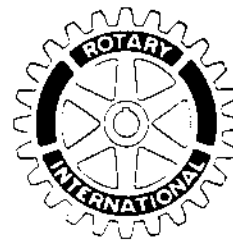

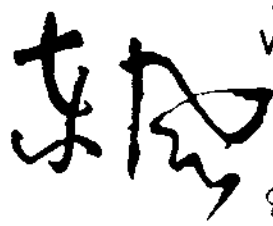

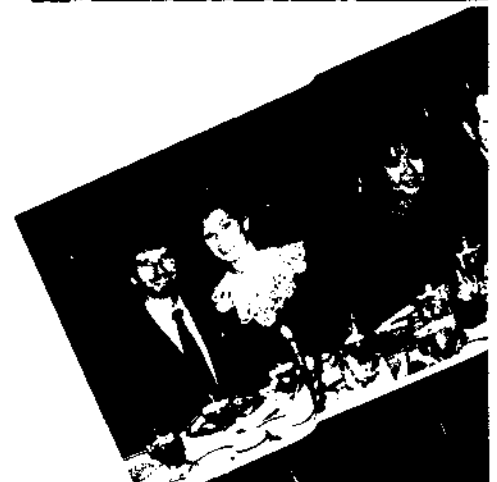
We are very excited about this program and hope that this initial effort will be successful so that we can carry it on to the next year, and perhaps even broaden the scope.



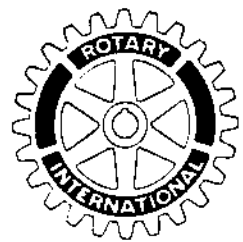

Rtn. Camille and Mr. Peters presented a paper compiled by the Harvard Business School Association of Hong Kong. The presentation is meant to be an educational tool that business people in Hong Kong can use when discussing the Territory with overseas investors, Head Offices, Partners etc.

The presentation summarised events leading up to the June 4 1989 when international television brought Tianamen Square to the World's attention. These events produced a cloud of uncertainty over the development priorities for China.

In the immediate aftermath of 4th June 1989, there was some concern about the impact on Hong Kong of a breakdown in authority in China. Four scenarios for China's future development are:

- 1.0 Civil War/Regionalisation - Most unlikely
- 2.0 Return to Isolationism - Unlikely due largely to the fact the standards of living in China have now risen to the point where it would be politically untenable to turn the clock back. None of the present Leaders have advocated this path.
- 3.0 Economic and Political Reform - While this scenario is most attractive for Hong Kong, it would require a fundamental change in the political leadership of China. This seems unlikely with the current Leadership.
- 4.0 Economic but no Political Reform - This scenario is a continuation of the process which served China so well in the 1980's. It would require China's Leaders to accept that the events of 1989 were simply an adjustment to temper the overheating in the economy and consequent social tensions. For Hong Kong, the immediate future would be affected by slower growth while China completes its adjustment process, but in the longer term Hong Kong would revert to the dramatic growth we have seen in the 1980's, as it once again feeds China's thirst for modernization.

It is tempting to believe that China might follow the recent pattern of events in Eastern Europe. But China is unique. While there is indeed a revolution of rising expectations, we believe that change will come by evolution within the communist party structure. This is consistent with China's history and with the unique scale of the management task. We therefore believe that continuing economic reform with no political reform, is the most likely. Eventuality Hong Kong and China need each other. It is a relationship of mutual benefit with Hong Kong's future underpinned by its two key roles as the gateway to China and as the intelligent service centre for Asia-Pacific, the Government and business community of Hong Kong are planning for that future. The future does not stop in 1997.

In reality, substantial new investment is planned for enhancing Hong Kong's infrastructure, the Government's budget strategy is geared towards ensuring a healthy balance sheet beyond 1997 and the private sector has extended its financial horizons beyond that date. And the Basic Law is now agreed to define the parameters within which all this can happen.

Hong Kong clearly does have some problems. Hong Kong's track record, however, is one of successfully overcoming such problems to foster economic growth. And, as this presentation has shown, the China card, which has been Hong Kong's tradition ace card, remains as valid today as it has always been. In addition, Hong Kong has a unique role in the context of the dynamic and increasingly integrated Asia-Pacific region.

#### **REPORT ON RYLA CAMP IN MACAU – DEC. 28-31 – RTN MURRAY MACDONALD**

There were 125 applicants for our District's Rotary Youth Leadership course this year and the selection panel had the difficult task of selecting only 64 persons.

RYLA's objects are to:

- \* Demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth;
- \* Encourage and assist selected youth leaders and potential youth leaders in responsible and effective voluntary youth leadership by providing them with a Youth Leadership training experience;
- \* Encourage continued and stronger leadership of youth by youth;
- \* Publicly recognise the high qualities of the many young people who are rendering service to the Community as youth leaders.

RYLA is open to all young people between the ages of 18-25 who show leadership potential and the theme for this year was CARE (Confidence, Awareness, Rationalisation, Empathy).

The course was run by Rotarians under the chairmanship of IPP Parry Poon (RC Tolo Harbour). Rotary Club of Macau was the host club (Pres. Charles Fok). Events were very well organised by Rtns Michael Chan, Horrace Ho, Curly Leung and PP James Yick with assistance from Rtns Raymond Cheung, Dennis Lee, Keith Yau, Murray Macdonald and Rotary Foundation Scholars Barbara and Nisha.

The Programme covered everything from sporting events to orienteering (under the very able guidance of Mr. K.L. Lam), a Management Game and a survival course. Participants arrived back in Hong Kong at 2 am on New Years day, tired but bubbling with enthusiasm for the course and the new friendships made. The Committee now has to select the four most outstanding participants to be sent to join the RYLA Camp/Seminar in Australia and/or USA in 1991.



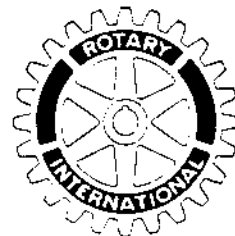

**Excerpts from Mr. Dockerill's speech:**

As educators we are well aware of the all pervading influence of computers in society and recognise that we have a particular responsibility to see that our students are properly equipped with the necessary skills to enable them to make the fullest use of this ever developing technology.

At the City Polytechnic we have tackled this problem in a number of ways. Most, if not all, of our students study computing as part of their curriculum and we provide a computer literacy course for all new students joining the Polytechnic. Perhaps more importantly, we have sought to establish within the Polytechnic an environment where computers are used to the full and play a major role in the day to day work of the institution. This is the most effective way of exposing students and staff to the new technology and ensuring that they appreciate just what benefits it can bring to the working environment.

We are now experiencing a major step forward in the development of information technology with the introduction of computer networking. This promises to have an even greater impact on our daily working environment than all the advances over the past 30 to 40 years. There are many who believe that it will not just affect the way we do things but will also shape the actual structure of our organisations.

We have recognised the growing importance of this development and have installed a substantial network at the City Polytechnic which is the basis of our computer provision.

Networks are provided for all the academic departments and the library. Soon after Professor Cheng arrived at the Polytechnic he decided that all academic staff should have a workstation of their own on the network and this has now been achieved.

We have installed a very extensive facility which is unique in Hong Kong with some 2,000 workstations connected on to the network at the last count. Indeed we have tried to find another educational establishment anywhere in the world that has such a facility. Apart from one or two in the States, such as MIT we have had no success.

Although the technology is impressive and fascinating, the Directorate of the Polytechnic is more interested in the facilities provided and their potential for improving the way we operate and fulfill our primary mission which is delivering good educational programmes and generally developing scholarship through our research and other activities.

I am sure that you can appreciate the impact that this extensive computer facility is having on our students and staff. If students require information on a certain department they can go to a terminal and look up POLYDATA; if they wish to interrogate the library catalogue, they use a terminal; they can submit assignments in electronic form directly to their lecturers' accounts; if they wish to book time on the computer, they do it using a terminal; soon they will be able to book the sports facilities from a terminal on the network.

All staff have a workstation in their office connected to the network. They can access any of the computer facilities and information services provided. More significantly they can communicate via electronic mail with any of their colleagues in the States, Europe and Australasia via BITNET.

In conclusion I would like to emphasise that we are entering into a new era where the computer, and its effect on communications will fundamentally affect the way we operate and organise ourselves. We are trying to ensure that all our students are aware of these major developments and are equipped, through the exposure they have received whilst studying at the City Polytechnic, to make the optimum use of the opportunities they provide.

I can assure you that any graduates you employ from the City Polytechnic will have no apprehension about the use of computers. Indeed you will probably find that most of them will demand improved facilities that they consider necessary to enable them to do a better job.

It is our belief that this is the best way to ensure that Hong Kong commerce and industry make the most effective use of the opportunities modern computer technology provides. Our students should be ambassadors for change, able and ready to use computers to improve both the efficiency and effectiveness of the organisations by whom they are employed.



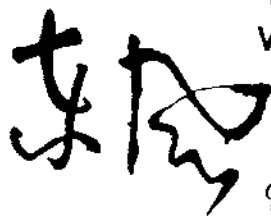

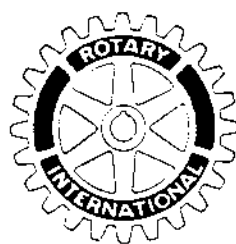

'Sudden Cardiac Death'

#### Exerpts from Dr. Lo's talk

For people over 40, coronary heart disease is the most important cause of sudden cardiac death (SCD). Risk factors for such disease include: cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, elevated blood cholesterol, high-strung personality, obesity and family history. Men who overeat and who lack exercise have a higher propensity to be victimized by SCD.

The most common coronary heart disease symptom is a pressure-like chest pain associated with physical exertion.

An exercise test is useful as a screening test to detect coronary cases but it does not guarantee diagnosis. A more definitive method is an angiogram.

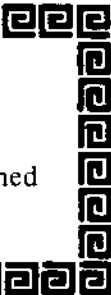
Among other common diseases that predispose SCD are: cardiomyopathies (heart muscle disease), dilated cardiomyopathy, valvular heart disease and congenital heart disease.

People who have suffered from exertional chest pain, shortness of breath, dizziness or unexplained palpitation, multiple risk factors (as abovelisted) and those with a family history of sudden deaths would benefit from regular medical check-ups.

In summary, we should reduce our SCD risk by stopping to smoke, treating hypertension, diabetes, high blood cholesterol, maintaining our weight through exercise, stress reduction and in general leading a balanced life.

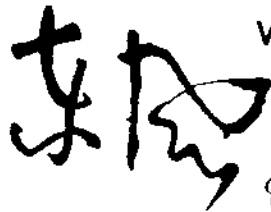

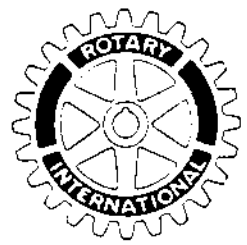

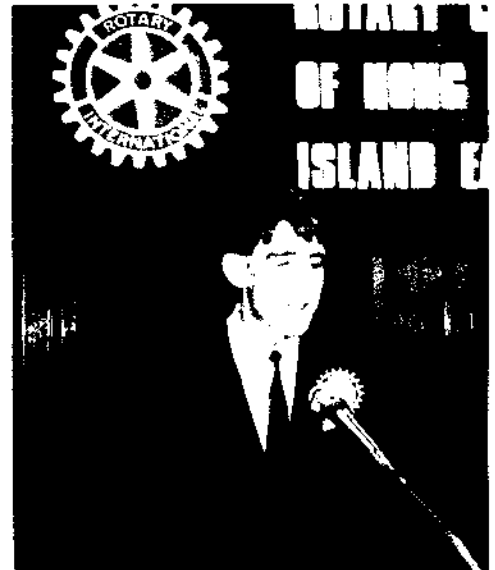

Guest Speaker - Michael Yates addresses members

Australia was discovered 204 years ago by Captain Philip. Australia Day is celebrated each year on 26 January.

Thank you President Y.K., PDG Peter, DGN Eddy fellow Rotarians and guest. I am pleased to have the chance of presenting my vocation talk in this meeting. My speech comprises of two parts. One is in my own business, and the other is about electricity supply and installation generally. Firstly, I am working in an Electrical and Mechanical Contracting company. The Co. name is Tp Tim Electrical Engineering Co. The firm was established 50 years ago, by my late father. The firm is at present listed as Government Approved Electrical Contractor, group II. Most of our jobs are from Hong Kong Government, Housing Society, Two Universities and polytechnic. Following the death of my father, the company was in the hands of my (eldest) brother. But, ten years ago, my brother also passed away, and I took over the

business. After a long struggle the business is now developing in the building services field. Building Services means those work to provide specialised services in a building, such as Electrical, Air-conditioning, Lift and Escalator Installations, Fire Services Installations, Plumbing and Drainage Works, Public address Systems, Doorphone installations, etc.

We are now preparing to apply to up-grade our Government listing in the electrical contractors list to group III, aiming for contracts of unlimited value. At the moment, there are about 20 contractors in this grade.

That concludes for my own business.

The Second part is about electricity supply and installation generally. In recent years, many accidents happened in construction sites, commercial buildings and even domestic houses.

Investigations by Fire Services Department and Electrical and Mechanical Department, revealed that it is mainly because many unskillful workers had joined the electrical field, and carried out installation work without fulfilling the safety rules. And there is no Government department to take duty on the control of skill and workmanship.

In view of this, Electricity Ordinances and Regulations 1990 were therefore legislated in March of last year.

In this connection, I wish to mentioned a little bit more about myself. I am a Director of "Hong Kong Electrical Contractors' Association" and a member of the "Licensed Workers" committee.

The Ordinance mainly divided the workers into three main grades - "A, B, and C" and a special grade - grade R.

Grades A is for installing electricity below 400 Ampres

Grades B below 2500 Ampres

Grades C over 2500 Ampres

and Grades R for specific areas of work.

The registration of electrical workers was start in November of last year and the rule will be effective in the middle of year 1992, by then all electrical works will be carried out and guaranteed by licence people.

After Registration of workers, Government will start to register companies in next year. So in the future all electrical works must be carried out by the Licence company employing licensed workers.

We believe that after 2 years all the electrical works will be under control of the Ordinance and the accident would decrease.

Finally, if you want to protect your house asset and your life. Please find a Licence Company for installation or modification of your electrical work.

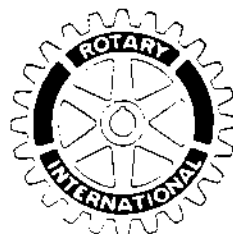

Rtn Murray Macdonald spoke to us on the significance of 'New Zealand Day'. Having recently returned from New Zealand, he enlightened us on some of the attitudes prevailing down there. "A country of only 3.4 million people situated so far away from world markets, makes it very difficult to make much impact on the world scene and yet in so many ways, New Zealand is doing just that." Rtn Murray said people in New Zealand were looking somewhat cautiously now at closer economic ties with Australia yet all realised that in the long term, a closer economic unit made a lot of sense. To some extent, Rtn Murray feels both New Zealand and Australia are still suffering from the lifestyles enjoyed as a result of the boom years of the sixties when Europe provided guaranteed markets for primary produce. This all stopped with the consolidation of the EEC but neither country did enough to stem the tide of expenditure related to the "good life". Both countries are now suffering the consequences.

New Zealand in particular is also suffering from an over burdened and often sadly abused social welfare system which many feel has got totally out of hand. Strong governmental action has recently been taken as a first step to correcting the imbalances which have developed. Hopefully this will be drastic enough to have a measurable effect.

## FROM THE DESK OF R.I. PRESIDENT – PAULO COSTA

In our mad rush through life, in our desperate need to achieve all before it is too late, we tend to confine ourselves in a contemporary world. We forget the intricate network of inherited skill and wisdom that binds us to those who have preceded us.

We owe most of our knowledge and much of our technology to the great thinkers of the past. It took them decades – even centuries – to lay the foundations of the intelligence that is ours instantly at the touch of a computer keyboard. We have cumulative knowledge today that they could never have dreamed of; but we are in danger of losing their capacity for patience and their instinct for passing their knowledge along to new generations.

We face that same danger in Rotary. We must not permit the rapid growth of our organization and the many new goals we are setting to lead us away from the great traditions of our past.

Our strength is in our continuity, the chain of service that links past governor to current governor to governor-elect to governor-nominee; past president to current president to president-elect to president-nominee; Rotary veterans to newest inductees. It is the molding of experience and innovation that makes Rotary strong yet flexible. This continuity keeps our programs forceful – in The Rotary Foundation, in World Community Service, in the progression from Interact to Rotaract to Rotary club membership.

And continuity is essential in carrying forward such major efforts as PolioPlus – and our new emphasis on Preserve planet Earth which began in my year as president and will extend through the presidencies of Raja Saboo and Cliff Dochterman and beyond.

## GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE

The Rotary Foundation Group Study Exchange is an educational programme designed to:

- provide to outstanding young business and professional persons opportunities for studying another country, its people and institutions through participation in an organized program of study and discussion in the country concerned;
- further international understanding by allowing people of good will to meet, talk and live with each other in a spirit of fellowship so they can get to know each other's problems and aspirations, and to permit such personal contacts to ripen into lasting friendships; and
- involve Rotarians in a specific, practical and meaningful international Service project by organizing educational programs and providing hospitality for study teams.

A candidate for a Group Study Exchange team must be a business or professional person, between the ages of 25 and 35 inclusive at the time of applying, who has been employed in any recognized business or profession, on a full-time basis, for at least two years. Candidates must be citizens of the country in which they reside and must either be employed or reside in the sending district.

This year our District is to send a team of young persons to District 697 (USA). The team will be away from 1 May 1991 – 1 June 1991. If you know of a person who might qualify for this award, please see Rtn Murray Macdonald in order to obtain an application form.

The GSE team from District 697 will be visiting us in Hong Kong from 1 April 1991 – 30 April.



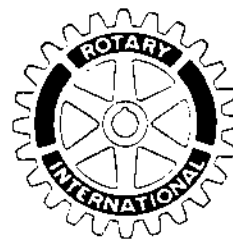

**COMMUNITY SERVICE COMMITTEE – Rtn Hubert Chan**

Besides the on going projects which include the scholarship for the H.K. Sea School, students & teachers of the Victoria School for the Deaf, H.K. Polytechnic for the William Ling & Bunny Wang Memorial Fund, we had completed the following major projects this year.

1. Playground renovation for the Victoria School for the Deaf. (\$50,000).
2. We organized a children day camp for the students of Victoria School for the Deaf, with the support of Rtn Dick Lidster we took 110 students with their parents to enjoy a day camp at the Auxiliary Police Force Headquarter on the 11th November 1990. The programme included team competition, a magic show by Rtn Li & drama by our own fellow Rotarians. Our Rotaract Club also participated to set up and organized the whole day programmes.
3. We sponsored HK\$20,000 for the Carnival for the Youth organized by the Eastern District Board the theme is to promote the concept of Environmental Protection through a game stalls in Victoria Park. Our Interact & Rotaract Clubs installed two games stay in this event. Thousands of citizens visited and our club name was well recognized.
4. We propose two projects to install Call Bell System for two Homes for the Old People. The budget is HK\$50,000 since these two projects are in Tuen Wan & Sai Kung, we are asking the Rotary Club there to consider joining us in this project.  
The budget for the above projects is more than HK\$130,000. Besides your subscription fee, the more money you donate to the Sergeant-at-Arm, the more projects we can do for the community.

**INTERNATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE – Rtn Murray Macdonald**

The Club has joined hands with our sister club in Penang, and jointly we are involved in a project to provide spectacles to poor rural school children in Malaysia who have poor eyesight and who are unable to afford to purchase spectacles (or to renew them after a few year's use. Selected optometrist's have been approached and have volunteered their examination services free of charge. To date, 28 primary schools have been called on and it is expected the project this year will provide spectacles for around eight children in each school. The project is being run by Rotary Club of Penang and our share of the cost is M\$3,000 which is approximately HK\$8,000. As part of the project, eye charts have been distributed to Primary Schools to enable teacher to undertake their own preliminary scan to detect those in need.

Our proposed sister club visit to Makati North in Manila has been "put on hold". Unfortunately, it now looks unlikely we can make the visit this Rotary year. We received two sister clubs, Niigata and Penang, who made official visits to us in the latter part of 1990.

Our District is to host a Group Study Exchange team from Florida USA and they will be with us at our April 3rd meeting.

Accommodation for Team Members is required and any members who can assist are asked to contact Rtn Murray Macdonald (Ph. 5261974, Fax. 8101937).

The Rotary Foundation Scholars assigned to us, Barbara and Louise are progressing well with their scholarship in Hong Kong and they will be addressing us in April or May prior to leaving Hong Kong for home.

As the Rotary world is continuing to expand rapidly, the R.I. Board has approved a new four-digit district numbering system.

At present, we have 484 districts spread out in 172 countries and geographical regions, numbering from District 101 to District 998 and it will reach 1,000 easily.

Beginning 1st July 1991, the new system will be introduced by adding a zero to the end of each current district number, e.g. our District 345 becomes D. 3450.



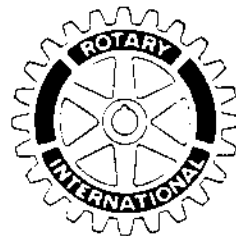

#### FIGHTING INFLATION HONG KONG STYLE

Importation of labour in selected trades on a limited scale should be allowed temporarily to tackle inflation in Hong Kong.

However, Mr Wong warned that the smooth implementation of any labour importation scheme requires a delicate balancing act on the part of government. Calling inflation "the most pressing problem for Hong Kong today", Mr Wong said the current bout of inflation is proving to be unexpectedly persistent. Consumer price inflation rose steadily to 11.3% in December from the low of 9.1% in June and seems likely to stay at a high level for a while longer.

According to him, components contributing to the changes in overall CPI (A) feature rising oil prices, rapid increase in housing rentals and the fluctuating prices of service-related items.

Commenting on the limited discretion the government has at the macroeconomic level to influence domestic inflation, he said that it is necessary for the government to ensure that its actions help rather than exacerbate the situation.

"In inflationary circumstances, it may be desirable to put more emphasis on direct taxes, such as salaries and profits tax, than indirect taxes and fees. When tax increases are needed they should be tailored to minimise their direct impact on prices. As far as possible, interest rates should be kept high to maintain the confidence of foreign investors."

Mr. Wong said factors that enable Hong Kong manufacturers to maintain the export competitiveness of their products by minimising increases in production costs include the relocation of low productivity, labour-intensive manufacturing processes to the Pearl River Delta, and significant improvements in manufacturing productivity.

Other sectors of the economy have been subject to greater inflationary pressures because competition does not exist for goods and services supplied to the domestic market or produced in support of re-export trade, and because the demand for labour differs significantly between different sectors of the economy. "As such, diverse rates of wage increases and different degrees of labour shortage prevail in different sectors of the economy," said Mr. Wong.



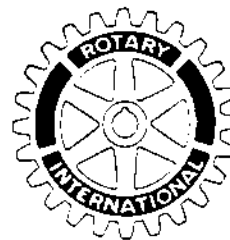

PP Con Conway salutes the digital system

In his usual elucid, enjoyable and easy to listen to fashion, PP Con extolled the virtues of our Telecommunication System in Hong Kong. "Hong Kong is the first Urban area in the world to be fully digital" said PP Con. There are 62 Telephone Exchanges in the Territory and apart from some outlying Islands, all all are highly modernised using fibre optic cables instead of the traditional 'copper wire'. PP Con also gave us a run down on Telecom's infrastructure here and turning to cable laying/repairing, PP Con commented on the cable ships in operation today. "We have the largest fleet of cable ships in the world" said Con. Always happy to offer advice, PP Con recommended telephones with a "tone" system rather than a "pulse" system. The Tone phones give a far better reception.

Con then updated us on the introduction of the new CT2 telephone into Hong Kong. This is a hand held, cordless, wireless unit which relies on hundreds of small base stations (which will be distributed throughout Hong Kong on Buildings etc). Usually reliable sources, of Irish origin, report the cost of these units is likely to be plus or minus \$2,000 and there is likely to be a \$250 per month service fee. Owners are also likely to be charged a fee of \$0.50 per call. The item itself is the 1.5 the size of a cigarette packet and according to Con "it must not be confused with the usual hand held telephone". This one, from all accounts is far lighter and better. "Just enter your PIN number and you can dial anywhere in the world" Con said. There is only one minor hitch in that CT2 is only able to transmit calls (i.e. it is not able to receive incoming calls) but Yuppies need not despair, soon a new model will be available which will have a CED display which will tell someone is calling and what their number is... Back to the Paggers chaps!

Ireland's National Day



Mr Peter Jackson

Mr. Peter Jackson who represents the Irish Export Board for Hong Kong and China, spoke about the Single European Market by 1992. He explained why it has come about, what is proposed and what the implications are for Foreign Investors and Far East Manufacturers.

The aims are to create a genuine common market for 340 million consumers; to reduce costs and decrease overheads; to harmonise standards and V.A.T. and to catch up with USA and Japan. It is aimed to create a new confidence in Europe. "1992 will not mean Protectionism. The Community will still meet its International obligations". Mr Jackson said.

Turning to Ireland, Mr Jackson commented on the extremely favourable climate in Ireland for foreign business investment a 10% Corporate Tax on Profits (up to the year 2010); a definite 'pro' business attitude at official levels and an excellent infrastructure/communication facility. In recent times, Ireland has attracted 51% of the mobile US Investment going into Europe.

Of the foreign manufacturers in Ireland today, USA accounts for 38%; UK 26; Germany 15%; Japan 2%; Other Countries 19%.

"Ireland offers higher rates of return (24.1% average) when compared to other European countries (where the average is 6.6%)" Mr Jackson concluded.

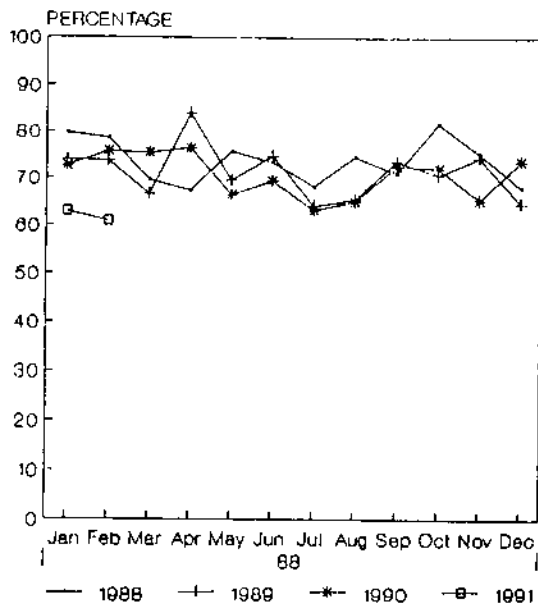
1. Recycle newspapers, cans, glass and bottles. If every Sunday newspaper printed in the U.S.A. this week were recycled, it would save 500,000 trees.

**THE HISTORY OF THE ROTARY WHEEL**

Each of us has a Rotary pin that we wear proudly, but how much do we know about the emblem, the Rotary wheel?

The first emblem was designed in 1905 by an engraver named Montague Bear, who had recently joined Rotary. The wheel was chosen because at the time, club meetings were held in "rotation" at members' places of business.

The first emblem was a basic buggy wheel, but soon thereafter, "Monty" Bear added clouds of dust to the wheel to indicate action and movement. Through the years there were minor changes and finally, in 1920 the wheel as we know it design was officially adopted. There has been only one change since - in 1923, a keyway was added to the wheel. Rotarians thought that without a keyway the wheel was an idler, incapable of transmitting power to or from the shaft. With the keyway, the wheel symbolizes that Rotary is a worker, not an idler.



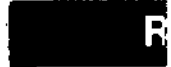

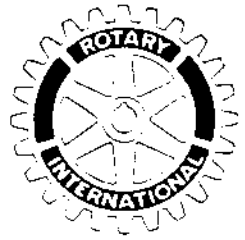

Mr. T.L. Tsim English & Songs



Mr. T.L. Tsim

We have all seen Mr. T.L. Tsim in action within discussion groups on Television. He is also very well known for his work in Hong Kong as well as his various articles and publications.

Mr. Tsim spoke of the need to improve English in Hong Kong today.

He compared English papers given students in 1963 when he was a student and 1986. He found the paper he sat in 1963 was far more difficult.

Mr. Tsim said Hong Kong's standards of English is diabolical. The view that English standards have fallen is shared by independent educators generally.

Explanation given were:

1. Cultural explanation. The Chinese language is better funded and subscribed to now compared with 10 years ago. This is a trend considered inevitable.
2. Developmental explanation. HK economy grew suddenly in 70's and 80's hence it doubles every 6-8 years and it needs more English speaking people.
3. Economic explanation. Unemployment here is only 1.3% to there is no undue pressure to Master the English language to get a job.
4. Sociological explanation. In the 1950's, 60's it was the pattern for elder sister to give up education in favour of a young brother. Today this is no longer the case.
5. 1997 explanation - the Brain Drain is a language drain. We are becoming less and less of a well educated country.
6. Quality of students/teachers. One of the best schools in HK lost 80% of form 5 members to overseas educational institutions.

Hong Kong has to tackle the problem at secondary level and then this flows over to tertiary level. The students must be brought up to standard. There is a strong and urgent need for the Education Department to rethink its goals and its strategies. We don't have sufficient numbers of English speakers and writers to sustain Hong Kong as a leading international financial and business centre.

Mr. Tsim closed his address with comment on English songs. Many of these songs went out of fashion in the 1970's and 1980's. Mr. Tsim is trying to bring them back into fashion as a means of improving English standards here.

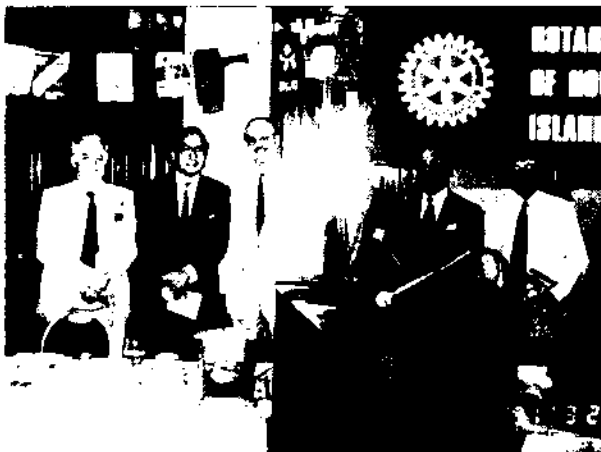

**ATTENDANCE RULES**

The Rule is very simple. To gain a credit for attendance, it is necessary to remain in a Rotary meeting for at least 60% of it. Furthermore, if a member misses a meeting, it is expected he will make-up at another club. In practice, this can be difficult to do particularly if we are travelling. However, generally we know our travel plans in advance and with a little planning, it is surprising how many meetings can be made-up. It is very true that making up at another club is an enjoyable experience (particularly in another country).

The most important ingredient as to whether or not we make-up is contained within ourselves. To quote the old saying – "Where there is a will, there is a way". We can make-up for a "missed" meeting either 6 days prior to the "missed" meeting or 6 days after it.

To be an effective member of our Club, it is expected that we will make a point of attending every meeting, or if we miss meetings, we will make them up. If a member's attendance record slips below 60% at any time, he runs the risk of having his membership terminated. In fact, Rotary Rules do allow for "automatic termination of Membership" in such cases.



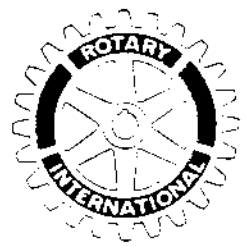

We listened with great interest at the mysteries and benefits of unleaded petrol were unveiled for us and we are grateful to Shell for addressing us. We are advised most newish cars should be able to use the unleaded petrol without modification and the likelihood of unleaded petrol causing "damage" to cars previously using leaded petrol negligible. Owners of high performance cars would be advised to check with their dealers before using unleaded petrol but use it we should. It will cost less than the leaded variety.

Youth Crime in Hong Kong

Mrs. Lau gave us an in depth analysis of Juvenile Crime in Hong Kong and she explained the efforts being made by the various Government Departments to handle the problem. The crux of the problem lies in lack of Parental discipline.

"Government, society and parents all have an important part to play in moulding our future generations. It is not a time for shunning of responsibilities or laying of blame. It is a time for concerted efforts to be made by all concerned to ensure our young ones are being properly guided and assisted to grow up to be law abiding citizens and to assume the responsibilities that lie ahead of them in the years up to 1997 and beyond" Mrs. Lau said.

Over the past 10 years, there has been a considerable increase in the number of juvenile and young offenders in Hong Kong. In 1978, we had only slightly over 3,000 juvenile offenders. This figure has doubled since then. In 1979, the number of young offenders did not quite reach 5,000, now it has well-exceeded the 8,000 mark. In fact, the number of young offenders for 1990 was the highest over the past decade. At the same time, the crime propensity rate in respect of both juvenile and young offenders has deteriorated rapidly by over 100% since 10 years ago. In 1979, the number of persons prosecuted in the 7-15 years age bracket averaged less than 400 per 100,000; in 1989, it has increased to over 900 per 100,000. In 1978, the number of persons prosecuted in the 16-20 years age bracket averaged slightly over 800 per 100,000; in 1989, this has gone up to around 1,900 per 100,000. This trend certainly gives cause for concern.

**THE BANNER OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF HONG KONG ISLAND EAST – P.P. Con Conway**

Overseas visitors to our weekly luncheon meetings usually take part in a ritual which is well known throughout the world of Rotary. This, of course, the exchange of club banners and over the past 38 years we have acquired thousands of banners in this manner. In return we offer our banner which is quite distinctive, very colourful and beautifully designed. It is the creation of our former club member PP Cedric Astbury and it is elegantly simple. It features the Bauhinia Blakeana.

This is a pink flower which grows on a medium sized evergreen tree known as the Hong Kong orchid tree and is among the finest of the Bauhinia genus anywhere in the world. It has been adopted as Hong Kong's floral emblem. It was discovered in 1908 by the Fathers of the French Foreign Missions at Pok Fu Lam. Its origin is unknown and it is a sterile hybrid never producing seed. Another related species is Bauhinia Blauca, climbing by means of tendrils, with bunches of pink flowers of sufficient beauty to merit cultivation as a covering for trellises and porches.

Our club banner features Bauhinia Blakeana on a yellow background so to emphasize its pink colour.

Although it has been with us for some time this club manner is likely to remain our worldwide flagship as it will be most difficult to create a design of equal beauty and simplicity.

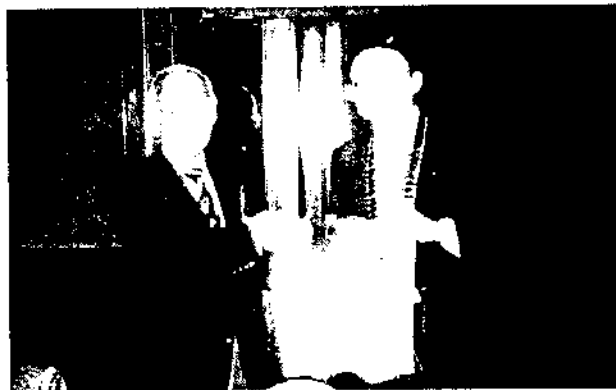



## OUR DARUMA DOLLS — P.P. Con Conway

Visitors to our club are greeted by members who are on Fellowship Duty and by a pair of dolls which are round, sternfaced, legless, neckless and strikingly vermilion. The unique and pretty Daruma or Bodhidharma dolls were gifts to our club for our 30th Anniversary from our sister Rotary Clubs in Japan. Darumas are usually mascots in political elections. Candidates customarily open their elections by painting a black pupils in the white of one eye of the Daruma, with the fervent hope that he can give the Daruma his other pupil if he wins. Some believe that the Daruma is a good-luck charm. It is a traditional custom to darken one year, with a Chinese calligraphy brush and black ink, when one has a goal to achieve and to darken the other when it is achieved. Thus, at victory celebrations after elections, filling in the Daruma's second eye is a large part of the ceremony. 'Both eyes open' signifies success in Japanese. The custom is also prevalent in the business world. Businessmen will buy a Daruma doll at the end of the year and will paint one eye, praying for success in their business, and if they have a good year they will paint the other eye at the next New Year.

The Daruma has a lot of spiritual meaning in its usage. It was created in the image of the sitting figure of the founder of the Zen sect in China in the sixth century. He was said to have meditated in his famous squatting position for 9 years seeking enlightenment and he supposedly cut off his eyelids and legs so that he would not blink or move, according to legend. Therefore, the Daruma is regarded as the expression of devotion. It is easy to recognise the Takasaki Daruma because gold letters are written on its shoulders. The characters usually say 'success in business' or 'safety in the family'. The writing is beautifully done in calligraphy style and some look like illustrations. Another typical characteristic of the Takasaki doll is its grandiose eyebrows and dignified whiskers. The eyebrows are drawn in the shape of cranes and the whiskers resemble tortoises. The lines of the tortoise-shaped beared look like pine or bamboo trees. And the red nose appears like a plum blossom. The roots of the Takasaki Daruma originated at Daruma Temple at Mt Shorin. The ninth chief priest of the temple, Togoku Osho, requested the peasants to make paper-mache Darumas, copying the figure of Daruma sitting in meditation in a picture drawn by Shinetsu-zenzhi, the first chief priest, in order to earn money by selling the Daruma to the rich, thereby saving them from the devastating famine of Tenmyo that had destroyed their rice crops. These Darumas were sold at the Nanakusa Festival on New Year's Day, which eventually evolved into the Daruma-ichi or Daruma Fair of today.

Now that famous Daruma-ichi is held in the precincts of Daruma Temple on January 5 and 6. Each year over 400k000 people visit the Daruma-ichi. Old Darumas are brought to the fair for ceremonial burning and then new ones are purchased in exchange. The Daruma has penetrated deeply into the lives of the Japanese. For instance, the Japanese have a saying: 'Seven times pushed over, eight times rise up.' It is based on the Daruma since its bottom is round and heavy, forcing it to rise immediately after it is pushed over. The proverb teaches us the importance of survival in difficult times. Over the years the Japanese people have continued to love the funny-looking Daruma doll. Consciously or unconsciously they seem to respect it so it could be called the spiritual mascot of the Japanese. Thus it was with great affection, admiration and respect that our fellow Rotarians from our Japanese sister clubs presented us with our two Daruma dolls. We like to think that the continuing good fortune of our club is in no small measure due to our Darumas which are always on display at our regular weekly luncheon meeting and our 'special guests' are a continual reminder to us of our special relationship with our Japanese sister clubs.



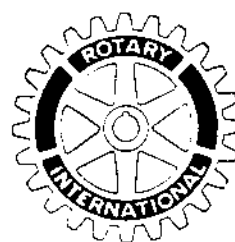

## DISTRICT CONFERENCE – HYATT HOTEL MACAU 26/28 APRIL

### Incoming Scholars 1991/92

The present "incoming" Foundation Scholars leave for home in June. The two Scholars assigned to our Club, Barbara Barns and Louise Tythacott will be relaying their experiences to us and saying their farewells at our meeting next week.

In September this year, a new group of Foundation Scholars will be coming to Hong Kong and our District is now looking for volunteers from our Club to act as Counsellors.

Rtns Joseph Chan and Murray Macdonald have acted as Counsellors this year (1990/91) and they will be pleased to let you know what is involved.

Briefly, one Scholar is allocated to one Rotarian. That Rotarian is asked to meet the Scholar on arrival in Hong Kong and to provide general guidance, particularly during the first couple of weeks the Scholar is in Hong Kong. The Rotarian then becomes a Point of Contact for that person during the period of the Scholarship (usually 9 months). Generally the Rotarian will include the Scholar in family and Rotary gatherings. Accommodation is taken care of by the universities here.



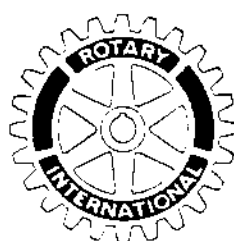

The YMCA - 90 years of age

"It is a particular pleasure to present YMCA's hopes and aspirations to the men and women of Rotary because in many ways the two organizations share common interests in community development." said Rtn Chuck.

YMCA was founded in 1844 in England and had established a history of some 50 odd years in Europe and North America. In China the movement was as strong as any in Asia with the first YMCA established in 1901 in Shanghai on the mainland. Communications and trade between Hong Kong and Shanghai was frequent thus an international bond or parenting type of support could be easily established. Perhaps most of all there was need for the services that the YMCA could offer. That is to say Hong Kong had its share of social problems. It is a humbling realization that YMCAs prosper in times of social deprivation but this is very much a reality. It would be wonderful to think of a society in no need of YMCA services. People would be totally fulfilled spiritually and emotionally, be well educated, be living in a fair and just situation with no need for advocates, and generally have all their social needs looked after. This kind of utopia would be fantastic. Except for the odd problem like YMCA staff looking for new jobs it would be great. However, unless you are extremely fit, don't hold your breath for this utopia to take over from the YMCA. We are happy to serve as long as there is need.

Now thanks to the faith of our predecessors we're 90 years old and can look to our future with hope and confidence. And it was more faith and confidence that allowed us to plan for an extension to the Salisbury Road Centre. Rtn Chuck then showed us some slides to outlink the YMCA's vision for community service in the 21st Century and how this new project will help achieve it.

"How can I summarize the past 8 months?

Mr. Chow urged all employers to introduce systems to promote safety and health in the work place.

"Safety reflects quality of Management" Mr. Chow said, "It reflects whether or not Management is forward looking".

Legislation is now in force requiring safety Management systems to be put in place. This will also require that basic safety training be given to employees and it also provides for information on safety and health in the workplace to be made available to employees.

The two employment areas in Hong Kong presently lacking good safety and health standards are:

- The Construction Industry
- The Transport Industry

In the Construction Industry last year, 1 in every 3 employees was injured and the incidence of fatal/serious injury was very high. Not only did these serious injuries bring a host of problems to the immediate families of the injured person but they also resulted in level of lost man days which must surely be considered unacceptable.

Mr. Chow advocated there was considerable value to be obtained by investing time and money in retaining a safe and healthy workplace.

For those working in offices, he advised the two areas for all to look at were the desk we work at and the chair we sit in. Both should be at the right level for the respective individual. Chairs in particular should provide good lower back support. Mr. Chow also recommended the need to take a short break after every 2 hours of concentrated desk work.

We got married first and then lived together, and thought cleavage was something butchers did.

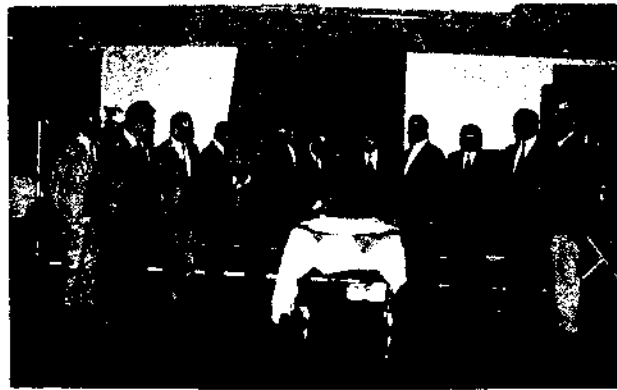
We were before Batman, disposable nappies, QE One, jeeps, pizzas, instant coffee and Kentucky Fried wasn't even thought of.

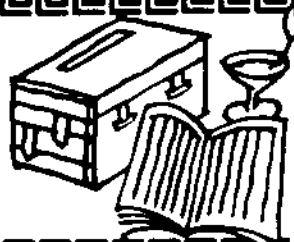

## OUR CLUB ATTENDANCE — (Editor's comment)

Oh Dear! 58.36% attendance for April ranked us last in our Group (Hong Kong 1). Last in the District was RC Kwun Tong with 57.50% and this was a mere one percent below us.

The Board is taking action. For Member's information if a person is absent without Leave of Absence for four consecutive meetings, RI Rules and Regulations say that person's membership automatically terminates. Club's have interpreted this rule fairly liberally but our Board is now reviewing the matter very closely.

"Leave of Absence" does not absolve members from attendance requirements but it does save the worry of possibly having our membership terminated if we miss four consecutive meetings without having "made-up" at other Clubs. Therefore, should a Member be leaving Hong Kong for a period (say 2 weeks or more), please complete a Leave of Absence card and leave it with the Secretary (Printed cards are available at the Rotary desk each meeting).

As well as the "4 Consecutive Meeting" rule, there is also a requirement that we aim to maintain a minimum 60% attendance record (and at any meeting, we are required to stay for at least 60% of that meeting).

The reason for the rules is very simple.

Being the type of organisation we are, attendance is an essential ingredient to the well being of the Club. Membership makes a Club and consistent absence from Rotary meetings without acceptable cause, suggests a possible lack of commitment to the Rotary movement and the ideals the majority of us strive for.

It must be said that all our Members are most worthy individuals and it would be with a great deal of sadness to see any of them leave us. However, for the good of the Club an attendance commitment is required. (If Members are going to miss our meeting, they retain their own attendance record — and in so doing assist our own Club in its membership attendance performance — by making up at another Club anywhere in the world either 6 days prior to the meeting they are going to miss or 6 days after it).

The attendance requirements are not onerous but in the final analysis, Rotarians who feel they cant meet them should give serious consideration as to whether they wish to continue their Membership within the wonderful worldwide movement of Rotary, or whether they should gracefully resign and hand in their Rotary pins before the new Rotary year commences on July 1st.

Our Club does not expect a 100% attendance record from everyone but it does need Members' commitment and it needs their support.

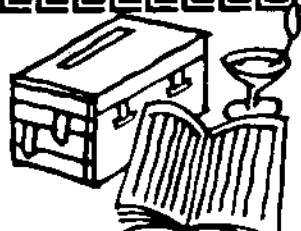

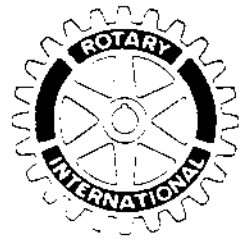

Hong Kong is the Regional Head Quarters for the Eastern Group of the main Holding Company, Primlaks (Holding) Panama Inc., The Eastern Group Comprises companies in the Middle East, India, Thailand, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Korea, Japan and Zaire. For some traditional reasons, operations of the African country Zaire have been merged with the Eastern Group. Besides these, we have a liaison office in Singapore. Being a financial centre, Hong Kong has been chosen the Head Quarters. Applicants must not be Rotarians or family members of Rotarians.

Through the scholarship, The Rotary Foundation seeks to promote understanding and friendly relations among peoples of different nations through Graduate, Undergraduate, Vocational, Journalism, and Teacher of the Handicapped Scholarships for one academic year of study in another country. Scholarship recipients are expected to serve as Rotary's "ambassador of goodwill" between the peoples of their sponsor and host countries, while maintaining high standards of academic achievement.

The primary purpose of the scholarship is to contribute to international understanding through study in another country. Achievement of ambassadorial goals is the most important responsibility. Earning degrees, diplomas, or certificates is not always possible because of differences between the home and host educational systems. Additionally, Rotary Foundation Scholarships are granted for one academic year (in most cases nine months) while most degree programs require a longer period of time to complete.

After the award year, Foundation Scholars are expected to continue contact with Rotary International and to support and publicise international education. Public speaking, media exposure, and participation in Rotary alumni groups are some ways in which they share experiences and continue promotion of international understanding and world peace.



Rtn Alan is Headmaster of the Canadian International School in Hong Kong. The school has been here for a number of years and presently has 750 pupils from Forms 1 to 6. The school runs an Ontario programme which is audited by Ontarian authorities. Students at the school are automatically classified as Ontario students.

Rtn Alan then tried to teach us what sounded and looked like 'Goggledigook' but which in fact was the language of the Inuit People in the Far North at Baffin Island, Canada. The Inuit People are often called Eskimo which literally means 'eaters of raw meat' Alan spent the last ten years on Baffin Island as Headmaster of the local school. The settlement he stayed in had a population of 900; one third of which were at school. The people are Hunters and the nearest populated area is 450 miles to the South. Alan told us the Inuit People were hearty, friendly loving folk who relatively speaking had experienced very little contact with 'the white man from the south'. We saw awe-inspiring colour slides taken by Alan depicting a land of 8,000 ft mountains, ice bergs, massive glaciers, polar bears and only a few people. Huge fiords provide superb hunting and fishing. The waterways are open only in August. The huge 40,000 year old ice bergs are spectacular. These sometimes turn upside down and when this happens, waves of up to 20ft high can be created. Baffin Island is a mere 400 miles from the magnetic North Pole. The weather there gets a trifle chilly with temperatures of minus 60 degrees C and wind chill factor of minus 120 degrees being quite usual. The warmest temperature is about plus 9 degrees C but this lasts for only one day! Alan described life

inside his hunting igloo as "very nice, cosy and warm" said he "with temperatures rising inside to plus 1 degree C!" One supply ship a year calls at the settlement and this has to provide the entire oil, gas and food supply for a year. Known to the local people as 'wooping Crane', Alan looks back on his time on Baffin Island with a great deal of nostalgia. "I learnt so many things there that I'd never experienced before" at our meeting, he had with him various items from the cold North including his Igloo making knife, his footwear made from polar bear hide and sundry other items. Alan will return to Baffin Island on visits but for the present he is enjoying the warmer climes here.

#### PLEASE SUPPORT A VERY SPECIAL EVENT – 3rd INTERNATIONAL ABILYMPICS

Hong Kong will be hosting the 3rd International Abilympics in August 1991.

This event is best described as an "Olympics of Abilities and Possibilities". There will be skills contest (including vocational, living and leisure), conference, Guinness Book of Record event, an exhibition, management workshop on self employment, fireworks display and street parade.

All activities demonstrate the ideal of "equality through participation" and is aimed at total integration of people with and without disabilities.

Over the past 70 years or so, Rotary Clubs all over the world have been actively involved in the Rehabilitation field. Back in 1981, Rotary Clubs in Japan gave full support to the 1st International Abilympics. Together the Rotarians in Japan were able to raise a total of 42 million yen.

At the December 1990 Joint Presidents Meeting of all Rotary Clubs in District 345, it was decided we should participate in this 3rd International Abilympics. It will be regarded as a District Project and that Rotarians will be asked to help whatever they can to the organisation of this event. Financially, we have also committed to raise US\$100,000 (HK\$780,000) as follows:

(1) Each Club in Macau and Hong Kong contributes HK\$15,000.

(2) Balance to be raised by a special fund raising event, which is the crux of this message.

The "thinkers" in the above-mentioned special fund raising committee decided to hold a "No-Ball" Ball. This is essentially a raffle draw without spending money to hold a dinner dance for it. The raffle ticket costs HK\$100 each, and the grand prize is a specially commissioned hand crafted Waterford Crystal prestige vase valued over HK\$20,000. We have allocated 160 tickets on the basis of 2 tickets per member. It is hoped that every member of the club will do their share.

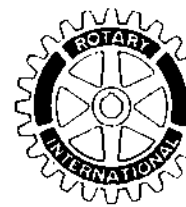



AN ASSESSMENT BY

As we approach the end of this Rotary year, suppose we begin with a complete self-analysis, harshly honest and objective. We must ask ourselves what our shortcomings are, where have we failed ourselves, our Club, our neighbours and our business associates - where have we compromised our standards? The analysis must be objectively critical. Once we know where we are, the next step is to control the deficiencies our self-analysis has revealed.

It is true that Rotary is composed of many kinds of men - some more fully imbued with zeal than others. But all members, at one time or another manage to progress toward their ideals while having a good deal of plain, wholesome fun. Some of this is from programming, some of it is the quite satisfaction of a job well done. Some of it is in the fellowship of the weekly meeting or other Rotary gatherings. Some of it is in the common effort toward a common goal.

If a new Rotarian has been properly oriented and if his Club is alive to its obligations and opportunities, his membership is an adventure as rich in discovery as a voyage to a new land.

The Rotary meeting is where the work of Rotary begins and where much that is essential happens: fellowship, information, inspiration, planning and motivation to action.

During each of the 24 hours of every day, every week, one or more Rotary Clubs is meeting somewhere in the world. At such meetings are generated the knowledge and understanding of Rotary, the interest and enthusiasm, and the ideas that are the basis for vital Rotary activity in all avenues of service. It

is at the Rotary Club meetings that the individual Rotarian can begin to broaden his horizons in appreciation of and participation in Rotary activity beyond the Club level.

We always hear and read about the 'vital statistics' of Rotary. Vital, indeed, for they are an accurate indicator of Rotary's pulse - the growth of this organization in new members and new Club.

But these statistics do not remind us of the other side of the scale - the Rotary Clubs that cease to exist. Occasionally, such terminations are due to wars, political strife, economic disruption or natural disasters. Yet external events are less likely to destroy a Rotary Club than the smaller, less noticeable 'wound' to which even the most secure Rotary Club can fall prey. These 'wounds' are the internal problems which, if ignored, can slowly but inevitably sap the Club's vitality. Such problems never spring up full-blown overnight, but develop slowly, gradually paralyzing the Club often long before its members are even aware that a problem exists. These weaknesses - Rotarians failing to take their obligations seriously - lack of participation - poor or non-existent fellowship - lack of team spirit - feeble and uninteresting projects - members' poor attendance and not making up missed meetings at other Clubs, etc. etc.

A big sore point is talking amongst members when the President is conducting the meeting or when the speaker is giving his talk. Another sore point is the exodus of members when the speaker is still speaking, which not only belies the discipline that is expected of a Rotary Club but is also a source of embarrassment to the speaker. The President, on his part, should see that each meeting is carefully planned, open and adjourned on time. There should be no need to prolong meetings.

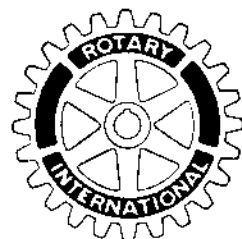

It therefore reminds me of PDG Philbert Chin's story at the recent District Conference about one dying Rotarian who told his wife: "I want my fellow Rotarians to be my pall bearers." "Why?" she asked. "You have never attended meetings regularly or took an active part in the club." "Well", he replied, "in spite of being a RINO - Rotarian in name only, they have carried me this far, so they might as well carry me the rest of the way."

The idea is with gentle persuasion and proper motivation, we can turn our "RINO"s into dedicated Rotarians. The challenge is to see Rotary grows in our club. It is a long term process that will extend into future Rotary years.

Club Service under the able leadership of VP Warren saw the "coming of age" of several of our younger and newer Rotarians. They are notably:

Gary Chiu — our Sergeant — How can you complain if the weekly intake is well over HK\$1500?

Michael Kelly — we had excellent Fellowship functions this year — Lamma evening, Penang visits, X'mas parties and so on — we all had great fun.

Henry Chan — it is not easy to come up with good Programmes every week and I am sure you are fully appreciative of Henry's effort to secure a variety of quality speakers. You all remember T.L. Tsim's "English & Songs", and our vocational talks were of a very high standard.

Like other Clubs in Hong Kong, we do have our share of membership problems due no less to immigration, retirement and loss of interest. We performed surgery on some who didn't pay and with low attendance. I can assure you that performing the surgery is in itself a painful task.

Nonetheless, thanks to your good effort, and the "Seven-for-One" plan, we started with 75 members at the beginning of the year and we are now 83. This represents a nett increase of 8 members or 11%. I warmly welcome our new members and I am sure that in no time you will fully settle down in our Club. I see the nurturing of new members an important task ahead.

I speak with considerable delight when I refer to the names "Niigata" & "Penang". Board members would recall that a year ago we were still struggling as to what course of action we should take regarding these two sister Clubs which for many years, and for a variety of reasons, there were virtually no contacts between them and our Club. Uncle Peter, Uncle Johnnie, and Uncle Dave joined me in two historic trips respectively to Japan and Malaysia to celebrate Niigata's 50th Anniversary and Penang's 60th Anniversary, and to renew a relationship that was once lost. Things that were lost but are now found are certainly considered all the more precious. It was a good opportunity to see Rotary in action in other parts of the world. These all culminated in their return visits to Hong Kong last November, and the excellent fellowship that went with it which we all thoroughly enjoyed.

I therefore particularly cherish our District Award for International Service with specific reference made to our world community service project with the Rotary Club of Penang. The project involves the provision of eye glasses for children in rural areas in Malaysia. We paid the money, Penang did the bulk of the donkey work. The project was most useful in cementing our sisterhood relationship.

Our thoughts are very much with our 4 other sister clubs although mother nature has repeatedly prevented us from planning a visit to Makati North.

We gave our usual support to Rotary Foundation — our philanthropist Chan Soo became a benefactor, and it was nice of Adrian Grantham to have chosen to become a Paul Harris Fellow — of his own free will and accord — the very moment he joined our Club two weeks ago.

My good friend Hubert Chan has done a sterling job as the Community Service chairman. He responded to the theme "Preserve the Planet Earth" by organising the very well — attended "Environmental Carnival" at the Victoria Park with the Eastern District Board last December, and led our tree planting team on 5th May. We gave our continued support to the Victoria Park School for the Deaf — did an interesting Day Camp with their students and financially supported the refurbishment of their playground.

One prominent feature of this year's community service activities is the active involvement of our Rotaractors. Their dedication and participation and the way they honour Rotary certainly did us proud. So are some of our Rotarians who devoted much of their time for the good of our Rotaractors. Well done — Joseph Chan, Wing Eng & Matthew Kok — it is but right that Ming Pao gave Joseph the recognition he so well deserves!

Members will recall that the late PDG Uncle John Yuen was the founder President of our Club and a pillar of strength in District 345. I am sure I can speak for a lot of us here in this room that

A successful man once said: 'I am only one, But still I am one. I cannot do everything. But still I can do something; And because I cannot do everything, I will not refuse to do the something that I can do.' What Rotarians require of their institutions today is performance, not promises; character, not charisma; action, not words.

For life to be beautiful, something must be achieved. If a Club stops doing, it will wither to nothing. If you are asked to be a chairman — never say no! If you are asked to head a project — never say no! If you are asked to volunteer — never say No. The day you say 'No' is the day you cease to grow and do service to your Club. Never say 'No' and you add meaning to Rotary.

Rotary recognizes that there are inherent in every man certain finer sensibilities and nobler impulses of the heart which are awaiting a fuller expression in his life, and, furthermore, that men are happier when they are giving free expression to these finer qualities of their nature. Yet in the midst of all the complexities of modern life and its many demands upon our time, it is easy to submerge these qualities and grow cold and callous. Rotary, therefore, is bringing man together once a week to remind them of these nobler and finer qualities and to inspire them to give expression to them in their daily lives.

The challenge that faces us is to re-examine our priorities and our attitudes. We can no longer assume that a simple desire to help is a sufficient basis for action. A new ethic requires a humility of thought, a desire to learn as well as to teach, a capacity to receive without arrogance and with gratitude as well as to give.

So at the dawn of a new Rotary year, let us begin by rededicating and recommitting ourselves to those things within the grasp of our own two hands — to build a better world, beginning right where we stand and beginning with you and with each one of us.

As I've said before, one of the greatest assets of our Club is our Past Presidents. Their guidance, encouragement and constructive criticism so generously given are essential to ensure that I perform my duties properly. I greatly look forward to joining them and becoming one of them.

I am sure they will lead Island East to better and brighter things.

My wife would have accused me of acting like a parrot if I say "Thank you" 83 times — and that is, to each and everyone of you.

Thank you for bestowing on me the honour of electing me your 37th President. Thank you for the staunch support which you have given me for which I am most grateful. This is amply demonstrated by the good turn out at our 37th Anniversary Celebration and District Assembly. Without your support, I would not have been able to survive the year. The satisfaction and experience is certainly worth the toil, the sweat, or even the pain. I greatly treasure this year of Honouring Rotary together with you all with Faith & Enthusiasm.

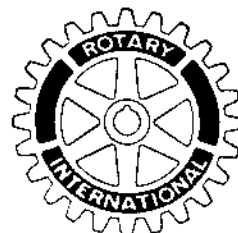

It is a great honour to stand here wearing the Club chain of office that has inscribed on it the names of past presidents who have served this Club with dignity and dedication since 1954.

The Rotary International theme for the year challenges all Rotarians to 'Look beyond yourself'. This means each of us playing our part to ensure the health of the Club and the on-going role of Rotary in the community by looking outwards and beyond.

1991/92 is the 38th year of Rotary Club of HKIE. As such, I have termed this year, the '3 plus 8' year. The Club theme for the year will be based on '3 plus 8', a very lucky number in Chinese numerology.

At the Board meeting last Monday night, the Board endorsed objectives for our Club for the ensuing year. The objectives are also based on the '3 plus 8' theme and with dedicated effort and a little luck we should be able to achieve them.

There are three primary objectives for the Club:

1. Initiate one major project in one of the four avenues of service. RI President Rajah Saboo has set this as a challenge to all clubs.
2. Enhance the Club atmosphere with entertaining weekly meetings that members will want to attend, that attracts new members to Club ranks and lifts overall attendance levels to a minimum of 76 per cent which is twice 38. We can all play our part here by coming to meetings or making a point of making up. Everyone here is already a 100 percenter so far this year.

There are eight supporting objectives for the Club:

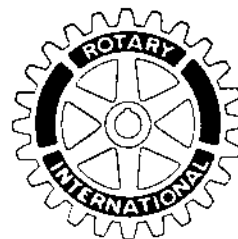

Exerpts from Dr. Dhanarajan's talk

In October 1989 the Open Learning Institute (OLI) admitted its first 4300 students. OLI is different in that:

- \* it does not require students to have previous educational qualifications,
  - \* it sends material to students for study
  - \* students have flexibility in pacing their graduation
  - \* its staff acts more as managers of learning and less and speakers, yet students have personal tutors
  - \* it attempts at being self-financing
- In its four semesters so far OLI
- \* has increased student intake rate to about 30-40%, offering to 17,000 students 31,000 course places and saw an acceptance of 19,000.
  - \* has by the 4th semester increased the courses offered to 19, managed by 30 full time academic staff and 800 part time tutors.
  - \* has drawn up the curricula and syllabi of courses leading up to 23 degree programs.
  - \* has a staff student ratio of 1 : 100, with its student profile roughly similar to the demographic make up of the general populace.
  - \* decreased government subvention from 80% in 1989 to 15-20% in 1991.

Looking ahead, OLI

- \* would touch 24,000 students by its fifth semester.
- \* in the same semester provides a course of first preference to 18,000 people.
- \* will start registering students in 2 courses in Chinese to which response has been overwhelming, paving the way for a Chinese Language BA program.
- \* has endorsed a 5-year plan and will outline one up to the year 2000, looking to
  - launch a major initiative in the non and subdegree programs in 1992 and offer courses leading up to postgraduate degrees in 1993

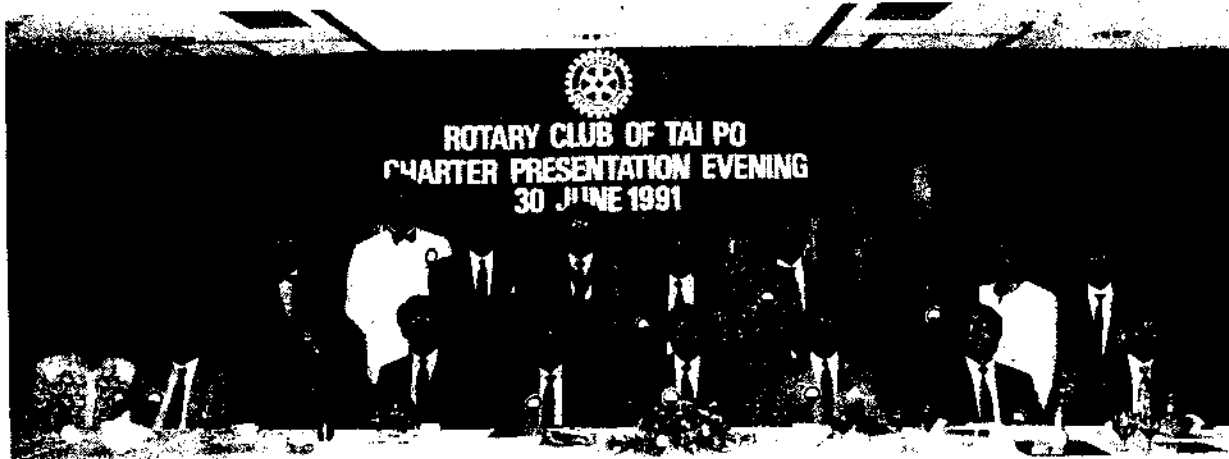

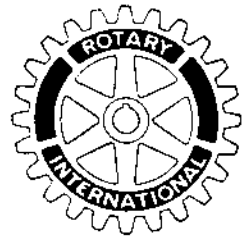

## ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT MAKE-UP IN ROTARY – PDG Peter Hall

Last week IPP Y.K. Cheng spoke about regular attendance.

To-day, I wish to touch on how to make-up attendance when you are absent from your own club.

Our club's regular meeting is Wednesday from 1 to 2 p.m. If you know you must miss the regular meeting to-day, you may make-up this meeting beforehand. (As much as a week in advance, i.e. from 2 p.m. on the preceding Wednesday until 1 p.m. to-day)

Likewise, you can make up to-day's meeting during the following week (i.e., from 2 p.m. to-day up to 1 p.m. on the coming Wednesday.)

On occasions, Rotarians who are travelling long distance find it necessary to miss 2 regular meetings in a row. These, too, can be make-up within a 20-day period.

For example, if you know that you must miss the meeting on 2 Wednesdays you can attend the regular 1 p.m. meeting on the previous week, then you can attend an evening meeting on that same day for a make-up. This will make up the first absence. The 2nd absence can be make-up at a breakfast meeting on the third Wednesday.

Unfortunately, we have no breakfast meetings in Hong Kong yet. However there are legitimate excuses, for example, when a member reaches 65 years old (and having been a member in one or more Rotary clubs for 20 years, and or reaching the age of 70 and having 15 years Rotary membership) he is exempted to observe the attendance rule.

Also, when his absence is caused by protracted ill health or impairment or by stay of more than 2 weeks in a country in which Rotary clubs do not exist (i.e. he is physically unable to attend a regular meeting) and the board approves his absence, in which case his absence shall not be computed in the club's attendance record.

When you are attending any of the following functions, you are automatically credited with make-up attendance:

- R.I. Convention
- District or Regional Conference
- District Assembly
- President-Elect Training Seminar
- Interact or Rotaract club's meeting
- Intercity Meeting and/or Provisional RC meetings

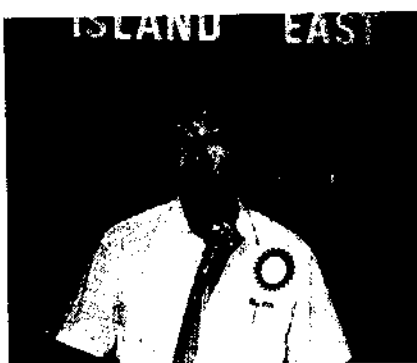



Finally Mr McGregor told us of his background and suitability as a legco member. He had spent 22 years in Government in the Trade and Industry and Customs branches where he had had extensive dealings world-wide and with China. After that 13 years had been spent as Director of the Hong Kong General Chamber during which he had enhanced its reputation, secured its financial position and again he had many contacts with China including leading delegations there. Finally he had spent 3 years in legco where he felt he had dealt fairly and well with all matters. He was definitely not anti-China as some had suggested but he was prepared to criticize China if what they were proposing was against the interests of Hong Kong.

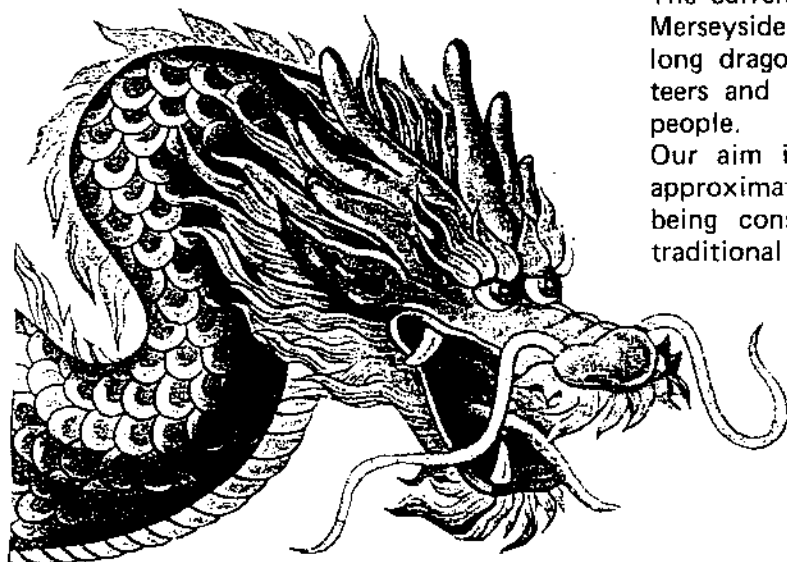

### **GUINNESS RECORDS ATTEMPT – "LONGEST DANCING DRAGON"**

In August 1991, Hong Kong will become the centre of international focus when it holds the 3rd International Abilympics. As more than 2,000 delegates from over 80 countries around the world gather to participate in an array of skills contests, conference, exhibits and various programmes, they will also be invited to avail themselves with all the determined efforts in an attempt at the Guinness Records of the "World's Longest Dancing Dragon".



The current title is being held at St. Helens, Merseyside in July 1989. It was a 985-foot long dragon created by children and volunteers and was then brought to life by 500 people.

Our aim is a 3,000 ft. long Dragon with approximately 1,000 dancers. The dragon is being constructed and ornamented in the traditional ceremonial fashion which signifies prosperity and luck. It will be staged in the evening of Aug. 11 and the local major television station will be covering the program live. Duration of the evening's program will be approximately two hours long and will be presented by a potpourri of local mega movie stars and singers.

The incomparable Mr. Jackie Chan will lead the dragon with the dragon pearl in the best Chinese Martial Arts tradition.

This Record Breaker will be a commemoration of a decade's efforts in the rehabilitation field when people from all over the world, with or without disabilities, gather to bring the Dragon to life.

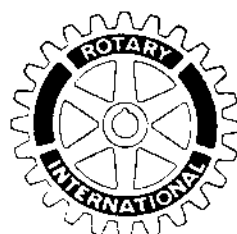

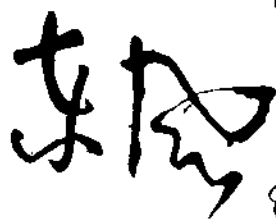

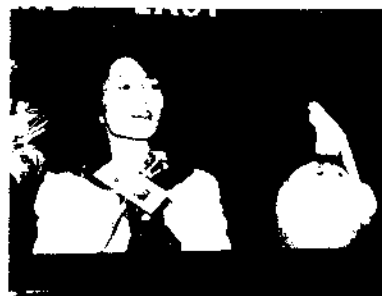

**"C" – Classification**

It is essential that every Rotarian understands the principle of membership by Classification as established by Paul Harris. These principles are to:

1. provide an inclusive rather than an exclusive membership, embracing all services to society;
2. broaden the member's acquaintance with the accomplishments and problems of other occupations;
3. develop fellowship based on diversity instead of similarity of interest;
4. obviate business and professional jealousies;
5. encourage mutual helpfulness; and
6. stimulate pride in the dignity of one's occupation.

So, the function of classification differs from that of the Membership Development and Membership committees. The former seeks out new members of unfilled classifications; the latter judges the qualifications of proposed members from the personal side; but the classification committee concerns itself with their eligibility from the standpoint of their proposed classifications.

Recent changes effected by the 1989 Council on Legislation have expanded the classification system, enabling us now to "loan" members a classification based on either their individual professional activity in a firm, or the business of their employer.

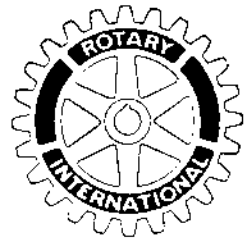

Private Banking



It is my pleasure to address you on the topic of private banking for my classification talk. Or in another words, allowing me to do some free advertisement for the Swiss Bank Corporation.

The Swiss Bank Corporation was established in 1872 in Switzerland. World-wide expansion started in 1898 when we opened our London office. Now, Swiss Bank Corporation has presence in more than 37 countries.

One of my roles is the marketing manager for the bank. The marketing planning phase starts with information gathering and I am responsible for collecting, updating and interpreting market information related to the bank. This year, we are installing a large database for Swiss Bank Corporation worldwide so we can have real time information sharing. Based on the market information, I have to work out a marketing plan for the Hong Kong branch.

I also have to take care of my clients as an account officer. This is when I play the role of a private banker. The term private banking has become popular only in the last 10 years or so, but actually, private banking started in Switzerland more than a hundred years ago. By definition, private banking is to provide tailor-made banking services to high net work individuals, ie those liquid assets of US\$ 1 million or more.

What we call tailor-made banking services are actually a combination of the different banking products from the very simple time deposits to stock, bond, options and futures trading to investment advisory and trust services.

An important aspect of Swiss private banking is Swiss Banking Secrecy and a private banker needs to be very tight-lipped. Swiss private bankers take this a step further. Swiss account information is never revealed except when a criminal case is involved as determined by the Swiss Court. As an example, governments, including the Swiss government, cannot obtain information from the bank if the account is booked in Switzerland. As a contrast, Hong Kong government can get information from a Hong Kong account anytime it wishes.

To conclude this classification talk, let me try a last effort for a sales pitch. If you are looking for a private bankers, the best thing of course, is to call me. And if not, make sure you look into the security of the bank so you would not need to protest in front of the governor's house. Your private banker should be one who is able to deliver timely, efficient and professional services. And the investment recommendations you get should be backed up by quality research.

**ROTARY INFORMATION**

IPP YK continued last week with the letter C, posing and answering questions on classification:

- Q. A member has proposed the head of his service department as an additional active member. Should the two classifications be the same?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Can a member's title or executive position be used to describe that individual's classification?
- A. No. A classification must describe the principal and recognized activity of the institution or firm with which the member is connected or that which covers the member's principal and recognized business or professional activity.
- Q. Are divisions of a firm considered eligible for separate classifications?
- A. Yes, if the division is sufficiently independent to determine generally its own policies, and provided its activities constitute a complete service to the community — one that is recognized as a separate service.
- Q. A candidate for membership in our club is a chemist in a plastics manufacturing firm. Is it true that we can now loan him a "chemistry" classification instead of "plastics manufacturing?"
- A. Yes, the 1989 Council on Legislation amended the classification section of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution to enable the classification of a Rotarian who is not self-employed to reflect either the business of the individual's employer or the work that individual does for the employer.
- Q. We have heard 'senior active' referred to as a classification. Also 'past service.' Is this correct?
- A. No. 'Senior active' and 'past service' are kinds of membership — not classifications.
- Q. Should our roster of filled and unfilled classifications include specialties in medicine, dentistry, and law?
- A. Yes, if the practices of these professions are recognized as specialized in your community.

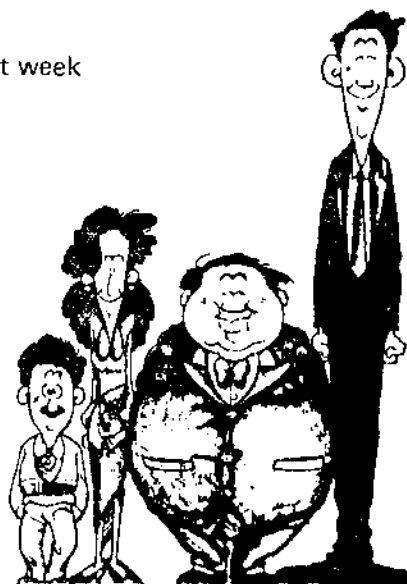

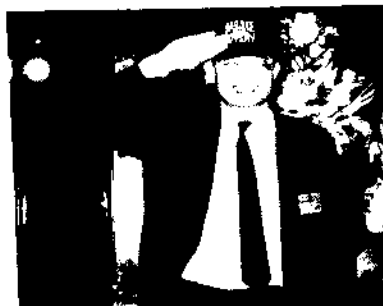

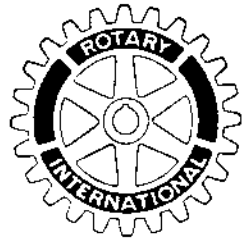

#### SHIPPING AGENCIES

A ship requires an agent at each port of call to handle and attend the vessel. In each port of any importance at all there will be a number of companies offering such services for a agency fee.

Shipping covers a very wide field but can basically be subdivided into tramp or bulk shipping and liner shipping.

A trumper is a cargo ship that does not travel a regular route carrying a limited number of commodities, most often in bulk, from a load port to a limited number of discharge ports. The ship trades wherever there is cargo on offer.

Liner ships are ships that operate in accordance with a pre-determined schedule on a fixed route. Today most liner cargo is carried in containers and all container ships one sees coming in and out of Hong Kong are on a fixed schedule. In the liner trade the agency is usually of a continuing nature with a formal agency agreement lasting for a year or more and the agent is charged with a wide range of duties.

Perhaps the most important function of an agent is to get the ship turned round in the least possible time at the lowest cost.

The art of being a ships agent lies partly in a personal ability to remain cool under pressure and on good terms with a wide variety of men (from irascible Master to a weary stevedore). A good agent will always be thinking several steps ahead in order to make his preparations.

Liner companies depend heavily upon canvassing by the local agent to secure a good share of the cargo available on a particular trade route, and such sales activities are rewarded by a commission on a freight on the cargo handled at the port concerned.

As a liner shipping agent collects freights on behalf of the shipowner, he has to be trustworthy and usually a good relationship is built up between agent and principal over a period. But when an agent represents a tramp vessel it is unusual that he collects freights so all he incurs expenses, in that case he has to make sure that the principal he deals with is trustworthy.

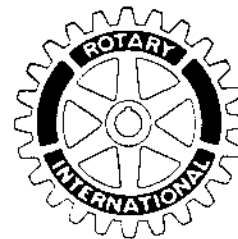

Each year, a large number of people meet with accidents resulting in injuries. Some of them become disabled and may no longer be able to keep their former jobs. There are also people who have been born with physical deformities or mental deficiencies, or have become disabled because during their early childhood there was no effective treatment for certain disabled diseases such as polio.

Unless disabled persons are given the opportunity to realize their economic potential, all the good efforts of rehabilitation work which has been geared to restoring the economic usefulness of the disabled persons would be wasted.

To meet this end, the Labour Department has set up the Selective Placement Division.

It offers opportunities to the disabled to lead a normal working life. Helping the disabled persons to find the right job is what the "selectivity" of the service is about.

Employers generally have been under the impression that disabled persons are only capable of doing menial jobs. This is simply not true any more. The advances in recent years in the various rehabilitation disciplines have all helped to widen the range of occupations which disabled persons are capable of taking up.

To give one example, a blind person can now be engaged in work which required a substantial amount of reading with the help of an electronic device called "Opticon". Many past assumptions that particular types of disabilities would limit a person to certain occupations are no longer valid.

The Selective Placement Division, or SPD for short, was set up in July 1980 to take over from the Social Welfare Department the responsibility for placing the blind, the deaf and the physically handicapped in open employment. In July 1954, the Division extended its services to the mentally handicapped and

the ex-mentally ill. The transfer also conveyed the message to the public that employment of the disabled was ability-related and not welfare-related. Now the SPD provides free placement service to job-seekers of these five disability groups.

A disabled person who registers with the SPD will be given an in-depth interview with a placement officer who will find out the client's educational or training background, working experiences, aptitudes and aspirations. The client will also be asked to take a simple trade test using the Valpar Component Work Sample Series which is a vocational assessment system that enables the placement officer to assess the client's residual abilities more accurately.

A placement officer will study the job description as well as the requirement of a job. If necessary, job evaluation visits to employers who have vacancies to fill will be conducted.

The fourth step is to bring the job-seekers and the prospective employer together in the selection interview. To provide psychological support the placement officer will accompany the job-seeker to the interview.

For a period of about three months after the beginning of employment, the officer will periodically telephone or visit the worker at the workplace to ensure that he is settling down well in the job.

In closing, let me stress that employment for the disabled is not an act of charity, but is an act of good fellowship and a valuable contribution towards our community. Although for most people, work is a means of gaining economic independence, the effect of work on a disabled person's life goes far beyond this. Having a job takes on a very special meaning — it is a way to meaningful participation, financial independence, self-respect and dignity.

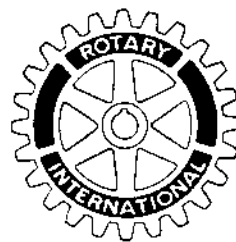

#### IT WEEK

Ten months after assuming the position of General Manager of Hong Kong Information Technology Week Ltd, I am still frequently asked, in relation to ITWeek, "What is IT." There must be some precise definition, but my own inexpert version would go something like this: The science of electronically collecting, storing and processing data to produce useful information. Now that is a very fuzzy definition and has at least one significant fault. Information technology existed long before electronics or computing. It might be said to have begun when man first learned to write.

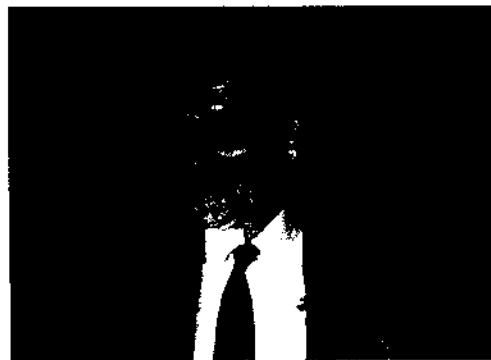
The application of electronics caused this ancient technology to make far greater progress in the past 40 years than in the whole of previous history. It has led us to become reliant upon IT in almost every aspect of our daily lives. If IT suddenly ceased to exist, we should find ourselves instantly unable to cope. In general, though, we learn to accept IT without giving it much thought. And that is where ITWeek comes in.

ITWeek is a program of information technology events offering something of interest to every member of the community. I rather like the concept of its being a festival of IT, because that implies that, like an important arts festival, it covers a wide range of related fields of endeavour, and not only has serious intent but is also fun.

The aim of ITWeek is to involve every member of our community in the realisation that information technology will play an increasingly important role in our lives. IT is already bringing us many benefits in the form of increased efficiency and the elimination of time-consuming manual procedures. It helps us to do far more in the same time than we did five, let alone ten or twenty years ago, and time is one of the most expensive commodities in which we all deal.

ITWeek brings together many conferences, exhibitions, community events and special social attractions.

Most of the exhibitions and conferences are independently organised and funded, but the operating company, Hong Kong Information Technology Week Ltd, bears full responsibility for the special attractions and community events.

The Grand Opening, which will take place at the Convention Centre on Sunday 29th September, is being sponsored this year by AT&T Hong Kong Ltd. The opening ceremony itself will be performed by the Hon Allen Lee, Senior Member of the Legislative Council. This is by invitation and very much the same principles and restrictions apply to the Cocktail Party, though like us, the sponsor, Intel Semiconductor Ltd, would like to invite you all.

There is no such problem with the Gala Ball at the Hotel Conrad on Saturday 5th September, beyond the first-come, first-served rule, since you have to pay for your own tickets!!

There are four main community events this year and HKITWL has full responsibility for three of these.

The Micromouse '91 World Championships, involving teams from around the world is two days of fun based on robotics and artificial intelligence.

IT in Government is an exhibition showing how the Hong Kong Government is using information technology in the public interest.

It is a principle of ITWeek that each year there should be at least one event dedicated to exploring ways in which IT may help the handicapped or disabled and this years event is IT for the Deaf.

IT for the Deaf will explore in exhibitions at the Convention Centre and City Plaza ways in which modern technology is being used to help the deaf overcome their problems of communication. IT for the Deaf will also indicate new areas for research and associated with it will be a symposium on the more general theme of IT and the handicapped.

Last year's IT for the Visually Disabled provided the impetus for the award-winning daily braille edition of the South China Morning Post. We already have several spin-off projects from IT for the Deaf that show considerable promise. They include a scheme to help deaf people purchase fax machines so that they can communicate more easily over the telephone.

These spin-off projects will be quite independent of ITWeek and I hope we shall be able to find sponsors to ensure their success. If we do, all the effort put into ITWeek as a whole will have been more than worthwhile for everybody involved.

#### ROTARY INFORMATION

In the absence of IPP YK, Uncle Peter talked about Membership Growth in our Club.

There was only one Rotarian who was not proposed for membership and that was founder Paul Harris.

One of the great privileges you have as a member of our Rotary club is the right to propose a new member.

Our club, like most clubs, must grow in membership by at least ten percent annually to offset normal attrition. Thus, real growth requires a continuous, concerted effort on the part of all our members.

The size of our club is limited only by the number of people in our community who would make good Rotarians and for whom there are valid classifications available.

It is the responsibility of every Rotarian to propose new members. Someone shared Rotary with you; now it is your turn to share Rotary with others.

The more people who come into Rotary, gleaning a little of its purpose and sensing something of its vision, the greater will be the gain to Rotary and to society.

The R.I. theme this year "LOOK BEYOND YOURSELF" means "Unselfishness" so it is the right time to response to this theme and start to look for potential candidates to-day for our internal extension.

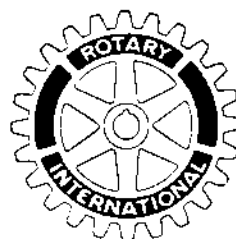

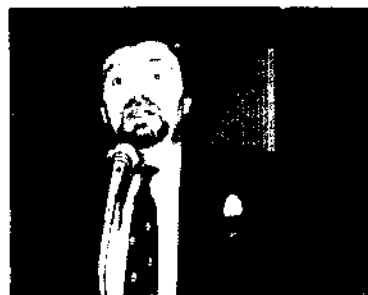

Metro Broadcasting



Mr Gautier is the Deputy General Manager of the newly established Metro Broadcasting. This has recently started broadcasting in competition with Commercial Radio and RTHK. For the size of Hong Kong it is apparently quite surprising that for the past 30 years there has been a monopoly in commercial radio since this is quite out of line with the practice overseas in for example Australia or the US. The opening up of broadcasting in this way is in line with the dramatic developments in electronic media in Hong Kong.

Metro Broadcasting is a consortium made up of the local Hutchison Group, the Dixon Poon Group and the Golden Harvest Group, plus overseas companies who have a depth of experience in radio broadcasting.

When doing initial audience research Metro found that there was a need to be different from the present broadcasting channels which provide broad coverage and include something for everyone during the day. By contrast Metro found a need for news, pop music and easy listening. Accordingly they have 3 channels dedicated to these.

Metro News broadcasts on 1044AM and provides continuous news in English. The news is heavily slanted to business and also aims to provide quick analysis of world events. (Editors note: one wonders where all the news is going to come from to keep a newscaster talking for 24 hours a day! Perhaps our new politicians about whom we are going to hear this week will produce enough "hot air" to satisfy the demand).

FM Select broadcasts on 104FM and is aimed at adults over 25. It provides continuous light music from the sixties to eighties and is bi-lingual.

Finally Hit Radio broadcasts on 99.7FM and provides continuous current pop music for the 12 to 25 year olds, the music being a mixture of cantonese pop and world pop. (Editors note: thank God there is only one channel of this!).

Mr Gautier was thanked for his interesting talk by our own advertising tycoon Rtn Ben who was able to name the precise day that commercial radio started in Hong Kong in response to Mr Gautier's suggestion that the local advertising community did not seem to be very aware of its existence.

**ROTARY INFORMATION**

IPP YK talked to us this week about the post of District Governor. Our District Governor this year is Andres (Andy) L. Guillen.

He explained the main requirements as being someone who has fulfilled a full term as a President of a club and was a rotarian of good standing for a minimum of 7 years.

His function is to run the affairs of a District for a year and to resolve any disputes or the like.

He also writes a monthly letter to all Presidents and Secretaries of Clubs in his District. By good chance this months letter was received by the Editor this week and so a copy is reproduced below.

**DISTRICT GOVERNORS LETTER FOR AUGUST**

Rotary growth is a never ending search by Rotarians for the perfect Rotarian: It is a quest for that one additional member who best exemplifies the virtue of "service above self".

Before this decade is over, we will have found our two millionth Rotarian, thereby extending the reach of our membership to literally tens of millions of people around the world who need our help.

As responsible club officers, and dedicated Rotarians, you will have the pleasant task of enlarging the membership of your club during your year of office. This internal extension will expand our capacity to serve not only in Hong Kong and Macau but also overseas.

Our district goal for Rotary growth this year is clear and well defined; by 30th June 1992 we should have at least 1,720 Rotarians in our district. In addition, we seek the formation of a breakfast club to provide fellowship and service opportunities for those potential Rotarians who may find a lunch or evening venue a problem for attendance.

The challenge that Faces all of you then, is to ensure that we grow by a net 10% as compared to 3 % last year. A very capable Rotarian, DGN Dom Vessigault will be in charge of coordinating this effort, as District Chairman for Membership Development. Please use this committee's resources.

The world wide average growth rate for "internal extension" — the acquisition of new members by existing clubs — has recently been 0.25% per year. This means it takes a club four years to increase its membership by one. (source: Plenary Presentation, International Assembly, 1991, Appendix 14).

Most of Rotary's growth then is due to "external extension" — the formation of new Rotary clubs. For the last five years. Rotary has averaged 779 new clubs per year or 1 new club every 11 hours.

The aim in our district is for expansion through growth in existing clubs by an influx of good, quality members.

But no one will join a club that is not worth joining. As club leaders therefore, please encourage all members to be true to their membership. For in so doing, you will ensure a never ending supply of dedicated Rotarians.

I leave you with this challenge and wish you much success. — Andres L. Guillen, Governor

## POLIO PLUS UPDATE

In April the trustees approved grants of almost US\$23 million to 30 countries around the world, including a first – a grant of US\$427,000 to provide vaccine to Romania. Total commitments are now US\$172,744,188, and 97 countries have benefitted.

With the latest grants to Latin American countries it is now expected that Latin America will be certified 'polio-free' by 1996

Some questions and answers:

Q. What is done with the money contributed to PolioPlus?

A. It is used to buy vaccine and to support social mobilization and disease surveillance activities by Rotarians. Contributions also provided some initial support to the World Health Organization for developing polio eradication strategies and plans. The income earned by the PolioPlus Fund pays the costs of PolioPlus general administration, fund development and program operations. The remainder of the earned income, currently estimated to amount to \$80 million through 1997, is available for additional vaccine, mobilization and surveillance.

Q. What is the cost of polio vaccine?

A. UNICEF buys the vaccine and ensures its air transport to the governments of the countries which manage the PolioPlus program. Rotary is billed later for the cost of the vaccine and shipment. In 1991 this is estimated at about 7.2 cents per dose. Due primarily to increasing costs from the manufacturers, this figure has risen from around 5 cents two years ago. For comparison, the U.S. government pays close to \$2 per dose for the same vaccine, used in its public health programs, and the private physician may pay about \$8.

Q. Who does Rotary work with in PolioPlus?

A. Basically Rotary is assisting 97 governments to eradicate polio. We are part of a global network, including WHO and UNICEF, several donor governments, and a variety of non-governmental organizations. We work together at the international, regional and national levels to help the governments deliver their programs. WHO provides the technical leadership; UNICEF provides vaccine and ensures it is available in a timely fashion and Rotarians work in the communities to encourage mothers to bring their children for immunization.

Q. Are we making any impact?

A. Decidedly so. The world would not have considered the possibility of eradicating polio if it had not been for the PolioPlus Campaign. The eradication program would not be moving nearly as quickly without the effort of thousands of Rotarians who have proved they can stimulate demand for immunization and provide useful assistance in national planning and advocacy. The good work of these Rotarians is strengthening the public image of Rotary in many countries and thereby directly stimulating Rotary extension and growth.

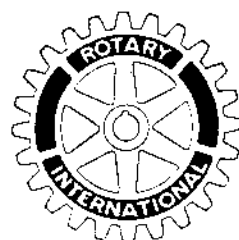

Legco Elections



David Bottomly is a Director of Asian Commercial Research, a company which has been conducting opinion polls for the SCMP and some of the TV stations. Their most recent poll was conducted over the period 14-21 Aug with a sample of 1826 people and so is very current. The result of the next poll however cannot be seen until next Sunday's SCMP.

One very interesting result which his researches have shown is a sudden and quite dramatic drop in the Governments popularity. For years the majority of people were satisfied but in the last few months, and particularly during August, the majority felt the Government was not doing a good job.

He explained that his job as a researcher was not to speculate but his polls did show what the facts were. The main reasons seem to be the handling of the BCC affair with 37% of the population positively worried about cash in the bank, the airport scheme and its inflationary effects (people now expect inflation to be steady at 14%!!), and boat people with a sizeable majority favouring their immediate repatriation. Also he produced what seemed a surprising statistic to the Editor that a majority do not expect the one-country two-systems will be achieved in practice.

As to his predictions for the Direct Elections to Legco there has been a very gradual increase in interest with the number who will vote increasing over the last few months from 33% to about 40% now. Always these predictions are a bit on the high side since a significant number of people think they have a right to vote but have not registered. Something just under 40% looks the most likely which is way out of line with some experts predictions of 70%.

His results show that the United Democrats look set to get 9 and perhaps 10 seats, the Associated Democrats 1, Meeting Point 1 and 1 possible, the Liberal Democratic Foundation 1 plus 1 possible, and the others 3 seats. So it seems that Martin Lee's group will hold a sizeable block of seats.

Secretary Warren thanked our speaker for a very interesting talk.

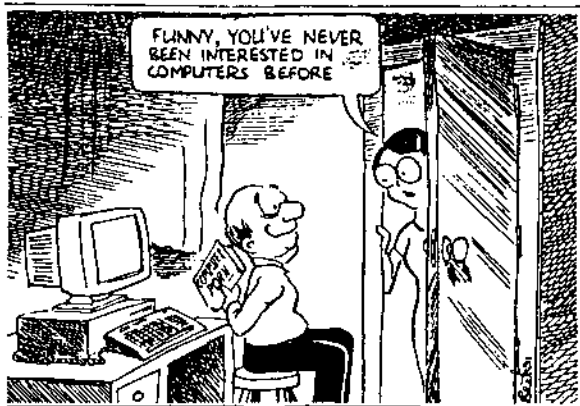
## PDG UNCLE JOHN

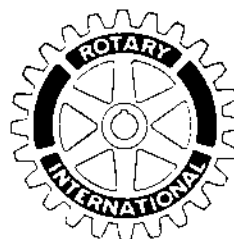

#### Boy Scout Jamboree



Mr Garrison Lee is the Assistant Chief Scout of Hong Kong and led the Hong Kong contingent to the recent World Jamboree held in South Korea early in August, the theme for which was "Many lands, one world", an excellent theme and one similar to our own ideals.

The Scout movement holds a World Jamboree about once every four years and the recent one is the 17th, the first being held in England in 1920. In introducing Mr Lee Rtn David Waring had reminisced that he had taken part in a World Jamboree in America and this was identified as Idaho in 1967.

Scouts from 135 countries were represented at the Jamboree with a total of 19830 scouts and their leaders present. A camp to hold this many must of necessity be large and a suitable site was found in one of Korea's national parks. Korea naturally had the largest contingent but other countries with large numbers were the UK with 1391 members and the USA with 997 members. The Hong Kong contingent whilst not one of the larger was composed of 136 members which represented a significant presence.

Mr Lee was able to show us the splendid setting and many of the activities which included rock climbing and a rather curious survival games which seemed to involve the scout becoming covered in mud. Apparently scouts are not called Boy Scouts any more since there are a lot of girls and for some reason most of the photos seemed to feature girls rather than boys, no doubt they were more photogenic.

One interesting feature was the holding of friendship dinners where scouts from one country invite scouts from other countries to a meal typical of their own country. The Hong Kong leaders held a reception for other leaders featuring typical Chinese food and included a game of trying to pick up marbles with chopsticks, anyone who succeeded being immediately awarded a Diploma in Chopstick Management.

The next World Jamboree will be in four years time in Holland.

Our Speaker was thanked by our own most senior scout PDG Peter. He explained how apt it was to have such a speaker during Youth Activities month. He had sadly missed this Jamboree because of Rotary activities. He thanked Mr Lee for giving us such a clear picture of a World Jamboree.

## ROTARY INFORMATION

IPP YK talked to us this week about the job of Sergeant-at-Arms.

The function of the Sergeant-at-arms (SAA) is to help maintain an orderly, dignified, and effective Rotary club meeting, one that will make the right kind of impression on club visitors and guests. He should be constantly on the alert to prevent any occurrence that might detract from the dignity and prestige associated with Rotary clubs.

Specifically, his function is to handle the physical preparations for and the mechanical part of a meeting, and, unobtrusively, to guide its general conduct.

The SAA plays an important part in the total success of each weekly meeting. Because of the duties he performs, the club president is free to concentrate on conducting the meeting. The manner in which he carries out his duties can directly influence a club's attendance record.

## A DREAM BECAME A REALITY

These were Rtn Lesley's opening words in telling us about the reestablishment of Rotary in Eastern Europe and his visit to the Rotary Club of Budapest in Hungary.

On 25th June 1989, then R.I. President Royce Abbey presented the Charter to the Rotary Club of Budapest, Hungary in a glittering affair, attended by over 600 Rotarians, and VIP guests.

The Rotary Club of Budapest is the first post W.W.II Rotary Club to be reestablished in the former Iron Curtain, Russian satellite countries. I emphasize REESTABLISH as the original club was chartered on 30 October 1925 and fifteen more clubs sprung up in Hungary before the winds of war blew away all the clubs and the communist regime made it impossible to operate after 1948.

Being a Hungarian by birth I followed the recent developments with interest and during my recent visit to Europe I made a point of visiting the Club. The club is doing well.

It meets every Tuesday evening at 6 pm in a charming restaurant, in the residential area of the city. One of the rooms is dedicated to the club, there are permanent glass display cases on the walls to display Rotary related information, banners and other souvenirs.

One of their projects involved a Rotary Club of Nigeria, the overseas club paid for the air fare of a young teenager who required special medical treatment and the Budapest Club arranged the rest through their contacts.

They receive a lot of visitors. The day when I was there they welcomed visiting Rotarians from England, Germany, Hong Kong, Australia and Japan. The fellowship left something to be desired, we all ended up sitting together, not really interacting with the locals. Food was so-so.

People I talked to were very enthusiastic about the prospects of Rotary in Hungary. There is a need for lot of community related projects to fill the vacuum, to compensate for some of the omissions of the past.

With our Board's approval, I will keep the contact and explore the possibilities of a future project, possibly a project along the lines of World Community Service.

Patrick told us the story of the unfortunate speaker who just before he stood up to give a talk, happened to look down and found that his flies were open. It was at that point we all looked to Uncle Peter at the far end of the top table to see if he was holding onto the tablecloth to keep it in place but fortunately Patrick did not suffer that fate.

Dale Carnegie began his courses in 1912 in New York. His well known book entitled "How to win friends and influence people" was published in 1936. What Dale Carnegie tries to differentiate between is "education" and "training".

Education is concerned with the dissemination of information whilst training is aimed at achieving a behavioral change. Therefore when they are called in to advise a Company they aim to try to build up the communication and management skills of the employees by training.

Apparently all of us have "comfort zones" where we are at ease and can perform well. Thus one person might be comfortable at public speaking whilst for another this would be outside the comfort zone and that other person would then by definition feel uncomfortable and not be able to give of his best when speaking. What the Dale Carnegie organisation try to do is to enlarge the comfort zones of people. They believe in people development and help people therefore to develop to their potential.

Pres Warren thanked Rtn Patrick for his rousing address.

### **ROTARY INFORMATION**

IPP YK was back in action again after a week off during the DG visit. His talk was in two parts.

#### **1. 75-Second Rotary Foundation**

For the months of October & November, my first part will always be "something" on Rotary Foundation. Why "75"? Short enough that you don't get sick and bored with Rotary Foundation, but long enough to get across some salient points. 1991 is the 75th Anniversary of the Foundation; so we want to give it a bigger push, and tell you more about the good things it does – Polio Plus, Matching Grant, Scholars, 3H programs, etc. just to name a few. It is a very "sturdy" Foundation as the title of one video suggests. The reason for our promoting it is not because it is running short of money. I'll give you more info next week.

#### **2. Vocational Service Month**

Coming back to October as we are now in October. It is designated by R.I. as Vocational Service month.

Rotarians and Rotary clubs can make an important contribution to Vocational Service by encouraging vocational excellence and the practice of high ethical standards in all occupation. This all tie in with the Object of Rotary especially the Second Object which reads:

"Second High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as an opportunity to serve society."

Vocational awareness is, in many ways, the key to performing all types of Vocational Service. Informed Rotarians can provide more constructive career guidance and deal more effectively with problems that occur in the workplace. And with full knowledge of the challenges and opportunities offered by various occupations, Rotarians can better fulfill one of the basic tenets of Vocational Service: recognizing the worthiness to society of all useful occupations – from dishwasher to company president.

So what do we do:

1. Schedule classification talks;
2. Plan Vocational visits;
3. Organise Discussion groups;
4. Vocational Awards.

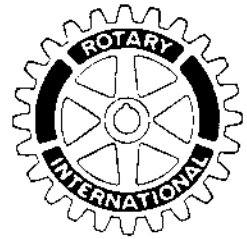

The three community leaders include our own past president, successful industrialist, Mr. James Wu Man-hon.

PP Jimmy, Chairman and Managing Director of Weatherite Industries Ltd. until his recent retirement, has been a major driving force behind the industrial development of Hong Kong. Currently, he is the Chairman of Hopewell Holdings Ltd.

In addition to making important contributions to the local industry, he also actively participated in public services. From 1968 to 1972, he was a member of the Urban Council and in 1972, he was appointed to the Legislative Council where he served until 1979. He is the Chairman of the Government's Metrication Committee.

PP Jimmy served the Hong Kong Polytechnic with dedication and distinction over the years, first as a member of its Planning Committee from its formation in 1969, and later following the inception of the Polytechnic in 1972, as its Deputy Chairman of Council from 1972 until his retirement in 1981.

He was awarded an OBE in 1973. Congratulations Jimmy.

We reject them because they demean our vocation, alienate business contacts and destroy respect for the workplace, an article of faith for Rotarians.

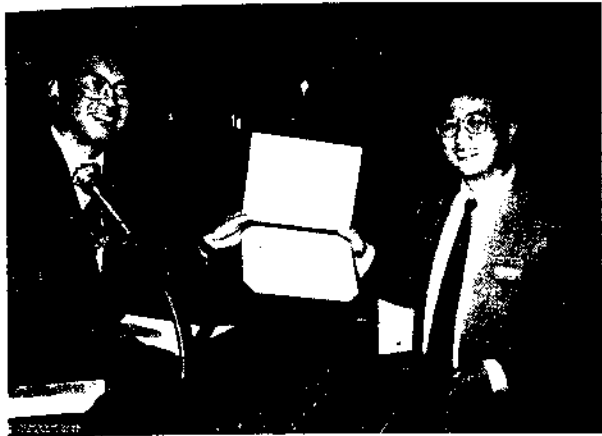

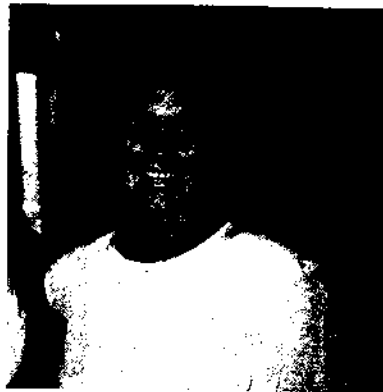

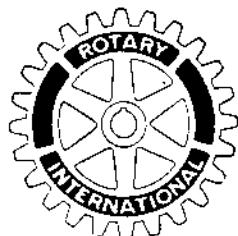

#### THE WEEK BEFORE LAST

Darrel Metzger

Ocean Park



In introducing Mr Metzger, Rtn David explained that he was the General Manager of Ocean Park having previously worked in Disney theme parks in Tokyo and Los Angeles. Also he had been involved in the organisation of the LA Olympics. He brings good experience to Ocean Park therefore.

Mr Metzger gave us first of all a brief history of Ocean Park. It was started in 1977 with money from the Jockey Club. In the early years it need subsidy from the Jockey Club but by 1984 it showed a profit and has been in profit ever since. In 1987 it became an independent statutory body and so has to generate its own surplus for reinvestment. Since then it has achieved 7-8% growth in visitors per year and hopes to continue that.

Ocean Park has just announced a plan for future investment of \$600 million on top of the \$700 which has been invested in the last 14 years. He explained that they now had a 5-year plan for marketing, operating and developing the Park. This will increase visitors from the current 2.4 million per year to 4 million, and Ocean Park should then be one of the major theme parks in the world.

The aim is to develop themed areas and current plan for the next five years is:

1. the Atoll reef is being improved and its associated area developed,
2. a family area to be developed with a live steam train and educational facilities,
3. New thrill rides which Mr Metzger said were for teenagers,
4. the Middle Kingdom will need a facelift, and will be given a simulating theatre with moving seats to give realism - probably in the form of a flight through the 2000 years of Chinese history,
5. an area simulating Antarctica which real snow and a marine attractions area for water skiing events.

They aim to provide a good balance between recreation and education. At the end of a year the whole plan moves forward a year and a new plan for a fifth year is added.

All in all this is a very exciting development in the future of Hong Kong and Mr Metzger was thanked for his very interesting talk by Rtn Stewart.

## DG ANDY'S SPEECH TO CHINESE MAYORS

Several weeks ago we reported that D.G. Andy had talked to a number of Mayors, this is the text of his inspiring speech.

It is the custom in Rotary to begin a speech by naming all the VIP's present.

Tonight we have so many honoured guests that if I have to name all of them before I speak, we will not have time to enjoy our dinner!

Therefore let me begin by calling all of you, especially our official guests from China, "my dear friends".

Let me assure you that you are amongst friends because this is a gathering of people of many nationalities and different professions who are here tonight united by a common bond of fellowship.

This common bond of fellowship is ROTARY.

What is Rotary? To President Jimmy of the Rotary Club of Tolo Harbour it means one year of hard work, because he has been elected President of his club for one year.

To a small child in Central America, Rotary means a polio vaccine that will save him or her from ever suffering the effects of that dreaded disease.

To a student from South Africa, Rotary means not only a one year scholarship to study in Hong Kong, but also the opportunity to promote goodwill between that country and Hong Kong.

To three thousand leprosy patients in Cebu in the Philippines, Rotary means the possibility of moving back into society, not as outcasts to be feared, but as useful members of the community.

To a small neighbourhood in Oakland, California in the United States, Rotary means getting rid of drug dealers from its streets.

Rotarians grouped together in more than 25,000 clubs all over the world have done these things.

You, my friends from China, who work for your own communities as government officials will perhaps think that Rotary is doing the work of governments, which should care for the sick, educate the young provide scholarships for students and make sure there are no drugs or other vices damaging our society.

And you are right. We Rotarians do not pretend to be government officials, or even politicians.

What we are and what we do can best be explained by three simple words: "SERVICE ABOVE SELF".

When Rotarians see a small gap left undone in any of the communities we serve whether in a rich country like Germany or in a poor country like India, we join hands to fill that gap.

The very first "Gap" to be filled in by Rotary some 86 years ago was to promote the building a public toilet in the Municipal City Hall of Chicago, U.S.A., one of the richest cities in the world.

To Rotarians therefore, "ROTARY" means helping our communities wherever and whenever we can.

If there are floods in China, you as government officials will be there to help your fellow citizens, because it is your duty and because you love your country.

We Rotarians, especially Rotarians from Hong Kong and Macau, will also do our best to join you as you serve the victims of your land.

However small our help, however big the problem, our philosophy is "service above self".

Rotary in Hong Kong and Macau is made up of 34 clubs with almost 1,600 Rotarians.

But there are more than 25,000 other clubs with 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide, who also share this belief in service for the sake of service, forsaking the profit motive.

We have been described as a "Rich Man's Club", because our members are carefully selected from leaders in their particular professions.

There are many Rotarians who are rich and powerful, but that is not where our strength lies.

Our strength comes from the fact that when over one million men and women of many different backgrounds and nationalities are united by a single ideal "service above self", they come a formidable force for good.

I hope that over the next few days as you meet and talk to leaders in Hong Kong and attend the seminars and visits arrange for you, you will remember that many of these persons are probably Rotarians.

You will find more basic facts about Rotary and the good work it does for people around the world in the "information kit" given to you earlier on.

But let me ask each and every one of you to see Rotarians as your friends, as men and women who are guided by friendship, goodwill and a genuine desire to serve their fellow human beings whenever and wherever there is a need.

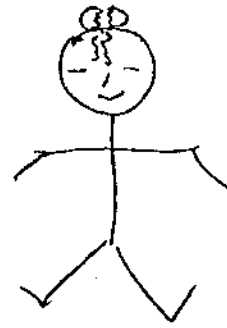

## ROTARY INFORMATION

In the first part of his presentation IPP YK reminded us of the Rotary Foundation Dinner on the 11th Nov. If you get in quick with your US\$1000 you can be a Paul Harris Fellow in time to receive your presentation from MAT Caparas, talk to PP Jack for details. Did we hear of some discount?

Then YK talked about Vocational Service.

One often hears Rotarians saying that Vocational Service is a "dry and dull" subject. In fact, there is considerable scope of service in this avenue of service.

What then is Vocational Service? It is the second of the four Avenues of Service and is an obligation of all Rotarians which, because it is frequently misunderstood, has also been frequently neglected. For many years, Vocational Service was solely a personal responsibility — one that required individual Rotarians to represent their vocations within their clubs and uphold high ethical standards in the workplace. In 1987 the R.I. Board adopted the following statement, which substantially expanded the scope of Vocational Service to require collective club activities as well as the traditional individual commitment:

"R.I.'s new policy on Vocational Service

Vocational Service is the way Rotary fosters and supports the application of the Ideal of Service in pursuit of all vocations.

Inherent in the Vocational Service ideal are:

1. Adherence to, and promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations, including faithfulness and fidelity to employers, employees, and associates, fair treatment of them and of competitors, the public, and all those with whom one has any business or professional relationships;
2. The recognition of the worthiness to society of all useful occupations, not just one's own or those which are pursued by Rotarians;
3. The contribution of one's vocational talents to the problems and needs of society.

Vocational Service is both the responsibility of a Rotary Club and of its members. The role of the club is to implement and encourage the objective by frequent demonstration, by application to its own actions, by example, and by development of projects that help members contribute vocational talents. The role of members is to conduct themselves, their business, and their professions in accordance with Rotary principles and to respond to projects which the club has developed."

This new direction in Vocational Service reflects the growing need for business and professional leaders to tackle new problems in the workplace. Working together, club members can do much to reduce unemployment in the community, provide career guidance for young people, develop training programs that keep pace with technology, and combat drug and alcohol abuse among workers.

In an effort to provide more specific guidelines to the high ethical standards called for in the second part of the Object of Rotary, the 1989 Council on Legislation adopted the following "Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions":

"As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

1. Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
2. Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standard of my community;
3. Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
4. Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
5. Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
7. Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
8. Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship."

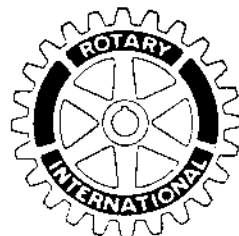

We were told of the sheer size of the production and the magnificence of the production by Debra who is the marketing Manager for the production. She then introduced a short video which illustrated this and thereafter introduced the Maestro who gave us a really interesting insight into the production of grand opera.

For a non-opera buff like your Editor we learned that Aida was written by Verdi for the opening of the Suez canal in 1871. It was first performed in Egypt in the shadow of the real Sphinx, not the massive plastic model produced for this show.

The story of Aida is based on the age-old love triangle, these sort of problems have presumably been around since Adam & Eve ceased to be a two-some.

The production is on a massive scale with a cast of 1250, 1500 costumes, and 5000 props. The stage is 120m wide and 40m deep. Currently there are 800 workmen on the site working around the clock to ensure that everything is ready on time for the opening on Friday 8th Nov. The most incredible statistic is the something like 3000 permits for different aspects have been required from the Urban council.

The Maestro explained that his aim was to use the latest technology to bring the magnificence of this opera to the general public rather than the few who normally have a chance to see opera. Also the intention is that it will be excellent entertainment. This production is on a world tour which has or will take in most of the major cities of the world.

The Maestro hopes his next production will be of a Chinese opera in the Forbidden City in Beijing, if he can ever get the necessary permission from the Chinese Authorities.

Our own self confessed opera buff Dick Lidster thanked both of our speakers for their very interesting presentation and wished them every success in the production.

## ROTARY INFORMATION

In the first part of his presentation IPP YK told us what being a Paul Harris Fellow really means. In the Rotary world people become Paul Harris Fellows every day: Rotarians, their family members, community leaders, world leaders, and friends of Rotary. There is usually a ceremony, a short speech, and sometimes it is important enough to be reported in a local newspaper. From that point on, pin or a brooch is the everyday reminder that the person has joined the ranks of Rotary Foundation supporters. But in a food kitchen in the Philippines that is the only source of nourishment for 800 poor people each day, that pin means a freezer, refrigerator, wood stove and cauldrons. In Jamaica that brooch becomes a tree nursery that annually produces 5,000 seedlings of a variety of fruit, timber and cash-crop trees that increases the family income for 700 farmers. In a Rotary eye camp in India, 100 people are able to have cataract and glaucoma operations. In a Rotary-sponsored orphanage in Betong, Thailand, a Paul Harris Fellow contribution fully supports four children for a year, providing books, fees, food, uniforms, bedding and utensils. In a 3-H project in Mexico, it provides five sewing machines for a women's training centre in a family development project. And in Senegal, it trains 50 nutrition and 50 hygiene and sanitation workers in maintaining the water, agricultural and health resources developed through a 3-H Grant. Each of the more than 340,000 people around the world who are called Paul Harris Fellows represents the Fourth Avenue of Service in action, Rotarians doing good in the world, through their Rotary Foundation.

Then YK told us about China's new Polio Vaccine plant.

Plans to build a state-of-the-art polio vaccine plant in China are proceeding on schedule, though actual production of the vaccine is still five years away.

A US\$15 million PolioPlus award to help complete the vaccine plant was announced by The Rotary Foundation last year. It is part of an overall \$120 million project to give China three new vaccine plants. The two others will produce measles and DPT antigens.

The Chinese government is putting up about \$60 million to erect the buildings which will house the production facilities. Rotary's PolioPlus grant and \$60 million from the World Bank are the hard currencies needed to pay for the professional service of the Dutch contractor, the technical training of Chinese personnel to operate the facility, and the specialized equipment build to exacting specifications in the Netherlands.

Specifications for the polio vaccine plant, to be built in the city of Kunming, are nearing the approval stage. When completed, the plant will more than double China's capacity to produce oral polio vaccine (OPV). Also, the vaccine it produces will be of more reliable quality than the country's existing facility can provide. The manufacturing process will use a new technology only recently approved by the World Health Organization.

### PP "DOCTOR" EDWIN TAO

At a recent Congregation of the Chinese University of Hong Kong, His Excellency the Chancellor Sir David Wilson, presented Edwin Tao with the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws.

The citation makes very interesting reading and an extract is reproduced below.

Dr Edwin H C Tao is typical of industrialists in Hong Kong, who, having come from the mainland, went on to receive their education in the West before launching into successful careers here. And yet Dr Tao is a unique case in terms of his personal achievements and his commitment to the community.

He was born in Beijing, and first went to school there. The Sino-Japanese War soon broke out and he was forced to continue his education in the southern part of China. He went to college, first in Shanghai, at St. John's University, and later in Kunming, at the National Southwest Associated University. While keeping up with his study in engineering, Dr Tao started a humble business, as it were, when he and two other college friends obtained some kind of franchise to supply subtitles for English films at a local cinema in Kunming. The extra income certainly made their life during the war slightly more tolerable. He has, in fact, since kept up his interest in languages.

But before he graduated, the situation further deteriorated and he went on to join the military service and taught in an engineering corp training school. After the war, he went back to college and obtained a degree in engineering from Qinghua University. For his further studies, Dr Tao chose the United States.

Dr Tao is devoted to the achievement of engineering excellence in Hong Kong through close association with tertiary institutions, engineering institutions, government committees and industry in general.

His association with The Chinese University of Hong Kong also dates back several decades, beginning from the early days when New Asia College was still at Farm Road. From 1978 to 1991, he graciously served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the College and had made great contributions to the College's development.

His commitment to education is, in fact, not restricted to Hong Kong. He spent years promoting engineering linkages between Hong Kong and institutions in the United Kingdom and the United States. Currently he is also engaged in drawing up recommendations for accreditation of engineering programmes and curricula for universities in China. He has also served in fields not directly connected with engineering. For instance, he was formerly chairman of the Rotary Club of Hong Kong Island East, Yale Club and the Qinghua Alumni Association, Hong Kong, and a member of the Basic Law Consultative Committee and the Executive Board of the ocean Park Corporation.

Mr Chancellor, may I respectfully present a most successful industrialist and engineer, an able administrator and a selfless educator, Dr Edwin H C Tao, for the conferment of the Degree of Doctors of Laws, honoris causa.

Technology Road Maps for Hong Kong



Robert Woo is the Secretary of a new company called Varsity Resources Co which has been set up in Hong Kong by the tertiary Institution of Hong Kong. The new Company aims to develop high technology for use here. It quickly became apparent therefore to all that he was not talking about the making of maps of the streets of Hong Kong as at least your Editor initially assumed and that instead the Technology Road Maps were of the routes which his Company had developed of possible paths for viable technical opportunities for Hong Kong.

Mr Woo talked initially of the well known problems of Hong Kong of high labour costs, the uncertainties of 1977, the flight of capital and the brain drain. However he expressed his own personal optimism and felt that these problems gave a guide to the way we should proceed. If one looked at what had happened in the last 10 years, the transfer of manufacturing to China had given us the opportunity to generate large amounts of capital which could, with correct investment, enable us to generate our own technology.

At the moment we are an importer of high technology from abroad but for the future we must try to develop our own. Because the Government was unlikely to change its laissy faire policies one had to look elsewhere. The academic institutions were not being used at present and that was the reason for setting up the Company. They could do sponsored research and look for valuable technical opportunities, or in other words provide a Technical Road Map for Hong Kong.

The Institute felt that there were several areas which they had identified as areas which it could be suitable for Hong Kong to explore and these included Information Technology, biotechnology and environmental matters.

The Company had produced a booklet outlining its views and had held a successful seminar with 400 people attending to start to get its message across.

Also they have proposed a scheme for linking all of the doctors and hospitals in Hong Kong using our optical fibre links so that patient information would be available to all at the touch of a button. It was felt Hong Kong was the ideal place to develop this, and whilst useful to Hong Kong, would create much new technology which could valuably be exported as a going concern if once set up here. Also his Company hoped to be successful in a tender to provide environmental Consultancy for the Government.

Mr Woo was thanked for passing on to us his ideas by Rtn Allan.

## ROTARY INFORMATION

### Rotary Peace Programs

Peace is the common goal of all Rotary Foundation programs, and this newest program works directly toward that goal. What began in 1990 as a pilot program called the Rotary Peace Forum was made a regular on-going program of the Foundation and renamed Rotary Peace Programs in 1990 by the Foundation trustees.

Peace Forums have been convened in many parts of the world to focus attention on the resolution of conflict, and will continue to be so presented. In addition to these conferences, Rotary Peace Programs will incorporate a broader range of activities that the name change is designed to stimulate and encourage.

Rotarians around the world are accepting this new emphasis with enthusiasm. Rotarians in Nigeria, for example, sponsored an international workshop that led to the introduction of peace studies in schools. Brazilian Rotarians published a book containing message of peace from the country's most distinguished poets, writers, and painters. An American, Rotarian, also an experienced mediator and arbitrator, travelled to Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland to help Rotarians there renew their efforts for peace.

The achievement of peace may seem elusive, but through Rotary Peace Programs and by their own initiative, Rotarians are making significant progress.

## FUNCTIONAL LITERACY

### **What Rotarians Can Do to Advance Functional Literacy**

Workplace literacy represents only one aspect of the challenge raised by functional literacy. Recognizing this, R.I. President Rajendra K. Saboo has picked up that gauntlet and flung down one of his own. He has urged Rotarians every where to familiarize themselves this year with these crucial issues, so that they can then decide how best to become involved in making a difference. If you want to do your part, but don't know where to begin, consider the following:

- 1) Make a personal commitment to learn about functional literacy gaps around the globe, and especially in your own country, region, or work-place.
- 2) Investigate needs and resources by looking into programs run or sponsored by: government agencies; schools, community colleges, universities, and trade schools; religious groups; non-profit organizations; libraries; business groups; and consultants.
- 3) Decide how you will participate — for example, as an advocate, volunteer administrator or tutor, or fundraiser.
- 4) Follow through on your decision by getting involved in helping meet the challenge of functional literacy.

### **Need for survey**

Before developing a functional literacy project in your community, we must first find out where the need is the greatest for improving literacy skills and training. Will it be in the workplace? Helping single mothers through adult education classes? The possibilities are endless... and our Rotary club needs to find out how and where to get involved. While considering the needs within our community, take into account that the skills to read and write are possibly the most important means for a person to obtain their life goals.

### **Possible projects to consider:**

- 1) Workplace literacy training has become popular in many areas. Does this occur in our area? If so, what are the circumstances?
- 2) Do our local businesses employ immigrants, refugees or other minority populations which would benefit from second language training?
- 3) Single mothers are often unable to finish their education. Could our club assist with child-care and/or with scholarships for single mothers to return to school part-time? Establish criteria to select the mothers for whom to provide assistance.
- 4) Meet with local charity groups to determine what steps are needed to reach and teach reading skills to a targeted underprivileged group in the community. Discuss the implications of tutoring, including assistance with job applications, to help provide skills for future employment opportunities.
- 5) Meet and talk with local school officials, to determine how to reach drop-out students or underachievers with a one-on-one tutoring program.
- 6) Conduct a literacy awareness campaign in local schools, with awards for students who read the most books, and who tutor other students. Sponsor an essay contest for students to write about why they like to read and/or write.
- 7) Invite adult education participants from local schools to a Rotary club meeting, and show support for their continued interest in education and self-improvement. Invite any of the Rotary club members to consider offering job opening in their businesses to those who are completing an adult education degree.
- 8) Encourage "project idea exchanges" with clubs in other parts of the district and the region, perhaps even with other countries.

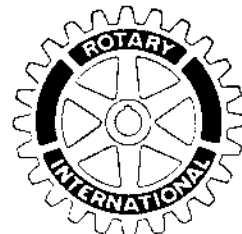

Magic General G H Watkins

General Watkins was introduced by Rtn David Waring. He explained that the General had had a distinguished military career including gaining the OBE and a CB. His cv shew that he should have been a Birthday Boy. His interests include fly fishing, skiing and riding and raoting. Presumably it was because of the latter that he had been chosen to run the Royal Hong Kong Jockey Club.

The General recounted that the first time he had spoken to a Rotary club he had talked about corruption in racing. This time he wanted to talk about Racing in Hong Kong generally and what Racing does for Hong Kong . . . .

The most obvious thing racing provides is money and assistance to charities and the like. The stewards of the Club take a great deal of care to see that the profits from racing go to places where they will make the most help. There have been suggestions that the Club should take over the running of social services from government. That was not the view of the Club since they felt that social services were the clear responsibility of governments whereas they could provide the icing on the cake. Also they didn't just see their roles a giving to existing cases of need but also assisted education, leisure and sports with the aim of preventing future social problems.

The General posed the question of why charities are so important in Hong Kong and suggested that this was because people care, both for people and for Hong Kong.

With all of our problems of the present and future the racing industry was still optimistic and a leader. It was planning for the long term and planning to be here in Hong Kong. The turnover from racing was increasing and the envy of the world, and the racing industry was a source of stability and confidence for Hong Kong.

The Club was also building relations with China. For example they had helped China to set up her first lottery and they had close links with equestrian organisations in China.

Also the Club was a world leader in betting systems and in particular the software associated with it. Their systems were in use in many major countries.

Typical of the way in which the Club and Hong Kong were seen by the world was that the Club had been asked to host the Asian Racing Conference. This was quite a small conference as conferences go but is important in the world of racing. At the last moment Hong Kong had been asked to host and organise this on the basis that Hong Kong could cope and would do a good job. The Club was about to run the latest of its invitational races and there had been 90 entries from overseas which would really bring world class horses to Hong Kong. Indeed such was the response that the Queen's entry was only a reserve. These races would be televised live throughout Asia and were being recorded for the BBC. All of this would undoubtedly enhance the reputation of Hong Kong in the eyes of the world.

The General fished by reminding us that without the income from the betting levy, it was calculated that income tax would have to rise to 26% from the present limit of 15%. However it was not greed but pride Hong Kong had in their racing and it was Hong Kong people that make racing here what it is.

General Watkins was thanked by PP Baker who claimed 3 decades of membership of the Jockey Club and 40 years supporting racing as a punter. He praised the General for his wholehearted support of racing and his personal involvement.

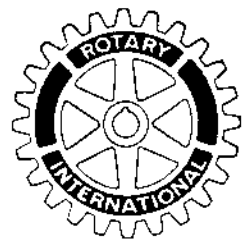

## ROTARY IN CHINA, HONG KONG, MACAU & TAIWAN

Editor Note: In view of the fact that our next District Conference will be held in China it seems appropriate to reprint PDG Peter Hail's article first published in 1987. The second part will appear next week.

As Rotary Information Co-ordinator of District 345 and advisor to the Rotary Information Centre, I have the pleasure in accepting the request of my fellow Rotarians to provide Rotary members with information regarding the Rotary movement, especially in Mainland China during the pre-war days which is little known to even senior Rotarians.

From a lonely man's hunger for friendship, Rotary has become the most influential international service organization to-day. From one club with only four members 83 years ago, Rotary to-day has 23,334 clubs with an estimated 1,046,251 Rotarians in 161 countries and geographical regions.

But Rotary did not become truly international until it extended to Asia in 1919 when clubs were organized in the Philippines, China and India thus attesting to the universality of Rotary by providing that its principles possessed the vitality and appeal to transcend not only national boundaries and languages limitations but also the barrier of race, religion and creed.

Rotary was an alien import when the first club in China was established in 1919 in Shanghai and there was considerable doubt as to whether it would acclimatise itself to the Chinese soil. Other clubs were started in Tientsin in 1923 and in Beijing in 1924, but until 1931 these three remained the only Rotary clubs in all China.

Then Rotary began to develop and the number of clubs was increased to seven by 1932 — the four additional clubs were established in Hong Kong and in the three Manchurian cities of Dairen, Harbin and Mukden. The life of the three clubs in Manchuria was, however, very brief as they were forced to cease functioning following the Japanese occupation in the same year.

Through the efforts of the late Dr. C.T. Wang, (close relative of P.P. Wing Chow of Victoria Rotary Club) eleven new clubs were organized in different parts of China between 1932 and 1935. The 15 clubs which were then in existence in China together with the Rotary Club of Hong Kong and three other Rotary clubs in the Philippines were in 1935 constituted into Rotary District 31 with the late Dr. C.T. Wang elected as its first district governor.

When the Japanese invaded Shanghai in 1937, there were 23 clubs in China, one in Hong Kong and three in the Philippines, having a total of 1,211 Rotarians. They were then divided by Rotary International into three Rotary districts as follows:

District 96 which replaced 81 in October 1937 covered roughly South China, Hong Kong and the Philippines with 11 clubs and 529 members; District 97 for Central China with 11 clubs and 475 members and District 98 for North China with five clubs and 207 members.

In 1938, the Philippine Islands were detached from District 96 of South China, but Macau was included in this district although there was no Rotary club in the Portuguese enclave at that time. In the following four years prior to the outbreak of the Pacific War in December 1941, many of the Rotary clubs in the Chinese cities under the Japanese occupation were still permitted to operate according to the official directories of R.I. For those four years recorded the existence of 25 clubs in 1938 and 26 clubs each 1939, 1940 and 1941. The 26 clubs included those in Chungking, Chengtu, Changsha and Sian which were still free from the Japanese occupation.

The Japanese changed their policy following the outbreak of the Pacific War by closing down all the Rotary clubs in Japan and in all other territories occupied by them.

Chungking, the capital of wartime China, was bombed for successive years, yet the Chungking Rotary club had never stopped functioning. Rotary International records showed that the Chungking club continued to hold weekly meetings as usual; but not always in the same place. When warning of an approaching air raid was received, a new meeting place was selected and word was passed along to its members.

Changsha, another city in free China, was three times the chief target of the Japanese attack. The Club there had to move out from the city on each Japanese onslaught, but still carried on its meetings.
