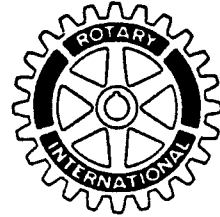

Literacy project upholds Inuit heritage

The Rotary Club of Iqaluit, located in Nunavut, Canada's newest territory, has performed an innovative Community Service project to support the development and retention of Inuktitut, the language of Canada's Inuit population. The 39-member club produced a children's book in English, French, and Inuktitut.

A predominantly Inuit community, Iqaluit is the capital of Nunavut Territory, and Rotarians recognized the need to be consistent with the territory's commitment to maintaining the aboriginal language in schools. The goal of the project was to present an oral tradition of storytelling in written form with a more current context.

Written and illustrated by local teacher Carmen Kyak, the book - "Isigaujaak (Running Shoes)" - relates the adventures of a pair of running shoes that are separated from, and eventually reunited with, their young Inuk owner. The club selected "Isigaujaak" with help from the Baffin Divisional Education Council because of its modern storyline, positive reinforcement of Inuit culture, and the inclusion of syllabics, the Inuktitut system of writing.

Working in a cross-cultural environment, the Iqaluit club has been involved in a wide variety of projects, including elder support, youth and vocational initiatives, and an international project providing computers to schools in rural Peru.

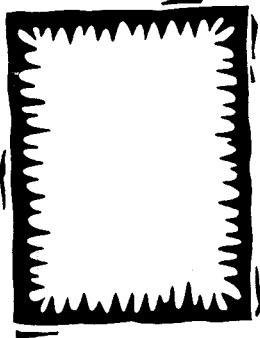

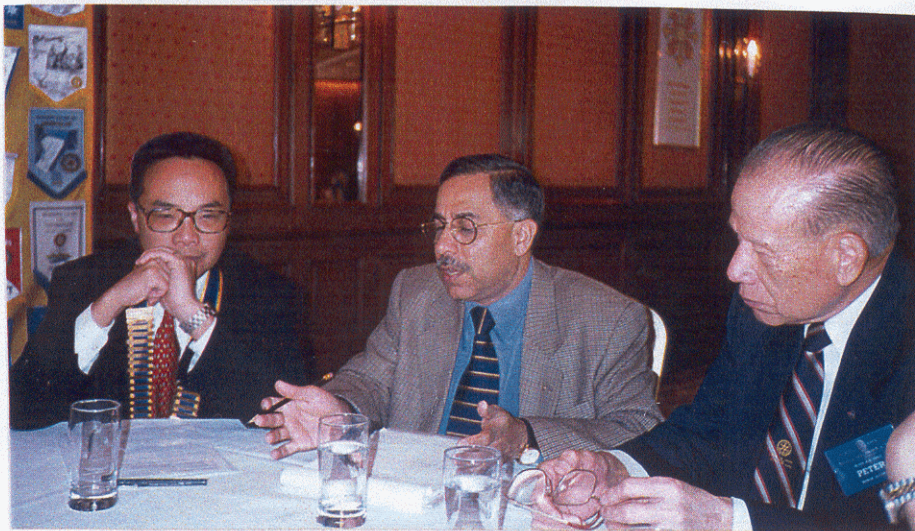
