What Happened Last Week

This is a joint luncheon meeting of our club, Rotary Club Hong Kong Habour and Rotary Club Hong Kong Northeast. President Chris opened today's session with a special welcome to the delegations from the two Rotary Clubs. Rotarian Rudy cordially invited both introduced President Kennedy Tang of Rotary Club of Hong Kong Harbour and IPP Ozer of Rotary Club Hong Kong Northeast to introduce members of their respective delegations, and members of our Club collectively welcomed all the visiting Rotarians and their guests in the usual manner.

President Chris reminded everyone that our Club Assembly would be held on 12th September 2002 between 6:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at the Rotary Information Centre, to be followed by our Board Meeting from 7:30 p.m.. President Chris invited all members of our Club to attend the Club Assembly and our Board Meeting.

Our Sergeant-at-arms PP Tim Lui reported that a handsome amount of HK\$1,000 had been contributed by ten Rotarians to our red box.

PP John Kwok formally introduced our speaker of today, Mr. Farland Chang who is a former Rotary Scholar and Paul Harris Fellow, and previously served as Business News Anchor on CNN, launching CNN's "Asia Business Morning," anchoring "BizAsia," and contributing to CNN's Moneyline. As an award winning journalist, Farland has reported on news from all over Asia and the U.S. He has also reported on and interviewed world leaders such as Bill Clinton. Henry Kissinger and Zhu Rongzhi; celebrities such as Steven Spielberg and Larry

King; movie stars such as Jackie Chan and Sammo Hung. Before CNN, Farland worked as a network correspondent for NBC News. He covered domestic news for NBC Nightly News with Tom Brokaw and MSNBC with Brian Williams.

Farland left CNN to become the founder of a media strategy and video production company called WorldBizWatch. Its aim is to help businesses communicate their message to their target audiences in the most credible manner.

The title of Farland's talk was "The Challenge of What to Say and How to Say it Under Pressure". Mr. Farland Chang started by posing the questions "How many of you enjoy talking to a reporter?" and "How many of you have spoken to the Media and have positive publicity?" and remarked that positive publicity is equivalent to third party endorsement and it amounts to advertising at very low costs through the power of the Media, and that "it is not just what you say, but how you say it" that is important.

Mr. Farland Chang further pointed out that according to a study by UCLA, the audience normally listens only to 7% of the literal words spoken by a speaker and that about 55% of the message is delivered to the audience by body language of the speaker and about 38% by way of vocal quality and sincerity of the speaker. The key to a successful delivery of the message is "to be yourself, and not to be an actor, but to be at your best" and that "the messenger is as important as the message". It is important to make the media one's friend and the media can be one's best friends and one's worst enemies. Mr. Farland Chang also indicated that the Media needs stories and it is important that one matches one message with the Media's hunger for stories. Mr. Farland Chang then proceeded to show his audience a video clip for the promotion of "Jollibee" fast food business from the Philippines. The message from the video clip is that "Jollibee" is doing better in Asia than McDonald's and a few other western brand fast food chains combined and that it beats McDonald's in his own game. Mr. Farland Chang further showed a video case study on the reactions of and speeches delivered by President George W. Bush on and after 11th September 2001 when President George W. Bush was first informed of the disaster that happened at World Trade Centre in New York. Mr. Farland Chang pointed that there is apparently a transition in handling the situation by President George W. Bush from the point when he appeared on television in a pre-recorded message and personalized the story by saying "I am a loving guy, but I have a job to do", to the point where the President was standing at "Ground Zero" at the New York Convention Centre rallying the crowd. Mr. Farland Chang further remarked that it is important to improve the ability to get one's message out to the audience.

In responses to a question posed by PDG Moses as to ways and means to sell Rotary to prospective members, Mr. Farland Chang suggested that the Rotary Clubs should produce a few 30 minutes shows on personal stories of key roles and people who are doing good for

others and are doing extraordinary things in a selfless manner, and make the show interesting.

President Chris then formally thanked Mr. Farland Chang for a most interesting talk and further reminded us that the next week's programme will be official visit by DG Gloria.

Today's session ended with a toast to Rotary Clubs of Hong Kong Harbour and Hong Kong Northeast.


