Rtn. Jonathan Lamport was then invited by President Norman to introduce today's speaker, Mr. Vincent Ng, to share his talk of private equity to us. Vincent began by thanking our club of letting him to have the talk.

Vincent is a Principal of Atlantic-Pacific Capital, Inc. and has been covering Asia-Pacific markets for APC since January 2007. Previously, Vincent started the Asian operations for the Fund Placement Advisory Group at Deloitte & Touche Corporate Finance responsible for deal sourcing, distribution, and project management in the region Vincent has also worked in the Hong Kong and London offices of Deloitte & Touche and Arthur Andersen where he provided financial advisory services, including due diligence, M&A structuring, and company valuations. He earned his BSc in Economics from Queen Mary College, University of London and a Masters in Accounting and Finance from the London School of Economics. Vincent is a Chartered Accountant in the UK and a CPA, CFA in Hong Kong.

The topic was including Market Overview, what is Private Equity? What is fundraising? Investing in Alternatives and what do investors look for? Trends & Observations etc.

Before Vincent started the talk there was some technical problem on the laptop, so Rtn. Tony Loy quickly asked the first question of "How do you define private equity?"

Vincent then started his talk and the talk was professional and fruitful. By the end of the talk, when President Norman asked any of our members who would like to ask a question on the Q&A section, lots of our member raised their hands and Vincent had answered most of the questions.

Due to time was running out, President Norman allowed PP Paul Chan to ask the last question and President Norman then thanked Mr. Vincent Ng for speaking to us.

environment by energy saving.

President Norman then adjourned the meeting at 2:10 pm after proposing a toast to Rotary International coupled with the Rotary Clubs of E-Club and Hong Kong Island East.

Rotary Potpourri

What is ShelterBox

ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity, and a global Rotary club project, which provides humanitarian aid worldwide in the form of shelter, warmth and dignity for people displaced by natural and other disasters.

An initiative of Rtn. Tom Henderson, a former Royal Navy search and rescue diver, ShelterBox started in 2000 as a project of the Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard, Cornwall. Now one of the largest Rotary Club projects in the world has raised over Pounds 25 million and responded to over 90 major disasters, including Sichuan (Mainland China) earthquake some years ago. It also covers Taiwan due to the destructions caused by the recent typhoon Morakot.

Each ShelterBox contains a 10-person tent, blankets, water purification and cooking equipment. Every box is individually numbered and can be tracked by donors. Each box costs Pounds 490 including the cost of all materials, packing, storage, transport worldwide and distribution to the needy. Best value is achieved by working closely with leading suppliers, all items being obtained at below trade price. Assuming six month's use, this equates to shelter and warmth for less than 30 pence per person per day.

All aid delivery is undertaken by international volunteers ShelterBox Response Team members who have carried out extensive training with ShelterBox. By working with local Rotary clubs in the countries where disasters have occurred, ShelterBox is often able to get aid where it is needed faster than any other organization.
