Sergeant-at-arms Rotarian Lawrence reported that the contribution from various members of our Club and visiting Rotarians totalled a handsome sum of HK\$1,000.

President Chris further requested Sergeant-at-arms Rotarian Lawrence to escort Mr. Andy Wong to the rostrum for the induction of Mr. Andy Wong as a member of our Club. Rotarian Lawrence formally introduce Mr. Andy Wong as a very good friend of his and has been in the travel agency business for quite some time. President Chris welcomed Rotarian Andy Wong to join the family of our Club and reminded Rotarian Andy of the Four Way Tests with a view to promoting fellowship and making the community a better place to live.

Rotarian Andy thanked our Club for accepting him as a member and further indicated that he would need the help of the members to guide him as to what he can do for our Club. Rotarian Andy has chosen "Andy" as his Rotarian name. President Chris helped Rotarian Andy to affix his Rotary lapel pin and presented him with a package on Rotarian information. Sergeant-at-arms Rotarian Lawrence then escorted Rotarian Andy from the rostrum.

President Chris then turned to the highlight of our meeting and requested PP George to introduce our guest speaker Mr. Edmund "ET" Thong who was an accountant and became a professional golfer in the Untied States. PP George further remarked that the said Edmund Thong is also very affectionately called "ET".

Mr. Thong began his speech by asking about the handicaps of members of our Club and remarked that nowadays we can and do retire early and golf gives us an opportunity to travel, and that not only are the rich and the elderly who are playing golf, recently the younger generation is picking up golf and that is why that the game of golf is expanding very quickly.

ET further remarked that most people would pick the longest golf club and swing the hardest. To have a good game of golf, however, one has to manage oneself before one can manage the golf game, and to be an effective golfer, one has to make the golf swing easy, and the simplest way is to make a simple circle with the golf ball being scooped up at the proper place. Since a par 3 is some 200-300 yards and if one is able to get on Green with only a seven iron and a couple of other clubs, the question arises in terms of money management as to why one would need 14 clubs for a game of golf. As long as one can repeat whatever swing one has, one can have a good game of golf - the crux of the matter is "to keep things simple in your mind and do not use brute force". Most people playing golf are not young any more, and if they have the wrong swing, their muscles will hurt.

PP George then requested ET to comment as to whether the rhythm of golf swings would have any effect on the golf game. In response, ET pointed out that the body size and weight of the player are important. If one has a light body weight, then one would not need a "snatchy" swing. Furthermore, one's personality would also affect one's golf game. Mr. Edmund Thong then proceeded to give the members of our Club free lesson and advice on how to improve the golf swing and his demonstration was most certainly very well received.

President Chris then remarked that after the demonstration by ET, a game of golf looks very easy and that he would need to buy only a few golf clubs and would be able to play golf with members of our Rotary Club.

PE Henry then proceeded to formally thank our speaker in his usual humorous manner and the meeting was adjourned with a toast to Rotary International coupled with the Rotary Club of Hong Kong Northeast.

Vocational Service Month

Stepping into the month of October, RI has designated it as Vocational Service Month to encourage Rotarians to put emphasis on their commitment to high ethical standards and to improving the quality of life for those with little formal education through vocational training.

Vocational Service is the 2rd Avenue of Service. No aspect of Rotary is more closely related to each member than a personal commitment to represent one's vocation or occupation to fellow Rotarians and to exemplify the characteristics of high ethical standards and the dignity of work. Programmes of vocational service are those which seek to improve business relations while improving the quality of trades, industries, commerce and the professions. Rotarians understand that each person makes a valuable contribution to a better society through daily activities in a business or profession.

Vocational service is frequently demonstrated by offering young people career guidance, occupational information and assistance in making vocational choices. Some clubs sponsor high school career conferences. Many recognize the dignity of employment by honouring exemplary service of individuals working in their communities. The 4-Way Test and other ethical and laudable business philosophies are often promoted among young people entering the world of work. Vocational talks and discussion of business issues are also typical vocational service programmes at most clubs.

During October, Rotary clubs might consider the following:

- 1. Giving vocational service awards that honour employees or public servants;
- 2. Conducting a contest in which civic and commercial employees are rewarded for courteous service to the community;
- 3. Inviting students to spend a day at the workplaces of Rotarians.
