Highlights of Principal Kenneth's presentation as reported by PE Bernard

道慈佛社 opened the first school in 1967 and is specialized in providing to students who need special education, regardless of their condition. The student-to-teacher ration is low, this allows for enough time to be allocated on each student.

Special Education in Hong Kong started in 1977, before that there was only social welfare. Thus, the setting up of Special Education provision in 1997 was an important milestone for Hong Kong. In 1980, the mandatory education law was passed. Socially speaking, up until today people are receptive to special needs people, in terms of employment opportunities and awareness. But as a principal, Principal Kenneth noticed that people generally will treat the special needs individuals poorly and discriminate against them when they get deeper into the relationship.

Principal Kenneth would therefore like to share with us Rotarians that intellectual disability is still not well accepted in Hong Kong, especially towards those who demonstrate abnormal public behavior. It is important to address the acceptance and treatment of mentally handicapped individuals in the Educational sector of Hong Kong.

There are two causes of mentally handicap conditions: by birth and by trauma. Mentally handicap by birth is mostly caused by abnormal chromosomes, and by trauma is mostly caused by injury or trauma.

Gartner had introduced a series of evaluation procedures to evaluate intelligence and frames of mind, those who have ID (Intellectual Disability) is most often lop-sided in their abilities. To overcome that, it will be difficult to do so in the classroom, rather normally outdoor activities can help more, this is coined OLE (Other Learning Experiences).

For this year we have two service project activities with the Yeung Yat Lum School, one is bike balancing, the other is adventures training. For bike balancing, 90% of students achieved desired results, which could be considered quite successful. Principal Kenneth is hoping for continued funding from Rotary. In the future, Principal Kenneth has plans to teach cycling to younger children. In this pandemic, this activity is even of more significant because the social aspect of the teaching also helps the children in building interpersonal skills.

Photos and Videos taken by President Leo show that parents are very grateful for the donation and the support. In spite of the simple activity (teaching the children to ride bicycle), they realized that kids learn very quickly. It also shows that ID kids also have good structural thinking when given the right tasks.

IPP Gilbert and PP William spearheaded the Adventures Training Activity. Since there are exploration and reflection skills involved, the progress pace is slightly slower, but the acquired skills are more comprehensive, and are very helpful to the children's life skills and general well being.

In summary, Yeung Yat Lum Memorial school is not achievement or award driven, but we can see that Yeung Yat Lum Memorial School is carrying out meaningful and real hands-on work to better the children's lives. We

also are catching up with technology, so ID children can take part in e-Sports and IT competitions against normal children to boost their activity. Besides Rotary sponsorship and support to students, Principal Kenneth also invites us Rotarians to consider supporting parents and teachers. Community Service Project Update: Little Life Warrior Society: Data Prepaid SIM cards Programme



The data sim cards will help the children have good internet access while they are staying in the hospital. With internet access, the children can play games on their devices which will help to cheer them up:)

Research shows: According to a study, "The Impact of an Interactive Computer Game on the Quality of Life of Children Undergoing Chemotherapy":

Children with cancer are not only at risk for adverse events resulting from medical procedures, but their mental and social health may also be severely affected as a result of the disease and its treatment. Despite medical advances and the development of cancer treatments that are increasingly effective on the survival of these patients, patients feel helpless and afraid during the disease process. All these moods and feelings, including physical and mental fatigue after chemotherapy, can greatly affect the quality of life of these patients. Although the importance of education for these patients is well known, several factors limit the ability of nurses to teach patients. However, due to nausea and fatigue, patients cannot focus or pay attention. Based on the findings, computer games seem to be effective as a tool in influencing health-related behavior and improving the quality of life of children undergoing chemotherapy. Therefore, computer games can be used to improve the quality of life of children undergoing chemotherapy.
