board is interested.



"Our job in public Relations is to bring perceptions in line with reality. The editorial components of any communications plan are crucial in bringing those perceptions into reality. But it has to be excellent and it has to meet its objectives. A superior communications plan will make making money easier."

ENJOY

Mr. Nyland explained there are three main communications tools for all businesses. These are the corporate brochure, annual reports and corporate video's. "Corporate tools win and lose business" said Mr. Nyland. "99.9% of Chief Executive can't write, but 99.9% of them want to write their corporate brochures. Communications is a skill and it takes a professional to do it right. If a corporate brochure is not written well it creates an irreversible negative effect" he said.

Mr. Nyland said annual reports should similarly be written with editorial polish. "It has to broaden itself from a financial document to one that enhances the corporate image." Corporate video's must be a tight representative of what the company stands for.

Mr. Nyland encouraged the consultation of an expert in order to get an objective opinion on how good a company's communications tools are. He stressed communication tools don't have to be expensive and he gave us examples of how to cut down spending when working on a tight budget.

WORLD UNDERSTANDING MONTH

The Object of Rotary calls for "the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace, "a mission that assumes special prominence in February, World Understanding Month. Rotary offers many ways to cut through the often artificial barriers that separate people. Such programs as Group Study Exchange, Youth Exchange, and Friendship Exchange bring together people from different cultures and heip them to see how minor their differences really are. The Rotary Foundation Scholarship program, in which students study in a country other than their own, also facilitates this kind of cross-cultural understanding.

International Service projects play an important role in Rotary's work for world understanding. Destitute people have little energy or inclination to seek peace. By improving the standard of living in developing nations, in urban slums, and in depressed rural areas, Rotary clubs help to create an environment that will inspire all people to work for the preservation of the planet.

Vocational Service, with its emphasis on promoting ethical behavior in business and professional life, can also make an impace on international relations. If the more than one million Rotarians worldwide take the lead and set a high standard of ethical behavior that cuts across national boundaries, some conflicts that arise from economic and trade disagreements may be lessened.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL - CHANGES IN MANAGEMENT STRUCTURE

On 31 October, the R.I. Board ordered a management reorganization at the Central Office of the R.I. Secretariat. It approved a streamlined structure and directed President Hugh M. Archer to carry it through immediately.

As part of this reorganization, the characteristics and responsibilities of the office of general secretary were redefined, and Philip H. Lindsey, general secretary since 1986, was removed from that office. Further measures included eliminating the positions of the four associate secretaries and the international meetings division manager, whose duties will be absorbed by existing staff, and rearranging other subordinate positions.


A special committee of the Board has already begun a search for a new general secretary, with the expectation of filling the post by 1 March 1990. A newly created position for a high-level administrator to assist the general secretary should also be filled by that date.

These changes come as a result of a study by an ad hoc committee of current and past R.I. officers to assess Secretariat operations. Their report concluded that R.I.'s management structure was top-heavy, and this impeded the organization's efficiency and increased expenses.

Further budget deficits in recent years have caused a serious drain on R.I. reserves, which dropped by more than US\$30 million in the past three years. 9The Rotary Foundation remains in solid financial shape, with assets of US\$302 million.) Although the dues increase that goes into effect 1 January will be helpful, it alone will not return the reserves to their appropriate level of one year's operating expenses.

Several causes have been cited for recent budget deficits, including costs incurred in the move to the new headquarters building; unexpected costs of a new computer system; and to a lesser extent, an increase in R.I. program costs.

Despite these problems, President Archer is confident that the realignment will help Rotary become stronger and more efficient. "The prospects are excellent that this Rotary year will end up on the bright side," he said. "By 1 March 1990, we expect to have installed a new general secretary who will work with our fine Secretarial staff to operate Rotary international in a responsible, business like fashion."



Consul General South Africa Subject: Changes in South Africa



ROTARY!

Mr Botha

"Most people expected changes in South Africa under the leadership of President de Klerk, but no one expected such dramatic and immediate change" said Mr. Botha in his address to us. "Furthermore, President de Klerk has made it clear there will be no going back".

ENJOY

The main measures announced by Mr. de Klerk were: To release Mr. Mandela; to lift the 30 year ban on the African National Congress and the communist party; freeing of political prisoners; lifting emergency media censorship; to impose a moratorium on hangings; lifting restrictions on antiapartheid organisations

The Chinese saying for the week in Tung Feng last week was "After making a mistake, one should not avoid rectifying it". Mistakes had been made in South Africa in the past and the rectification process has now begun.

Quite apart from the apartheid issue there is the underlying and possibly even more serious issue of the inter tribal differences which exist. There are 11 Tribes in South Africa, each with their own traditional ties and whereas urbanisation may have diluted some tribal links, it is probable voting/decision making in the future could be taken on a tribal basis rather than on the basis of individual preference and this could provide serious problems.

Mr. Botha felt recent changes within eastern Europe and more particularly the Soviet Union have resulted in the message being sent out to various "liberation" groups within South Africa, that funding will cease and hence previously reluctant groups may now be more prepared to venture towards the negotiating table.

Mr. Botha said economic sanctions against South Africa were not logical and the lifting of sanctions will contribute towards a greater environment.

Even though a most major and positive step has now been taken, Mr. Botha said the way ahead is not going to be an easy process. Many grudges of the past have to be addressed and buried.



Dr. Yu Wing-Ying Industrial Liaison Officer City Polytechnic of Hong Kong

Dr. Yu spoke to us on the need to communicate for a better Hong Kong. "When the public, private, academic sectors are working hand-in-hand, united in heart and mind, and sharing the same concerns, we will go much further to achieve a better Hong Kong" Dr. Yu said. "As a physicist, I have learned the whole does not always equal the sum of the parts. If there is dissent, there will be less but if there is synergy among the three sectors, we will achieve much more".

There is an urgent need for Hong Kong to develop an indigenous capability in science and technology. "If Hong Kong does not make the necessary technological upgrading, we will not be able to keep up with our competitors" Dr. Yu said.

Science and technology are an integral part of culture. Excellence in science is a source of pride and provides a cultural focus which is conducive to promoting a sense of identity and belonging.

Dr. Yu advised us how City Polytechnic were addressing the challenges which lie ahead. He spoke of the staff exchange scheme between City Polytechnic, private sector companies and public sector agencies, "but it takes two to tango" said Dr. Yu, "we have taken the all important first step, in that the City Polytechnic will front-load the programme, but our partner institutions and companies must share the same objectives and have a similar corporate commitment".

The Role of Statutory Corporations in Hong Kong

World-wide, the process of Government is changing. Apart from the startling political events in Eastern Europe and Russia, even democratic western nations are recognising the need for economic reform.

Public sector spending is coming under increasing pressure as economic factors begin to predominate in the political arena. Global economics has meant that nations now "compete" in a world market to provide their own people with an improving quality of life. This trend is affecting every nation, particularly as mass communications and improved educational opportunities have heightened the awareness and aspirations of the populace.

Governments and institutional organisations are under increasing pressure to improve efficiency, effectiveness, reduce the financial burden on the nation, provide a better quality of service to and life for the populace at lower cost. Thus the background in which we operate is changing rapidly. The turbulent 90's are upon us.

In Hong Kong, one of the most important elements of recent initiatives is the move towards separating a number of clearly defined activities from Government, and allowing them to operate with a degree of autonomy - particular in a financial sense. This "Corporatisation" process has the advantage of allowing the flexibility to act promptly and efficiently to meet customer needs, but ensure ownership still remains in the public domain.

Mr. Quick said the corporatisation of KCR had been a success. There were lessons to be learned however and he touched on a number of areas in KCR's involvement with Government where he felt experience has shown where we can learn from KCR and apply this to the newer corporations.

The most important element is the public, and customers served by the Statutory Corporations. Mechanisms must be found to bring their needs and views into focus.

New Public Corporations in Hong Kong will need to develop their own relationship with the public - but they should not lose sight of the main issue - improved quality of service at economic cost.

HELP SOUGHT TO ASSIST THE MENTALLY RETARDED IN HONG KONG

"According to general statistics there are estimated to be between 2% to 3% mentally handicapped people in a country or city. In other words there are 120,000 to 180,000 M.R. people in Hong Kong of which 6,000 are severely handicapped. Physically they are adults but intellectually they are profoundly retarded".

We were told the two main causes of Mental Retardation were by inheritance (i.e. Downs Syndrome) and by accident (i.e. accident causing brain damage). "There is a serious shortfall of M.R. services in Hong Kong" said Mr. Lee. We

were told of the work now being undertaken by the Lutheran Church of Hong Kong to assist in addressing this problem with the construction of a Social Service Complex next to the Kwai Hing MTR Station.

The Complex will be a 4-storey building (the site covers around 993 sq. metres) and after its completion in June this year it will provide a Hostel and Day Activity Centre for Mentally Handicapped Adults. It will also provide a Day Nursery Service (including education) for 100 small children aged 2 to 6.

The total cost of the project is HK\$10 million. This is a daunting figure to have to raise and we were told of the tremendous fund raising efforts which have been made by the Church. The result as of now is that a total sum of HK\$9 million has been secured, leaving the venture short of target by HK\$1 million.

"We do understand it is basically our responsibility and initiative to raise the funds. However we also realise we can hardly achieve such a large amount as an additional HK\$1 million by our own limited efforts and having raised HK\$9 million already we are now seeking the support of organisations such as Rotary who are concerned about the welfare of needy people."

Soviet delegation visits R.I.

A Soviet delegation recently met R.I. President Hugh Archer to discuss formation of a business leaders' club in their city, based on the principles and operation of Rotary.

Three citizens from the Siberian city of Irkuish visited the R.I. Central Office in Evanston, Illinois, U.S.A., where discussions were held.

The delegation comprised Anatoly Kotsar, vice-mayor of the City of Irkutsk and in charge of foreign trade for the city; Viacheslav Pimmannov, director of Unity Enterprises for Wine and Soft Drinks, and Ludmitla Kurbatova, an associate professor of English and a member of the executive committee of the city council.

District 345 Public Relations

After several meetings of the District PR Committee it was decided that, if the Rotary movement were really serious about trying to obtain a wider knowledge and understanding in the community about Rotary, then it would be practical to hire either an individual or a firm to do some pro-active media relations work with a view to achieving this objective.

"What has the business-financial press done for you, the businessmen and entrepreneurs of Asia?"

Two decades ago, there was no sense of community, no cross-border consciousness among the businessmen of Asia.

In the decade of the seventies and the eighties, a catalytic role was played by principally five regional publications. These were Asian Business & Industry, the Far Eastern Economic Review, the Asian Wall Street Journal, Asian Finance and Insight, now sadly defunct. These publications worked to bring about a sense of community and consciousness among Asia's businessmen.

They gave Hong Kong businessmen an audience of over 200,000 spread over the entire Pacific rim of Asia. Today, businessmen take much of this for granted.

The external implication of this significant flow of information, was no less important than the grassroots work these publications did in focussing attention on the individual entrepreneur and the important manager in this region.

Lenders in New York or London looking for good corporate credit risks did not have to indulge in crystal ball gazing or consult the local soothsayer. We had provided them, through our publications. The other two reasons you are quite familiar with.

One was the continued growth of GNP in the countries of this region, and, two, the relative political stability.

"We have built the bridges between the successful, ventursome people in this region. We have placed your name card on the desks of key investors and decision-makers in far away countries with more frequency than you would have ever noticed." Ms Howley said.

ROTARY INFORMATION

PEACE FORUM. The Rotary Peace Forum is a three-year pilot program launched by The Rotary Foundation in 1987 to help Rotarians and the public learn more about the causes of conflicts, and to encourage peace-related activities on the local, national, and international levels. Peace Forums, held in cities around the world, focus on the causes of conflicts, explore ways to improve the attitudes and conditions that fuel them, and emphasize the unique perspectives and activities of Rotary that can promoto peace.

Since the program began, six Peace Forums have been held in cities on six different continents with a total participation of 3,150 people from 80 countries. The "ideas for action" generated from the forums have prompted a number of club and district peace initiatives worldwide and revitalized inter-country committees.

The first Peace Forum of the 1988-89 year, held in September in Nice, France, was the largest to date, with more than 700 participants from 21 countries. United Nations official Prince Sadruddin Aga Khan told attendees that there must be a common language for peace among the diverse nationalities, cultures, and religions of the Mediterranean region.

In November, a Peace Forum was held in Hiroshima, the Japanese city devastated by an atomic bomb in 1945 and since transformed into a world-renowned center for activities that promote peace. The two-day program was designed to leave the 660 participants from 30 countries with both an emotional and intellectual understanding of the lessons of Hiroshima and the importance of preventing war.

Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire, was the site of a Peace Forum in March 1989. Some 250 Rotarians, policymakers, and international experts from 26 countries explored solutions to the economic problems that hamper development and peace in Africa. As a result, the United Nations Deputy High Commissioner on Refugees met with R.I. President Royce Abbey to discuss ways that the U.N. and Rotary International can work together to alieviate the plight of African refugees.

The fourth Peace Forum of the year was held in May, in Melbourne, Victoria, Australia. It focused on peace education, a new academic discipline that aims to help youth and adults to better understand the roots of conflict and develop skills for resolving serious differences without violence. The Melbourne forum provided Rotarians with new ideas and resources for sponsoring peace education activities in their communities.

Today we are to be addressed by Miss Joanne Hayes who is a Rotary Peace Scholar now in Hong Kong.

Joanne Hayes is one of a group of 6 persons presently in Hong Kong under the auspices of Rotary International's Rotary Peace Movement. We reported on the Peace Forum in last week's Tung Feng. The six Peace Scholars now in Hong Kong range in age from mid twenties to mid forties. They come from Australia, UK, Argentina, India, USA and South Africa. Their project is to research peace ideals and they are here to study Hong Kong now and its lead up to 1997.

Joanne advised us the team had never met each other before coming to Hong Kong and she said the experience of working together in a small group like this, with each person being from totally different ethnic and cultural backgrounds, was inspirational and the most wonderful experience.

The areas analysed by the team as being the six main areas for study in Hong Kong are:

- 1.0 Sino British relationship during the past 10 years
- 2.0 Basic Law
- 3.0 Cultural aspect of Chinese Hongkongers as they approach 1997
- 4.0 Immigration/Emmigration
- 5.0 Role of Pressure and Special Interest Groups
- 6.0 The role of Minority Cultural Groups in Hong Kong

Each aspect is being studied by a team member. In a few months, they are required by RI to report their findings and their report is to be published in Hong Kong.

Joanne was a delight to listen to and hopefully we will be able to hear from her again once the team has completed their report. In fact, some of our members were heard to comment, it would be excellent to hear from all six scholars if this could be arranged during a meeting later this year.

"An announcement of public interest can be intrisically interesting, while one that is in the public interest may be extremely boring but, like medicine, necessary to swallow for one's own good." said Mr Moss.

How do you make medicine palatable? It's a question with which Mr Moss's department have grappled for many years.

It is also a question to which advertising, in its commonly accepted form, does not necessarily provide the simple, fast and effective solution.

Because the objective is not to sell products but to bring about a change often a slow, gradually evolved change - in human behaviour.

"Nobody, after seeing one of our APIs, feels impelled to rush out and collect refuse in order to experience the thrill of dumping it in the bin. Nobody surrenders to an irrepressible urge to take the family out on to the pavements in order to teach them the rules of the road.

These messages have to work on areas of the brain different from those in which self gratification, status symbolism and other ego enhancing impulses can be aroused.'

"All forms of advertising are challenging. But some are more challenging than others.

When it comes to matters of life and death, as is the case with road safety. fire prevention, discouragement of drug abuse and many others, the way in which you communicate will differ radically from the way in which other messages are couched.

The Broadcasting Authority recognizes this distinction by allotting separate time for APIs outside the permitted limits of commercial advertising. And not only because we get our airtime free while other clients have to pay for theirs. It also has a lot to do with the fact that an API is recognized as being an

The Club Bulletin should be a credit to the club and to Rotary International and the materials in the bulletin should be in keeping with the dignity of Rotary. This does not mean that the

Club Bulletin should not be interesting. It must be presented in a way that is readable and that it should contain information which can be of interest to the members and for that matter visitors.

There are a variety of sources where bulletin editor can obtain material, from weekly meeting, from board and committee meetings, from program chairman, from R.I. and D.G.'s newsletters, from Rotary magazines and from members themselves.

Our founder President PDG John Yuen chose the name "Tung Feng" for our Club Bulletin in the year of our club's charter 1954. In those days our club's territorial limit lay East of Arsenal Street. The name of "Tung Feng" as you all know means "East Wind", and reflects our club's location of East of HongKong Island. The portrait on the front of the bulletin is Chu Koh-Liang also known as Kung Ming. He was the most noted military strategist in the period of 3 Kingdom about 2,000 years ago. In a famous battle against his opponent Tso-Tsao, the warlord of the kingdom of Wei, Kung Ming, also an astrologer, forecasted the blowing of a strong east wind on a certain day set fire to Tso-Tsao's fleet of warships and won a major battle.

The present picture of Kung Ming and the two Chinese characters for east wind differs from the original. The changes were made in 1984 during our club's 30th anniversary by Uncle John. The new portrait of Kung Ming was supplied by Rtn Anthony Tsui through the courtesy of the historical archives of the University of HongKong. The Chinese character was replaced by the caligraphy of first Emperor of Tung Dynasty. This caligraphy was obtained by Uncle John through the help of his friend Mr. K. C. Tang, a well-known caligrapher in Taiwan.

I hope you will now read the Club Bulletin with renewed interest.

This is a wonderful opportunity for young people to advance their knowledge overseas in a chosen area of endeavour under the auspices of Rotary. No pressure is placed on the Scholars to sit exams. Rather, they are expected to be ambassadors of goodwill from their home countries and they are required to report their activities to Rotary Foundation Headquarters during the year.

According to the Rules of the Scholarship, Application must be made through a Rotary Club of our District and endorsed by our District. We are being asked to encourage members to recommend worthy candidates. However, a Rotarian, A Rotarian's family member or an employee of a Club, District or other Rotary entity is not eligible for the Scholarship.

OUR DISTRICT CONFERENCE 6-8 APRIL 1990

There are 1,460 Rotarians in our Rotary International District 345 (Hong Kong and Macau) and 328 of them registered for this the 30th Conference in our District.

President Dave Chang led the Hong Kong Island East delegation of 11: Pres. Dave; Pres Elect YK Cheng; PP's Warren Wilson, Andrew Chen; John Kwok; Rtns. Tajwar Shadikhan; Leslie Soltay; Dick Lidster; Henry Chan; Wing Eng and Murray Macdonald.

A notable absentee was PDG Peter Hall. This was the first District Conference PDG Peter has missed. PDG Peter was absent with good cause; he was carrying out his duties as the Special Representative of Rotary International President, Hugh Archer, at the Rotary Conference being held the same weekend in Taiwan.

R.1. President Hugh Archer's Special Representative at our Conference was PDG Dato James Peter Chin from District 330 (Singapore, Malaysia and Brunei-Darasalam). It is interesting to note that PDG's younger brother, Dr Philbert Chin is also a PDG in District 330. Two very fine Rotary leaders in Asia.

PDG Peter Chin gave an inspiring opening address on Friday evening. He is an excellent speaker, totally devoted to Rotary and its ideals and he set the tone for what was to become a very worthwhile, enjoyable and educational two days ahead. He conveyed the greetings of R.I. President Hugh, a man who determined at the beginning of his term of office that this year was to be a year for Rotarians to enjoy Rotary and one of the major tasks he has accomplished in a relatively short time, has been to restructure the R.I. operations in Evanston so as to improve its efficiency; bring it into the black instead of being continually in the red, and gearing it to carry R.I. towards the 21st Century.

The welcome dinner on Friday night was a time to let hair down a little. This was aided by a beer drinking contest at the beginning of dinner! The only problem was there were so many participants, heats had to be held and by the time the finals came around, many of those who participated, possibly wished they hadn't, particularly when the ice cold glasses of Carlsberg beer were placed in front of them! but more was to come in the form of Karaoke. All good fun, but fellows, if our singing of "happy birthday" at our own regular meetings has some of us a little 'worried' at times, you should have been there on Friday night where a 'captive' audience had little option but to listen to some singing which at its best could be described as "Oh dear what a mistake"! But as so often happens, out of the blue sprang one or two very good and entertaining singers. A happy night was had by all including those who called it a day when Karaoke started and politely excused themselves to pay a visit to the bathroom and, wisely some might say, kept on walking to the lifts!

The Saturday morning session started with a Keynote Speech from PP Sonny Sales (HK Club) who was this year elected Chairman of the Commonwealth Games Federation. Then it was into the business of Rotary with business discussion sessions on Rotary Foundation, Youth Service, Enjoying Rotary, World Community Service and New Members/New Clubs.

Two resolutions were proposed at the wind up Business Session that day. One was to treat Youth Service as a separate avenue of Service. It was agreed that as the next RI Council on Legislation is not to be held until 1992, this resolution should be deferred until our next District Conference. (Ed. is aware of at least one Club in Asia which already treats Youth Service and Community Service as two separate avenues of service — RC of Singapore).

The second resolution which was passed refers to the Directors of RI the thought that in view of the success of Polio Plus, perhaps R.I's attention should start focussing on the eradication of "Hepatitis B". We were told approximately 10-15% of the population in Hong Kong are either afflicted with the virus or they are carriers. In China this percentage may be as high as 20% and in Africa from 25-30% of the population were infected. We were told immunisation of babies

The general feeling seems to be that RI having successfully brought the elimination of Polio into a reality as of 2005, were more likely to be channelling the next major International effort into keeping the planet 'green'. Time will tell but the resolution re 'Hepatitis B' will go forward for consideration.

The Gala Dinner was a grand occasion, good food, acceptable wine and excellent fellowship. District Awards were announced and we were joint winners for Vocational Service and Bulletin. Congratulations also to Tajwar Shadikhan who won the District Golf Tournament and therefore became the first recipient of the 'Governors Cup'.

Sunday morning saw the wrap up of the Conference. Reports on the various discussion sessions held the day before were presented. We also heard from the District Rotaractors; Interactors; Holly Houston who has addressed our Club twice during the past 10 months. District Governor Joseph Lee advised us two new Rotary Clubs were in the pipeline (Tsuen Mun and Taipo). Then came the usual farewell speeches and thank you's and before we knew it, the Conference was over.

Those of us who attended gained much from it.

ROTARY'S 50'TH ANNIVERSARY IN HONG KONG/MACAU MAY 11TH

To commemorate this occasion, a Ball is to be held at the Convention Centre on Friday, May 11th, 1990.

To provide added meaning to the event, our District 345 has decided to adopt (as a District Project), the Rotary Club of Hong Kong's project to support the establishment of a Hospice for the terminally ill in Hong Kong. It is hoped this will bring all Rotarians in the District together by contributing to a joint and very worthwhile project.

To this end, a proportion of the Ball Ticket Cost of \$475 per person will be donated to the "Hospice Project". This money will be added to that already collected by Rotary Club of Hong Kong and a cheque will be presented to Lady Wilson during the course of the evening. (Lady Wilson is the Patron of the Hospice.) She and the Governor will be attending the Ball as guests of Rotary.

HISTORY

It has long been recognised that Hong Kong is lacking very badly in Hospice care. The terminally ill patient and the family need special care and support so that the patient can be helped to live fully and die peacefully.

In July 1985, a group of Professional care givers started to meet regularly with a view to promote Hospice care in Hong Kong. One year later, a Society for the Promotion of Hospice care was registered as a non-profit organisation.

Funds to build a Hospice have been solicited and enough has now been collected to enable construction to commence. Rotary District 345 contribution will finance the lower ground floor area.





INTERNATIONAL NEWS

A lot of interest was shown by Rotarians in D345 on the PolioPlus grant approved by Rotary Foundation trustees for People's Republic of China last April (See Tung Feng of Feb 7th 1990). It has not been publicly announced for reasons known to all of us. Despite the lack of an announcement, however the project is moving ahead under the auspices of The World Bank. An engineering firm in The Netherlands has been awarded a contract to proceed with preparations for the plant to be built in Kunming. At this point, we do not know exactly when actual ground breaking will take place or when construction project is likely to be completed. The World Bank halted its action on the project for a time last year so there will undoubtedly be some delay in achieving what was intended to be the final completion date. As indicated previously the US\$15 million grant will move through The World Bank, not directly to PRC. The US\$899,000 is for the training of PRC health workers is channeled through UNICEF.

1991-92 R.I. PRESIDENT-NOMINEE IS RAJENDRA K. SABOO (INDIA)

Following the procedure prescribed by R.I. by-laws. President Hugh M. Archer has declared Past R.I. Director Rajendra K. Saboo to be the President-Nominee of R.I. for 1991-92. Past Director Saboo, who was selected by the nominating committee which met in September 1989, will be formally elected at the 1990 Convention in Portland, Oregon, U.S.A., and take office on 1 July 1991.

A prior announcement that an additional candidate had been endorsed was later found to be in error. Upon inspection, it was determined by the R.I. Board that an insufficient number of valid endorsements had been received. Accordingly, there will be no ballot by mail of clubs on this matter.

FIRST PROVISIONAL ROTARY CLUB ESTABLISHED IN SOVIET UNION — By R.I. Secretary General

Rotary International has become the first service club association to establish a club in the U.S.S.R. In a meeting on 24 March with Deputy Minister of Soviet Foreign Affairs, Vladimir Petrovsky, we received assurances from the Soviet government that have made possible the formation of a provisional Rotary club in Moscow.

What type of assurances? Before R.I. could proceed with extension efforts in the Soviet Union, it was necessary to guarantee that Rotary clubs would be able to hold free and open meetings and select members without surveillance or government restriction. Club must be allowed to maintain and promote contact with Rotary clubs in other countries and contribute financially to Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation. They also must be free to initiate service projects.

The Moscow club, which has about 25 members, has been meeting informally for the past six months awaiting an agreement between R.I. and the Soviet government. When I informed them that they were going to be the 'father club' of Rotary in the Soviet Union, you would have thought I had handed each of them a diamong studded crown. They were overjoyed.

This historic event makes the Soviet Union the 168th and geographically the largest Rotary country. There has been marked interest in Rotary in other Soviet cities and I expect that provisional clubs will soon be formed in Kiev, Leningrad, and Irkutsk (in Siberia) as well as in the republics of Estonia and Latvia. I'd have to say my trip was a great success.

Rather, they are expected to be ambassadors of goodwill from their home countries and thy are required to report their activities to Rotary Foundation Headquarters during the year.

According to the Rules of Scholarship, Application must be made through a Rotary Club of our District and endorsed by our District. We are being asked to encourage members to recommend worthy candidates. However, a Rotarian, A Rotarian's family member of an employee of a Club, District or other Rotary entity is not eligible for the Scholarship.





GSE PROGRAM CELEBRATES 25 YEARS OF INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

In 1965, 204 enthusiastic young business and professional men were selected to be the first partipants in Rotary's exciting new Group Study Exchange Program. Representing 26 countries on six continents, these 34 teams were paired for two-months tours of their exchange countries, where they would "make use of their background and new experiences to advance international understanding."

Stephen Gossen, a member of one of those first GSE teams from Louisiana, U.S.A., called it "an experience money couldn't buy," while his teammate Jacob Landry said that as a result of their visit to New Zealand and the Fiji Islands "the entire team will return to the U.S. as better people."

This year, the GSE program celebrates 25 years of promoting people to people — the diplomacy and the sharing of cross-cultural professional viewpoints. For the thousands of participants and their Rotarian team leaders, this experience has contributed greatly to their personal and professional growth.

Like Rotary itself, the program has grown and changed over the years. Its original guidelines limiting eligibility to men between the ages of 22 and 30 have been amended several times, so that the program now is open to both men and women, age 25 to 35. Each tour now runs four to six weeks. The number of annual exchanges has grown more than tenfold, from 34 teams in 1965-66 to 358 in 1989-90. And the program has also expanded its international scope by sponsoring exchanges with non-Rotary countries.

But while all these changes have been taking place, the programs' original mission to promote good will and understanding has remained firmly in place. And the reactions of GSE participants have not changed significantly over the years either. Reporting on her 1988 exchange visit to New Mexico, U.S.A. GSE team member Temdueng Aunsakul from Thailand said: "I will bring my hometown new ideas, new skills, as a guideline for improving myself and my work... This trip will be in my memory forever."

Human Resource Management in Hong Kong

ROTARY!

Ms. Peta McAuley

Three essentials for Hong Kong's economic survival into the 21st Century were outlined by Peta McAuley. They are:

ENJOY

- 1.0 We must develop further the ideals of Human Resource Management
- We must enhance education in Management Development Skills 2.0
- Companies must make explicit long term plans for Hong Kong to show those who will be here in the latter part of this decade, there is a future.

Ms. McAuley said that Human Resource Managers (Personnel Managers) had not held high ranking importance in Hong Kong companies in the past mainly because there was an abundant supply of cheap labour available to ensure any task was completed (no matter how many people it look to complete it). However in recent years there have been dramatic changes and these changes can largely be attributed to:

- Closing of the Border to Immigrants from China (1980/81). This created a 1.0 labour shortage and it has taken nearly 10 years for the full effects of this to emerge.
- 2.0 Brain Drain.

These two factors together have led to salary inflation. It is now an "employees market" -- employees are calling the shots. Management of Human Resources thus becomes a top priority in many areas, but there is an urgent need for it to develop further. Human Resources affect profitability of companies and hence the greater emphasis now being placed in the Human Resource area, but it is essential professional systems are introduced to manage Human Resources effectively.

Ms. McAuley isolated Productivity and lack of general Management Development (to offset the Brain Drain) as two problem areas still to be addressed by many companies in Hong Kong today. Despite long working hours, actual Productivity per capita in Hong Kong does not rate highly when compared with other countries in Europe/U.S.A. and indeed in Asia. The long term answer lies in the area of Primary, Secondary and Tertiary education levels where management development training methods should be introduced. Ms. McAuley sees a desperate need to ensure motivation and commitment of those who stay here.

"Hong Kong Managers are more traditional than U.K. Managers. They are too conventional and less open to new ideas" said Ms. McAuley. "The challenge for Hong Kong is to focus peoples' attention on Hong Kong and what we can do for Hong Kong now and in the future to ensure economic success" she said.

Ms. Sheilah Hamilton

Subject: Forensic Science

Sheilah Hamilton is an independent consultant in forensic science. She is based in Hong Kong, but is available to serve the needs of the legal profession in Australiasia as well.

Forensic Science is defined as "the study of and practice of the application of science to the purposes of law". "In short", said Ms. Hamilton, "it can be defined as a science that is useful in law courts. However, I have found since working as a consultant, that forensic science can be useful in situations which would not necessarily end up in court"

Sheilah Hamilton gave us a few facts regarding forensic science:

- 1.0 Forensic Science involves as awful lot of good old-fashioned common sense and it saves a great deal of time to look at the simplest approach first. "There is no point in trying to blind juries with science" she said, "Judges don't like it!"
- 2.0 Objectivity is an essential quality in a good forensic scientist. Winning a case should be unimportant.
- 3.0 Being a woman is no hinderance to being a forensic scientist. In common with many other professions, women just have to work harder and be better than their male counterparts!

Ms. Hamilton also shared some fallacies: -

- 1.0 Forensic Scientists do not cut up bodies! (That is the job of the Forensic Pathologist). The pathologist tells how a person died whilst the scientist tries to ascertain where the person was killed and by whom.
- 2.0 Forensic scientific evidence is all that is needed to solve a crime. Not true. Good investigative police work is still necessary.
- 3.0 Forensic scientists get all their results within the hour. "Oh how I wish it were true" she said. In some instances, the different stages of the examinations will span many months.

4.0 Forensic science is only useful in criminal cases. Not true. It's just that sensational criminal cases catch the eye of the journalists.



"New Zealand celebrates its 150th birthday year with a sense" of purpose and excitement. We have in the past 20 years come to the realization that we are an Asian/Pacific player and that in this region of ours — and yours — there are tremendous opportunities for New Zealand.

ENJOY

Since mid 1984 New Zealand has moved from being the most overregulated and overprotected economy in the OECD, to one of the most open to international market and financial forces. We have removed all subsidies. We have removed most protectionist barriers. We moved to indirect taxation: introducing a comprehensive goods and services tax with no exemptions other than family homes. As a result direct taxes have been substatially reduced. We have deregulated much of our labour market. And have undertaken wide ranging public sector reform — introducing much greater and transparent accountability." said Bridge.

Mr. Bridge advised us New Zealand had successfully reduced inflation from 19% to 4.5% in 5 years. The public sector defecit had similarly been reduced; the national savings ratio had risen from 19% to 12% in the past 3 years; the current account defecit fell from 9% of GDP to 3% and government debt has been reduced from 41% to 20% of GDP.

"New Zealand offers sound long term investment prospects in forestry, tourism, horticulture, meat and dairy farming. We have an abundant supply of cheap renewable energy: Hydro and geothermal.

We have the most technology intensive primary sector in the world. Only 11% of New Zealanders are directly involved in the primary sector: yet it accounts for 65% of our GDP.

The flow of Asian investment into New Zealand is now increasing strongly. Our quality products are marketing strongly in Asia. The NZ economy is almost perfectly complimentary to the manufacturing labour intensive economies of Asia. We produce in abundance what increasing members of affluent Asian consumers are wanting: the freshest, best food: the freshest, best holidays: quality investment potential and, last but not least, the freshest and best thoroughbreds. In short — a strong Asia/Pacific partner."

"Throughout the difficult past 12 months New Zealand has given Hong Kong its steady support. We maintain it is in the wider interest of the Asia/Pacific region that both in the letter and the spirit for the terms of the 1984 joint declaration to be fully and faithfully implemented. We have encouraged and supported Hong Kong to become a full member of the Pacific economic consultative conference. New Zealand has been active in the OECD initiative to establish a dialogue and workshop forum on relevant economic/financial issues. We have strongly encouraged Hong Kong's membership. And New Zealand has worked hard to get the Asia Pacific Economic Conference which met in Canberra last November off the ground and to include Hong Kong in the process. We have given Hong Kong full support at Geneva and elsewhere re the Vietnamese boat people.

The New Zealand government firmly believes a thriving Hong Kong stitched into the various Asia/Pacific networks has a key role to play in the economic and financial development of our region. In this, as in so many other areas New Zealand is a creative, steady and committed partner."

Fellow members, please watch out for the date of this event, as we need your support is the same way as you have done in the past.





It is in this connection that I am considering a "Five-for-one" plan whereby we will establish teams each consisting of five members. Each team is to be led by a Past President and the remaining members will be Rotarians with varying years of service. We will have about 12 teams and with a bit of luck we may get back to 80 by the end of the Rotary year. We plan to launch the scheme in August which is "Membership & Extension Month".

Fellowship was the original motivating power of Rotary and it remains one of the most satisfying products of Membership. It is the engine that powers Rotary. Fellowship thrives when all members participate. There is an old saying in Rotary. "No One Derives Fellowship From an Empty Chair." So, to increase fellowship, we need your strong support. A strong bond of fellow feeling and esprit de corps is the key to a thriving Rotary Club.

Attendance at Club Assemblies has been poor and very often there appears a lack of interest. I appreciate that it is not easy to have activities that are of common interest to all of us. I see the role of the Fellowship Chairman only as a co-ordinator — it is up to all of us to tell him what we want. And having done so we must support him by participating. With good fellowship, people will join us; with bad fellowship, members will leave. It is as simple as that.

We are indeed fortunate that we have a very strong Board of Directors this year — in fact one of the strongest I have ever seen. I see this year as a year of consolidation and a year of self-strengthening. We are grateful to the solid foundations which our Past Presidents and past members have built for us, so that by Honoring Rotary with Faith & Enthusiasm our Club can grow from strength to strength not only in the decade of the 90s but well into the 21st Century."

It was appreciated that for obvious reasons certain types of projects such as those associated with "Fauna" could be difficult to identify in Hong Kong.

Group Study Exchange (GSE)

PP Moses Cheng tabled for discussion a 2-page Summary on the GSE between District 345 and District 697 in Florida, U.S.A. for the 90/91 Rotary year (copy attached).

PP Moses' initial thinking was that the GSE could take place "some time" around the Dragon Boat Festival in 1991 so that the team from Florida could be able to see the celebration of certain Chinese festivals unique for Hong Kong. The JPM was requested to consider the best time for the team to visit Hong Kong. This team would include five representatives under 35 years of age and one "supervising" Rotarian.

As part of the exchange, there would also be a team from Hong Kong visiting Florida. The team will stay for six weeks in Florida. Selection criteria fro suitable candidates from District 345 should include:

a. Good command of English;

b. Ability to act as good ambassador;

c. Willingness to spare the time.

Rotarians and their family members are not allowed to apply.

PORTLAND R.I. CONVENTION - BY PDG PETER HALL

"For the second time in Rotary history, another R.I. Convention was held in the City of Roses — Portland, Oregon, U.S.A. from 24th to 27th June 1990 with a total registrants of well over 21,000 from 97 countries, over 50 delegates were from district 345, Hong Kong and Macau area."

PDG Peter told us there were two "Appeals to the Convention". This is most unusual but it is provided for in the rules and regulations. Rotary Club of Delhi protested the R.I. Board's decision to disallow the nomination of Past R.I. Director Manohar Manchanda as an additional candidate for R.I. President 1991-1992 and the Rotary Club of Mid-Town India appealed against R.I.'s decision re the District Governor of District 312 for 1990-91. Both appeals were lost.

One of the many highlights of the Convention was the presentation of the Rotary World Understanding Award to Mr. Vaslav Havel, President of Czech and Slovak Republic. The award is to realise, exemplify and dramatize the Rotary ideal of service especially in the promotion of international understanding, goodwill and peace.

Eastern Block countries were now embracing Rotary and the new Presidents of Rotary Clubs of Budapest (Hungary); Warsaw (Poland); Moscow (USSR) and the Provisional Club of Prague (Czech and Slovak Republic) were introduced.

Incoming President Paulo VC Costa addressed the Convention emphasising the theme "HONOR

ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM".
"Rotary is the messenger of good words; sower of good seeds; Defender of Nature; architect of Peace."

The Convention ended with the call from outgoing R.I. President Hugh Archer, for all to meet in Mexico City next year.


CHINESE SAYING FOR THE WEEK

and How They Are Being Tackled



Mr Fred Tromp

Mr. Tromp illustrated for us the very serious environmental problems facing Hong Kong today, "The Pressures on the Environment have reached extreme danger levels" he said Time is running out and immediate action is necessary to divert an irreversible ecological disaster occurring here. Mr. Tromp outlined the action being taken by his Department in analysing and then addressing the problems.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

The Government White Paper on Pollution in Hong Kong was published in June 1989 and an extensive commitment to tackling environment/pollution problems, has been made. The cost in dollar terms will be substantial but every dollar spent will be essential. Education of the public is a top priority.

Enabling legislation is being introduced and the biggest success story so far has been the dramatic drop of Sulphur Dioxide in the atmosphere following the law to ban heavy fuel oil in factories this month. Mr. Tromp said Sulphur Dioxide levels were now only 1/5 of what they were.

EPD will shortly be turning its emphasis to the control of Air pollution from Motor Vehicles. Unleaded petrol would be available in 1991 and Mr. Tromp suggested people should check between now and then to ensure their vehicles could run on unleaded petrol in order to make the change over smoothe and effective. With other controls to be implemented, Mr. Tromp said it was aimed to reduce by ten fold, the present levels of carbon Monoxide, Hydrocarbons and Nitrogen Oxides, presently in the atmosphere due to vehicle pollution.

We came away from the meeting feeling secure in the knowledge that the Environmental Protection Department was a thoroughly effective unit, equipped with very able staff and their work to analyse and correct (with legislation as necessary) the present environmental imbalances was starting to succeed. This is one area where Government can count on the fullest possible support from organisations such as Rotary.

Seldom (in fact probably never) before, have we seen such Press interest in a guest speaker's address. No fewer than 22 journalists turned up to hear him. Mr. Shum gave some reasons why Taiwanese interests are now investing outside Taiwan. General overheads in Taiwan had increased dramatically due mainly to high labour costs. The NT Dollar had risen considerably in value making Taiwanese-made products less competitive in the world market and the Taiwan Stock Market which was full of uncertainty, was tending to crash downwards.

Why choose PRC rather than say Indonesia, Malaysia or Thailand? Mr. Shum suggests the main reason is the compatibility Taiwanese Investors feel with China. They speak the same language and indeed have similar cultural backgrounds. While Hong Kong and other Western countries appear to have been sitting on the sideline in the past 12 months, Taiwanese Investors have been buying large tracts of land in PRC, particularly in the coastal areas. Also Taiwanese Investors in PRC are not hampered by Joint Venture requirements and other restrictions as they would be in other Asian countries. Furthermore, China has been very generous to the Taiwanese investor allowing a 4 year tax exemption followed by 7 years of Tax Reduction. This is a very good deal.

Investment by Taiwan into China has been mainly in the Labour intensive industries such as clothing, shoes, toys but Taiwanese Investors appear also to be making use of the fact PRC has far less environmental controls and hence it is easier to operate factories there.

"In many ways, compared to US, UK and other Western countries, Taiwanese technological expertise falls in between that in the West and that in China. Hence China is more suited for Taiwanese investment." said Mr. Shum.

Hong Kong benefits thanks largely to the inefficiencies of the Taiwan Banking system. Hence most deals for project finance are negotiated in Hong Kong which has one of the best banking systems in the World. However, Hong Kong is now starting to miss out in that direct trade links between Taiwan and China are being established and there will therefore be no need to route goods through Hong Kong,



MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT - BY PP EDWIN TAO

Rotary International statistics show that between April 1989 and April 1990, there is a nett gain of membership world-wide with about 200,000 new Rotaries. But this has been almost entirely due to the organization of nearly 600 new clubs during the period.

Again the statistics show, the worldwide average membership drop out in clubs is about 10%. It is higher in our district. The prevailing brain drain plus personnel transfers have been the main cause in our district and HKIE is no exception.

We can not afford such growing attrition but to look for remedy. Working to recruit new members is not only the duties of the chairman and members of Membership Development Committee, but also the responsibility of every member of the Club. Those who have never introduced a new member into the club should seriously look for suitable candidates, amongst his friends and associates & bring them into this great organization to show that you really care for the growth of your club.

The 5 + 1 plan should be implemented at the beginning of Rotary year. The new classification rules allow the admission of more members. The classification rules allow the admission of more members. For example, 2 bank managers, one can be admitted & classified as "Manager" and the other as "Accountant". Additional active membership is another avenue to provide more membership.

The most important thing is to work on the list of updated filled & unfilled classifications. With this list, members can easily look for suitable potential candidates to fill the vacant classifications.

By the way, a word for classification committee chairman, R.I. require that this list of up-to-date "unfilled" & "filled classification be completed by the end of August.

Rtn Dickie Yip talked to us about the development of EPS in Hong Kong.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

EPS is a system which replaces the expensive use of cash. It is a system which allows people to transfer money (in about 20 seconds) from their own accounts to the accounts of various merchants. About 2-3000 merchants are registered under the system.

Merchants can either own the terminals or they can use terminals belonging to EPS. A fee is paid by the merchant to EPS per transaction. The amount varies depending on whether or not the merchant owns his own terminal.

Rtn Dicki explained the workings of EPS and the benefits to consumers merchants and banks alike. He surmised there were tremendous opportunities for further development of EPS in Hong Kong. He envisaged consumers being able to use the EPS system via the telephone in future.





Emerson is headquartered in St. Louis, Missouri and has sales of US\$7.1 million in 1989 from its 50 operating divisions grouped into eight major areas. Thes are: motor manufacturing; process control (for petrochemical, oil refining, stee and other industries); heating, ventilating and air conditioning; appliance components; construction and tools; computer support products; industrial machiner as well as the space and defense group which has just been spinned off.

In Asia Emerson has over 700 employees working in more than 10 JV's and ha numerous licensing agreements in China, Japan and India.

Wing himself is involved both in direct sales and with distributors, representing the divisions with strong Asian links and those with little presence to develop and implement market entry strategies. This has taken him to Korea, Taiwar Thailand and he is currently in the process of opening a new corporate offic in Singapore. The next move will be to set up manufacturing plants in Singapor and Malaysia to supply the South Asia market.





Subject: Personal Financial Planning



Mr. T. Smith

Mr. Smith observed that many people do not have an overall financial plan and have no particular goal in mind. What they need is an independent financial consultant to provide advice on tax, insurance and investment based on their different needs and requirements. They should start by revealing to this expert their family situation, ages, occupations, salaries, current investments, future job prospects and aspirations, stability of marriage, health and likely country intended to settle in and when etc.

More specifically, the first step in financial planning is the making of a will which can vary in complexity but should be reviewed by the consultant and prepared by a lawyer.

The next element is life assurance followed by a health or medical insurance plan. Then they need to put aside a lump sum for emergencies and to provide for income tax bills. Expatriates in Hong Kong should also examine the availability and benefits of any State Pension Schemes in their home countries.

Moving on, the purchase of a property, possibly the single biggest investment for most people, should be carefully considered.

Next one should get into pension planning, requiring a disciplined, regular savings commitment throughout one's working life. Depending on age and retirement date this may mean saving 15-25% of income for such purpose.

School fees for the children should also be provided for and should commence early in the child's life.

The balance of one's assets can then be invested under the guidance of professional managers as an individual portfolio management scheme.

Finally tax planning should be undertaken to mitigate the various taxes that authorities may seek to impose.

POLIOPLUS HELPING BUILD WORLD'S LARGEST POLIO VACCINE PLANT IN KUN-MING, CHINA

Rotary's PolioPlus Program is awarding US\$15 million to help build the world's largest polio vaccine plant in the city of Kunming in south central China. The award is being administered through the World Bank since there are currently no Rotary clubs in the People's Republic of China.

The new facility is integral to the effort to eradicate polio worldwide. It will ensure that, for the first time, Chinese children will receive vaccine that meets standards set by the World Health Organization.

The People's Republic of China represents one fifth of the world's population and has 23 million newborns each year. The new factory will produce 100 million doses of oral polio vaccine (OPV) annually.

The Netherlands' National Institute of Public Health and Environmental Hygiene (Rijksinstituut) won the contract to build the Kunming factory. The facility will produce OPV from virocell substrates, an innovative technique approved by WHO only last year. China's Ministry of Public Health will supervise construction with World Bank and Rotary representatives monitoring progress. Vaccine production is expected to begin in 1994.

Rotary's support for the OPV factory is an important example of a non-governmental organization's collaboration with the World Bank.

Most of the foundation's other 94 PolioPlus grants fund the purchase of polio vaccine and other operational costs for national immunization programs. Departure from this usual practice was necessary since government policy mandated nationally produced polio vaccine. The PolioPlus grant will speed the availability of reliable vaccine, thereby protecting Chinese children sooner than would otherwise be the case. Producing the needed vaccine in China will be cheaper than importing it.

PolioPlus also will fund, in cooperation with UNICEF, an \$899,000 program to create 20 training centers and laboratories and train personnel to monitor progress toward polio eradication.



PP Con presiding at 'Open Forum'

The Forum was chaired by PP Con who asked President Y.K. to introduce the topics to be discussed.

Y.K. explained that membership is the very life blood which sustains a club and we need to maintain that both in quality and quantity. For the latter membership development is necessary. At the end of the last Rotary year five members left and our membership stood at 75. With the joining of Matthew we now have 76 members. To achieve growth we should explore internally membership provisions such as Active and Additional Active members as well as qualifying those eligible for Senior Active membership. Externally we can identify potential candidates among such groups as Rotaract and JC's. At the upcoming Board meeting a plan will be tabled for a 5 for 1 or 7/8 for 1 recruitment drive based on the present attendance contest groupings.

Con further elaborated on Y.K.'s outline by commenting that about 60 of our members can be considered active. Of these perhaps 20 are seriously involved in club operations. PP Ken dwelled at length on the membership scene at his club and district and advised us that we should not preclude female participation in our club. 'You will not suffer if you bring women in,' so concluded our distinguished visitor.

(At the conclusion of PP Ken's remark, PP Con half-jokingly declared that as much as he would like to it is not proper for him to offer a rebuttal in his capacity as Chairman of the Forum.)
Rtn. David Waring then weighed in with an enquiry regarding the ideal size of a club, whether excessive size would take it out of control and excessive growth would bring diminishing return.
PDG Peter offered that no club is either too big or too small. 'How can we serve with just a few members?' he asked somewhat rhetorically. On the other hand if a club believes that it is too large it can always split into two. He further explained that worldwide, Rotary clubs in general are losing members. Although PP Edwin told us a few weeks ago that RI gained 20,000 new members in the first few months of this year these came mostly from formation of new clubs.

PDG Peter went on to suggest a new approach to classification by having prospective new members classified by his function rather than occupation. As an example, a banker may actually be categorized as an accountant if he is an accountant by professional qualification. This is a new rule accepted by R.I. A point on which PDG Peter is not in complete agreement with R.I. was their emphasis to pick young ones for targetting membership recruitment. His advice for us was, 'Don't forget the old.'

Somewhat in the manner of an epilogue our guest and potential member, Mr. S. W. Ip, told us that in the several meetings that he has attended in our midst he has discovered that senior members of this club have been sharing their experience with new members in a most encouraging way.



YOUTH ACTIVITIES MONTH

September is Youth Activities Month, a time to take stock of how our Club is helping young people.

What services can Rotarians offer youth?

Service to youth means those things that a Rotarian does as an individual or in cooperation with his club to promote the physical, mental, and moral well-being of boys and girls, and older youths. He seeks to help their development into good citizens through recreational programs, prevention of juvenile delinquency, prevention of drug abuse, vocational guidance and training programs financial assistance to students, Youth Exchange programs, and the like.

Does Rotary have a slogan for service to youth? Yes. "Every Rotarian an Example to Youth."

How can Rotarians assist young people in their choice of careers?

(a) By career talks at high schools.

(b) By furnishing temporary employment during vacation.

(c) By tours of factories or business establishments owned or managed by Rotarians.

(d) By sponsoring an "occupational bookshelf" in the school or public library.

Rotaract Club

Ideas seldom remain static — and the idea of service to young adults, essential to the concept of Rotary International, led to Rotaract Clubs being started in 1968.

There are now over 4000 Rotaract Clubs and in excess of 96,000 Rotaractors in 96 countries of the world. In our District we have 13 Rotaract Clubs 8 of which are community based and 5 are academic based.

Rotaract means Rotary Action. Members are young adults aged 18 to 29. The objects of Rotaract Clubs, among others, are to develop constructive leadership Continue on page 2

and personal integrity, to encourage and practice thoughtfulness of and helpfulness to others, to build respect for the rights of others based on recognition of the worth of each individual, to emphasize acceptance of individual responsibility as the basis of personal success, community improvement, and group achievement, to recognize the dignity and value of all useful occupations as opportunities to serve society.

Rotaract Club works like a Rotary Club. They have a board of directors which is elected annually. All the clubs in the district formed a district council, chaired by the Rotaract District Representative. They have meetings every month with speakers, who speaks on vocational or interested topics. They must organize at least three projects every year, that is, Community Service, Vocational Service and international Service.

Interact Clubs

Interact club was launched in 1962 as a service club for young people of secondary school age ranging from 14 - 18 sponsored by Rotary club.

Our club established 4 Interact clubs;

Interact Club of New Method College

Interact Club of Shaukiwan Technical School

Interact Club of Queen's College

but maintain only one at the present time, i.e. Interact Club of New Method College, Hong Kong. The other Interact clubs were transferred to our baby Rotary clubs when they intended to sponsor Interact.

Interact Club of St. Stephen's College was given to the care of the Rotary Club of Hong Kong South, while Interact Club of Shaukiwan Technical School to Rotary Club of Hongkong North. Due to lack of activity, the Interact Club of Queen's College was terminated.

The chairman of Youth Service is Rtn. Hubert Chan who has assigned Rtn. Wing Eng to be the Rotarian Adviser to our only Interact Club holds its meetings at the school premises and each meeting is attended by our advisor.







Sharon explained Hay's role as Human Resources Management Consultants. The managing of human resources includes comparing and advising on employee benefits within the region but Hay's role is not to advise client companies what salaries to pay. We were told the level of salaries in Hong Kong were dictated by a number of issues, important among which were the tight labour market and associated shortage of skills and high turnover of staff.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

The average staff turnover rate in Hong Kong is estimated to be in the region of 22%. Why do staff leave? A survey suggests:

"82% leave for other positions locally (the job-hopping syndrome — and usually for better compensation packages."

15% Immigrate

3% Retire

This trend shows no signs of changing in 1991.

Compensation packages have been spiralling upwards at an alarming rate. It was suggested the salary 'trend setters' in Hong Kong were Government, Utilities and the Hongs. Everyone else had little option but to follow.

Sharon reminded us of some worrying statistics: In 1988 Salaries generally increased 12% whereas inflation was 6½% In 1989 Salaries generally increased 16% whereas inflation was 10%

In 1990 Salaries generally increased 16% whereas inflation was 10%

Looking at other countries in the region in 1990, salaries in Philippines increased 17% over last year, Singapore 10%, Taiwan 11%, Korea 15%. Danger signals are ringing loud and clear for Hong Kong. As the salary levels increase beyond the inflation rate, so our competitive edge with the rest of

Asia is affected.

Companies should invest to reduce their requirement for 'people'. Application of improved technology should have a high priority on companies

2. Encourage and assist selected youth leaders and potential leaders in effective youth leadership by providing them with a training experience;


3. Recognise publicly the high qualities of the young people serving their communities as youth leaders.

Miss Amy Tso Speech Training for Deaf Children

LAST WEEK'S PROGRAMME

Mr Wong addressed us on the subject of The Occupational Safety & Health Council and The Legislation on General Duty of Safety. He gave us some startling facts. Referring to last year's statistics, the total man-days lost for the year was 663,000. This means nearly 2000 employees are off work every day due to work related injuries.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

"It is an inherent duty of an employer to protect the safety and health of the employee. The law merely put this responsibility into words and to punish those who neglect this duty. Employers who do not have the intention to break the law should not be scared. They can either employ safety officers or to engage the service of consultancy firms or the Occupational Safety and Health Council to solve the problem of safety policy, procedures, safety training, etc.

Occupational safety and health is no longer a passive reaction from employers. Employers should take positive action to ensure a safe working environment, and subsequently, a safe and efficient enterprise."

Referring to the new legislation, Mr. Wong told us Employers have five major areas of responsibility.

- 1) to maintain plant and provide work procedures to ensure work safety;
- 2) to ensure that the use, handling, storage and transportation of substance is safe;
- to provide information, instruction, training and supervision;
- 4) to maintain safe access and egress;
- 5) to maintain a safety and healthy working environment.

Anyone who contravenes this section wilfully and without reasonable excess is liable to a fine of \$30,000 and imprisonment for 6 months.

There are also two requirements for the employee:

- to take care for the safety and health of himself and other persons who
 may be affected by his work;
- 2) to co-operate with employer to secure safety and health.

Anyone contravening 1) above may be fined \$10,000 and anyone contravening 2) wilfully and without reasonable excuse may be fined \$30,000 and imprisonment for 6 months.

Miss Amy Tso Victoria Park School for the Deaf



Miss Amy Tso

We warmly welcomed Miss Tso who advised us the aim to teach hearing impaired children to speak, is to enable them to be integrated well in a hearing community.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

Our club has been a major supporter of Victoria Park School for the deaf since its inception.

"To teach hearing impaired children to speak, we must teach them to hear. We believe that even the child with profound hearing loss has some residual hearing, that's why we think that hearing impaired children can benefit from aural rehabilitation. A hearing impaired child needs to learn to discriminate and identify various speech sounds. It takes a long time to accept the hearing aid Aural rehabilitation is the most important approach to develop their listening skill as the foundation of language production."

Miss Tso explained that at Victoria Park School for the deaf most of the children had profund hearing loss and she told us how assessments are made to ascertain whether a hearing impaired child can learn intelligible speech.

The various training programmes were outlined. They include auditory — verbal training; speech training; articulation intervention programmes designed for each child according to his/her needs. There are also language programmes to promote communication ability.

To put Vocational Service into practice, R.I. has in 1987 established a fresh concept as a new Direction in Vocational Service. Instead of carrying out vocational service by each individual member as in the past, it is recommended that vocational service is both the responsibility of a Rotary club and of its members.

The role of the CLUB is to implement and encourage the objective by frequent demonstration, by application to its own actions, by example and by development of projects that help members contribute their vocational talents.

The role of MEMBERS is to conduct themselves, their business, and their profession in accordance with Rotary principles and to respond to projects which the club has developed.

To reinforce the new emphasis on collective club efforts in this Avenue of Service, clubs are encouraged to set up sub-committees under the Vocational Service Committee in the following catagories:

- 1) Career Development
- 2) Vocation at Work
- 3) Vocational Awareness &
- 4) Vocational Awards







Universities, have the responsibility to train and educate 19-year-olds of the community; so they will all be able to acquire the latest knowledge in the academic disciplines, professional studies and in science and technology, and they will have a good understanding of themselves as individuals, the relationship between man and man, man and society and man and the environment.

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

Mr Wong explained training and education take place both inside and outside the classroom. "There is a whole spectrum of other qualities that can only be acquired through life experience in the right environment." he said.

Students in general perceive themselves to be average in all abilities. They consider themselves to be relatively strong in their adaptability, self-confidence and analytical ability. The concern of the community on the deteriorating standard of the English language is shared by the students themselves whose ratings in their English abilities are among the lowest.

Many of the qualities employers look for from among university graduates, like confidence, leadership and organizational abilities, social and interpersonal skills, sense of humour and others are not subject matters that can be taught in class. Real life experience is needed University campuses lack the diversities of the greater society. "We need closer link between town and gown, we need assistance from different sectors of the community, in particular concerned groups like the Rotary. Some channels to consider are:

- The organization of student activities under the guidance of experienced professionals. Rotary has already set a good example through the Rotaract movement;
- The offer of scholarships, bursaries and loans to enable students to travel to other parts of the world to broaden their outlook. Rotary has also set a good example through its Travel Scholarship Scheme;
- c. The involvement of more professionals in extra-curricular programmes organized for students by universities. I know many Rotarians have already been contributing significantly in this area of work."

VIEWS ON THE 4-WAY TEST - PP HAROLD LEE

The 4-Way Test is not a code or a creed, but a stimulus to self-appraisal. It is not a pledge, but rather a spring-board to voluntary self-improvement. The Test was conceived in 1932 at the height of the Great Depression by Herbert J. Taylor, a Chicago Rotarian, who later became president of R.I. during its 50th anniversary year (1954-55). It does not provide answers but asks four simple questions of the things we think, say think or do:

1. Is it the Truth?

2. Is it fair to all concerned?

3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FELLOWSHIPS?

4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?"



PP David Diniz

PP David claimed Vocational Service was perhaps the most misunderstood avenue of service in Rotary. He outlined the 4 way test and gave an excellent interpretation as to how each one of us should apply it. "Test Yourself" said PP David, "to learn it by heart is not enough. Rotarians must apply it at all times — and indeed most do".

R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

PP David outlined the major objectives of Vocational Service were: Career Development; Vocation at Work; Vocational Awareness; Vocational Awards; Vocational Service Month (October).

WHAT IS VOCATIONAL SERVICE

Vocational Service, the second of the four Avenues of Service, is an obligation of all Rotarians which, because it is frequently misunderstood, has also been frequently neglected. For many years, Vocational Service was solely a personal responsibility — one that required individual Rotarians to represent their vocations within their clubs and uphold high ethical standards in the workplace. In 1987 the R.I. Board adopted the following statement, which substantially expanded the scope of Vocational Service to require collective club activities as well as the traditional individual commitment.

THE NEW R.I. POLICY ON VOCATIONAL SERVICE

Vocational service is the way Rotary fosters and supports the application of the Ideal of Service in pursuit of all vocations.

Inherent in the Vocational Service ideal are:

1) Adherence to, and the promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations, including faithfulness and fidelity to employers, employees, and associates, fair treatment of them and of competitors, the public, and all those with whom one has any business or professional relationship;

- 2) The recognition of the worthiness to society of all useful occupations, not just one's own or those which are pursued by Rotarians;
- 3) The contribution of one's vocational talents to the problems and needs of society. Vocational Service is both the responsibility of a Rotary club and of its members. The role of the club is to implement and encourage the objective by frequent demonstration, by application to its own actions, by example, and by development of projects that help members contribute vocational talents, the role of members is to conduct themselves, their businesses, and their professions in accordance with Rotary principles and to respond to projects which the club has developed.

As you know, PDG Peter Hall, PP John Kwok and I were in Penang a month ago to join our sister Club in their 60th Anniversary Celebration.

We had an enjoyable visit — an excellent opportunity to make new friends and re-new acquaintances. I should like to take this opportunity to thank you — R.S., Herb, Wu Chong for your generosity of hospitality and warmth of welcome.

Many non-Chinese friends have asked me to explain the significance of the number "60".

The Chinese calendar, each year is designated by two characters, the first is taken from a group of 12 and the other 10. So by permutation, progression, combination, etc. you wind up with 60 sets of 2-character. Instead of the century, China uses 60 years as a cycle.

Because China has no indigenous religion, there is no origin of reference in the Chinese calendar, nothing equivalent to the birth of Jesus Christ. So all Chinese years are labelled cyclically and in modulus 60. Naturally this leads to a cosmological view of an oscillatory universe rather than that emanating from a big bang.

For a Chinese, reaching 60 has a special significance, not only because one is still getting on, which is of course true, but because one is entering a new cycle of 60, and therefore can be allowed to be young again. This is amply demonstrated by some Rotarians who are here tonight. You are doing so well as youths in your second cycle. Look at PP Herbert — he is only one year old; he knows already how to sing Viva Rotary! And our very own Johnnie — he is only a few months old, spilling juices everywhere, standing up when expected to sit down, just like my 2-year old son.

Rotary Club of Penang, I am sure you must have experienced the singular impact of strong and mixed emotions as you celebrate your 60th birthday or complete your first cycle; and on behalf of Hong Kong Island East, I wish you health, strength and happiness as you enter your second cycle.

The late PDG John Yuen

The following is an extract of an address by Pres YK at our weekly meeting on 7 November 1990.

"PDG Peter, President Moses, fellow Rotarians & guests, you will recall that our Founder President PDG Uncle John Yuen passed away one year ago on 8th November 1989 at the advanced age of 88.

For the benefit of our newer members and visiting Rotarians, PDG Uncle John Yuen, whose name appears at the front page of the Tung Feng, was our Founder President and then served a second term as President of our Club in the Rotary year 1970/71. He was a past Governor of District 345 having served RI in this post in 1973/74.

Charity, philanthropy, candour and wisdom are some of the very suitable words to describe Uncle John and the very full life which he led.

As PP Con wrote in a special obituary "..... Uncle John was not only a source of light, comfort and wisdom to us all, he also embodied all that is Rotary. He gave us his fellowship, his advice and counsel, and, above all, his affection."

It was Uncle John who ensured that our Island East Rotary Club was built on a solid foundation, saw to it that the Club was properly nurtured, and quoting again from Con,".....it was mainly due to his unstinting leadership that we gained our reputation as one of the finest Rotary clubs in this part of the world". For his excellent efforts, Island East will forever be indebted.

I myself can certainly speak for members of our Club here that we count it as our privilege to have shared Rotary with Uncle John.

Uncle John had indicated in his will that a sum of HK\$1 million would be made available to our club in the form of a donation for the purpose of a Community Service Project. This is certainly good news and a great honour for Island East.

Needless to say, this is a matter of considerable importance and I am pleased to advise that PDG Peter Hall has accepted your Board of Directors' invitation to chair a special committee to research, identify, negotiate and implement this important project. It is intended that members of this Committee will consist of representatives from our PP Council, members of Uncle John's family and from our Board of Directors. We will have further details for you from time to time. If you have any ideas or suggestions, please do not hesitate to convey them to Uncle Peter or myself."

WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION AND WHAT DOES IT DO?

The Rotary Foundation is a non-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and others. Its objective: to contribute to the achievement of world understanding and peace through international charitable and educational programmes.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE ROTARY FOUNDATION - WHAT'S IN IT FOR US?

During the 1990-91 Rotary year, the Rotary Foundation's goal is to raise US\$38 million in unrestricted contributions. For that goal to be met, our District has set its own goal of US\$120,000. Our Club's goal is US\$7,000. Since The Foundation relies primarily on contributions from Rotarians, its educational and humanitarian programmes could be reduced if these goals are not met. Most of us do not need to be convinced that The Foundation is carrying out vital, important works in the world. We know of villages that for the first time are being supplied clean drinking water, the families who now have eye or dental care. We know how Foundation humanitarian programmes promote self-help - not a quick fix - so farmers can grow the foods that produce the greatest yield and the children have an opportunity to go to school and learn skills for a lifetime. And we know the long-term investment that the Foundation makes for participants of the Scholarships and Group Study Exchange programmes, as they act as ambassadors of goodwill in countries throughout the world. What we may not be aware of is what is at stake for us if our Club and district goals are not met. Our District's participation in Rotary Foundation programmes - the number of Scholars we sponsor, the number of Group Study Exchange teams awarded to our District - is directly affected by our level of giving. If we fall short of our goal, we will have less to say about how Foundation grant dollars are allocated. Our role in helping to improve international understanding will be cut short. But when we reach our goal, our opportunities to participate in Foundation programmes increases. Let's make sure that happens. Let's see that our Club goal for the year is met.

HOW DO WE BECOME PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS OR BENEFACTORS

Contributions of US\$1,000 can be made through our Club and for those who would like to participate but who would prefer not to part with US\$1,000 in one shot, you can become a Paul Harris Sustaining Member by contributing smaller sums over up to a ten year period (i.e. US\$100 per year). All you have to do is to obtain a Bank Draft in US Dollars made payable to Rotary International and pass this to Pres YK Cheng. PDG Peter Hall, PP John Kwok or Rtn Murray Macdonald. They will do the rest.



R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

Louise graduated from University of Kent in June 1989 and the Rotary ideal of International understanding is in many ways an extension of her degree subject (Honours in Social Anthoropology). "What I generally call the study of people and cultures throughout the world" she said.

Louise' interest in Art has led her to give several talks on different art traditions and it was also the reason she worked for a while at the British Museum in the Dept of Ethnography. Louise has also spent a year in Washington DC at Smithsonian Institute and her experiences include 2 months in Mexican jungles, Guatemala and Hondurus, studying ancient temples, architecture and sculptures of the Mayan civilisation.

Not surprisingly, Louise has the ambition to become the Curator of a Museum and while at Hong Kong University she will be conducting supervised research in the Dept. of Sociology, on religious and belief systems. She is also working on a voluntary basis for Oxfam, an organisation with which she was actively involved in UK.

Barbara Barns comes to us from Dallas Texas and she graduated from Baylor University in 1987 with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration. She obtained a triple major in Finance, Economics and Real Estate. Barbara become a real estate investment banker in Boston. She was also a commercial

mortgage broker before joining G(eneral) E(lectric) Capital-Commercial Real Estate Division in Washington DC. They have granted Barbara leave of absence so she can undertake the Foundation Scholarship.

At University of Hong Kong Barbara is studying under the MBA programme and she says the academic quality of the programme far exceeds her expectations.





1.0 Paul Harris Fellow

One who makes an unrestricted donation of US\$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation in support of its activities (or one in whose name such a donation is made). One can become a Paul Harris sustaining member with a lesser contribution.

2.0 Rotary Foundation Benefactor

One who makes either a donation of US\$1,000 to Rotary Foundation or who makes provision in his Will for such a donation to be made upon his passing.

Dr Emil Mezgolits
"Doing Business in Eastern Europe"



Dr. Mezgolits addressed the meeting

Dr Mezgolits explained the first move was to sell technology to Eastern Europe and his country, Austria was the nearest to Eastern Bloc countries. He explained that investors had to weigh up the low cost of living in Eastern Europe with seemingly low productivity. In order to do business in the Eastern Bloc, a secure base is needed in the West with money and personnel ready to go into Eastern Europe at short notice. Much patience is needed due to frequent changes in negotiations. Investors must be prepared to bear a high cost in getting eastablished in Eastern Europe and to accept any project will take a long time to proceed. It is very important to use personnel who can speak the local language understand the local mentality.

Dr Megolits gave us examples of various Eastern European economies. Hungary was cited as being in very bad shape with transport and technology information producing major problems.

Dr Megolits company, Austrian Lotto and Toto Company in Vienna, is assisting Banking organisation in Hungary to improve their technology. They are also in discussions with company in Croatia Slovenia Yugoslavia USSR and Czechoslavakia. The process of introducing information technology into Eastern Europe will take a long time.

COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

(Proposed resolutions may be received up to 30 days before the council is scheduled to convene.)

Although it is the responsibility of the proposer to prepare proposed legislation in appropriate form for consideration by the council, the Board of Directors of R.I. has authorized the Constitution and By-laws Committee to assist clubs and districts in drafting correcting and refining the wording of proposals prior to their being submitted to the council for consideration. Because proposals must be prepared for publication immediately after 1 May 1991, it will not be possible to provide drafting assistance for proposals received close to that date.



R.I. THEME: HONOUR ROTARY WITH FAITH AND ENTHUSIASM

The Board aims to cooperate with all other agencies to expand the development of sport and physical recreation so that Hong Kong citizens may participate more actively in physical recreation and athletes be given the opportunity of maximising their potential in order to represent Hong Kong with distinction.

The Board has under its aegis the following committees: the Sports Aid Foundation Fund and Sport Aid for the Disabled Fund Committee, the Community Sports Club Committee, the Marketing and Sponsorship Committee and the Sport in Education Committee. The development of an overall coach education policy for Hong Kong is another priority for the Board.

The Board is responsible for a broad scope of work which falls into six areas:

Planning — To draw up and implement a clear and coherent plan for sport and physical recreation, ensuring that there is effective coordination within and among governmental and non-governmental sectors of the sport community in Hong Kong.

Physical Recreation — To encourage the knowledge and practice of sport and physical recreation and the development of an integrated community based sports system, which provides an increased range and quality of opportunity for all levels of participants.

High Performance Sport — To provide opportunities and support for Hong Kong's athletes with talent and dedication to win at the highest level of competition.

Funding — to secure and disburse the funds required to attain the Hong Kong Sports Development Board's objectives.

Research — To carry out itself, or to encourage and support other persons or bodies in carrying out research and studies into matters concerning sport and physical recreation; and to disseminate knowledge and advice on these matters. **International** — To enhance Hong Kong's position in the international sports community.

- Adopt a portion of a local river, stream or highway and encourage other community organisations to take part in keeping it clean.





HONG KONG KIDNEY TRUST FUND

Rtn Tony Keenan of Rotary Club of Kowloon has notified us of a fund raising venture the Club is entering into in support of the above fund by way of a raffle for a Lancia Thema car (HKS269,000). Only 1,500 tickets will be sold at a cost of HKS500 each. Persons wishing to participate should contact Tony at 5456661 ext. 62 (Secty, Vivian Kwan).

Tony advises there is a second prize which is a round trip ticket to Maurtius valued at HK\$60,000.

"The Hong Kong Kidney Patients Trust Fund was founded by Mrs. Jenny Parr in 1985 after the death of David, a young Chinese boy and a close family friend. David died of kidney failure because he could not get a place on a government sponsored dislysis programme and could not afford the only alternative which was private treatment.

Jenny discovered that there was many such patients in Hong Kong and the death rate was approximately 1,000 per year. The Trust Fund raises money to finance dialysis fluids for the portable dialysis programme called CAPD (Continuous Ambulatory Peritoneal Dialysis) and at present supports 239 patients at a cost of HK\$453,000.00 per month.

Trust Fund patients are all Chinese and in the low income bracket and would all be dead if they could not be supported. The youngest patient is 12 years old and the oldest is 79 years old. All patients are referred by Government social workers and doctors. The Trust Fund is run from Jenny's home. This keeps the administrative expenses to an absolute minimum so that monies raised can go directly to patients who need immediate help - patients in renal failure cannot wait for long!"



THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

We recently featured in Tung Feng, R.I. President Hugh Archer's call for more support to the Foundation.

WHAT IS THE FOUNDATION AND WHAT DOES IT DO?

The Rotary Foundation is a non-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and others. Its objective: to contribute to the achievement of world understanding and peace through international charitable and educational programs. Since 1947, the Foundation has spent more than US\$206 million on its programs.

The programs of The Rotary Foundation:

Scholarships: Men and women spend an academic year abroad continuing their studies, learning about other cultures, and serving as ambassadors of goodwill for Rotary and their countries.

Last year, 1,382 scholars were sent to study in 63 countries at a cost of US\$16.7 million.

Group Study Exchange: Teams of four or five non-Rotarian young business and professional men or women visit each other's country for four to six weeks to study the social. economic, business, and cultural conditions, while staying in the homes of Rotarians.

332 Teams (involving 1,400 participants in 40 countries) were sent abroad last year at a cost of US\$3 million.

Health, Hunger, and Humanity (3-H) Grants: Large-scale, oneto-five year projects, international in scope, that emphasize self-help and improve health, alleviate hunger, and enhance human and social development. The total expenditure last year amounted to US\$3 million.

Rotary Grants for University Teachers to Serve in Developing Countries: University educators teach and conduct research in developing nations on subjects of benefit to their host countries for six to ten months.

Special Grants: Matching funds for small international, humanitarian, and charitable service projects conducted by Rotary clubs and districts.

Disaster Relief: Immediate response to natural catastrophes wherever they occur. The President of R.I. approves the grants, relief is provided, and the grant funds are replenished with contributions by Rotarians.

The total cost for the above Grants and Disaster Relief last year was US\$1.7 million.

Rotary Peace Forum: Through conferences held in different regions of the world, this pilot program examines the causes of conflict among nations and explores activities that can promote and maintain peace. Last year 13,250 people from 25 countries participated.

PolioPlus: Provides vaccines and supports the social mobilization activities of Rotarians in developing nations to ensure the immunization of all the world's children against polio by the year 2000.

Rotary Volunteers: Rotarians and Foundation alumni share their professional skills internationally by providing service for four weeks or more in developing countries. Last year there were 154 volunteers in 28 countries.

WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?

The money comes from voluntary contributions from Rotarians and others. These contributions may be in the form of a benefactor contribution, endowed scholarships, or by contributing to the endowment scheme as did PP Con earlier this year.

To those who contribute generously, the Trustees of the Foundation offer a variety of ways of expressing gratitude and recognition. Perhaps the best known is the designation of Paul Harris Fellows.

Any individual who contributes, or in whose name is contributed, US\$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, is recognized, upon request, as a Paul Harris Fellow.

HOW DO WE BECOME PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS?

Contributions can be made through our club and for those who would like to participate but who would prefer not to part with US\$1,000 in one shot, you can become a Paul Harris Sustaining Member by contributing smaller sums over up to a ten year period (i.e. US\$100 per year).
