Last Meeting:

Our last meeting was again another full house event, it was great seeing everyone. Perhaps we all were gathering in unison in honour of our PP Uncle John who passed away peacefully on July 10th 2019. P Gilbert called for a moment in silence and all members stood with their heads down to remember our dear member.

P Gilbert then read PP Uncle John's Presidential Speech from 1986. Here are some key excerpts:

Today is the first day that I address you as your President. I feel rather a little nervous. It's going to be a long and winding road in which we cannot see the end very clearly. However, your VP and the incoming board of directors have been thoroughly trained at the District Assembly and should be able to do a fairly decent job. We are always open to suggestions from any member of this club.

The Theme for the Rotary Year 1985-86 is "You Are The Key." The R.I. President Ed Cadman explained this theme to us. If you look at the emblem it shows a gear and in the center of this gear there is a hole with a slot in the middle. This slot in engineering terms is called the key slot or simply 'key.' President Ed explained to us clearly that without this key the gear wheel simply cannot turn. Thus, symbolically he has chosen the key as the symbol for the current Rotary year.

- You are the key that can turn the wheel.
- You are the key that can make things happen.

If you are the key and only that key can open a door to save a life, would you ignore that plea? I dare say you couldn't. Therefore, I believe that our worst enemy is "INDIFFERENCE". This "don't care" attitude may be our society's and our downfall.

To bring this problem closer to home - at our recently held annual ball, out of 76 members in our club only 32 members supported it. Let me ask you, "Is this fair to all concerned?" You know the answer to this question.

THE KEYWORD IS PARTICIPATION. Teamwork will overcome all our obstacles. Every member pulling together. Every member is on the team. Who actually runs this club? Do you think I do? Or your V.P. or P.P's. No, it is you! By your participation in your club affairs you can help run your club. You can make your voices heard any time by speaking out to any of your directors or officers of this club or you can speak up during any of your club assemblies which we have planned for you throughout this year. Speaker Notes: WorldVision



Betty Tai is a dedicated resource development manager at WorldVision. She first introduced to us how WorldVision came about. Here is an overview of the views she presented:

WorldVision began with 5 USD. While on a trip to China in 1947, a young American reporter, Dr Bob Pierce, met Tena Hoelkedoer, a female missionary in Xiamen. She arranged for him to talk to some children there. On the last day, she brought with her a poor girl named Baiyu (meaning white jade). After hearing Pierce's words, Baiyu told her father that she wanted to go to school. However, she was scolded, beaten and thrown out of her family.

Pierce wanted to help, so he gave Ms Tena all that he had which was just five dollars. Ms Tena used it to buy food and clothes for Baiyu and send her to school. She asked Pierce to send the same amount each month after returning home so that she could continue to look after Baiyu. That was how the idea of monthly support to children began.

In 1962, Typhoon Wanda hit Hong Kong severely. WorldVision distributed relief supplies in Hong Kong, and later set up its first field office in the territory. With the economic recovery in Hong Kong, World Vision Hong Kong turned itself into a fundraising office in 1982, supporting the relief and development work of World Vision offices worldwide. Today, the people of Hong Kong are sponsoring over 200,000 children living in poverty, helping to fund World Vision Hong Kong's international long-term Area Development Programmes. World Vision Hong Kong also promotes public education, raising public awareness about global issues such as poverty, hunger, health and child rights.

Here is one project WorldVision is working on:

Concept Note: From WorldVision Provision of water for vulnerable Syrians in the Bekaa

Location: Informal Settlements (ISs) of the Bekaa Valley, Lebanon

The eight-year-long conflict erupted in Syria has brought massive destruction and disruption to the country and civilians. There requires a large amount of resources and time to restore. Until this day, because of the conflict, it is still impossible for over 5.9 million Syrian children to return home, with the losses of their loved ones, homes and future remaining uncompensated.

Syrian refugees in Bekaa are susceptible to the high cost of basic needs and most often have little funding to address any need outside of rent and food. Adding to this, Syrian refugees live in overcrowded informal settlements (ISs) on private or public land relying on insecure tenure. Existing Lebanese infrastructure - often old and poorly maintained - is unable to cope with this increased demand; therefore, ISs are rarely connected to existing public water and sanitation networks. As a result, basic water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) needs are not being met: Syrian refugees are still lacking access to basic WASH services and infrastructure.

To address this, since 2013 and with the support of United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), World Vision Lebanon (WVL) has been providing WASH assistance to targeted Syrian refugee populations across Bekaa as part of WVL WASH Emergency intervention in the region. In April 2019, WVL was providing around 50,051 individuals with equitable access to sufficient quantity of safe water for drinking, cooking, personal and domestic hygiene in informal settlements. However, WVL operations teams have assessed one critical gap in the Informal Settlements covered by the emergency WASH programming. The gap was especially noted in North Bekaa, the new area of intervention acquired by WVL in November 2018. In Informal Settlements of North Lebanon, 500 households lack access to water tanks, which is preventing them from benefiting from the water trucking services delivered by WVL.

Proposed intervention:

The contribution will support the on-going effort of WVL in the Bekaa by allowing the provision of water to 500 Syrian refugee families in informal settlements through the purchase and installation of 500 water tanks with a capacity of 1000 liters each. A total of 2,750 Syrian refugee will benefit directly from the installation of the water tanks considering an average of 5.5 individuals per household.

By aligning this intervention with the UNICEF timeline, quality water will be supplied through water trucking services to the targeted 500 households deprived of water tanks for a period of 6 months from July to December 2019. The provision of water will be distributed as follows:

4 rounds per month from July till October 2019 (20-30 liters per person per day) and 2 rounds per month for November and December 2019 (around 15 liters per person per day).
