

Last week's Proceedings -

8th October, 2008

This was the 15th Rotary meeting of the RCHKIE of the year, with President Andy in the chair. Thirteen members and two visitors, including the speaker, were in attendance. After an unmaterialised scare, our speaker eventually arrived at 1:15pm and the meeting promptly started.

Our two visitors were the Ambassadorial Scholar of our Club, Eddie Walneck, and our speaker for the day, another Ambassadorial Scholar Brendon Johnson. There were no birthday boys. Welcome-backs were extended to Rotarians Alex and Kenny.

President Andy announced the good news that Director Eric has received word from out sister club at Osaka Jonan that they will cosponsor again our Community Project in the Playright Project for the Hospitalised Children. 11 October 2008 is the Rotary Flag Day, and our Lingnan Rotaract Club will support this venture with 49 volunteers. They will also cooperate with the HK Federation of Youth to visit 50 elderly people in the Lok Fu Area, and distribute bags to them.

The Acting Serge ant-at-arms, IPP Laurence, with a last minute appeal, collected \$1,300 for the red box, which was earmarked for the coming flag day.

PE Norman introduced the speaker, Mr. Brendon Johnson, who is reading a Master's course in the University of HK in Social Studies.

Brendon started by saying that the world is not perfect, and is full of problems, and illustrated this with magical manoeuvres with a pack of cards. And that we should all reach for the ideal. He presented his talk in 4 areas:

- 1. Who I am. Brendon is from the Philadelphia area of the US. He, apart from being a student, is also a magician, a cellist (musician who plays the cello) and has been a mascot for a few years.
- 2. What I have done. He had spent some time in South Africa, where he witnessed first hand the problems of poverty, HIV/AIDS, crime, murder, rape and income irregularities. He showed pictures of shanty townships and soup kitchens which dished out daily soup to 6,000 school children. He created projects, fun fairs in the US for the awareness to these problems and had 1,000 participants, raising \$30,000 USD in 3 years work.
- 3. Where I am going. He is in HK University reading a Masters course and wants to use the recent developments in China as model. His future path is with the people and on inequalities, hoping to transform communities, inspiring actions and leaving legacies.
- 4. Why I am here. He was in the meeting and contact with Rotarians to learn and compare the cultural values between Asian vs US. To understand the field of change, and he requested us to teach him, shape him, and leave our own legacy.

RI general secretary addresses impact of U.S. financial crisis

De ar Rotarians.

Given the troubling news from Wall Street over the past several weeks, we have received many inquiries about the impact these events will have on Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation. Although our investments have lost value in the short term, we believe they will recover when the financial markets stabilize. In addition, Rotary maintains a diversified portfolio that includes investments outside of the markets that were adversely impacted by recent events. Rotary's investment policies have proven to be sound through past down markets. This prudent management should allow our programs and projects to continue as planned.

Many Rotarians have asked specifically about our investment holdings, insurance coverage, and reserves, so I would like to note the following:

- 1. Both The Rotary Foundation's and RI's investment portfolios have only minor exposure to the companies that were taken over by the U.S. government (Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, and AIG), purchased by other financial institutions (Merrill Lynch and WaMu), or declared Chapter 11 bankruptcy (Lehman).
- 2. Although RI has some insurance coverage placed with AIG, AIG's insurance businesses are safe in that they are separate legal entities closely regulated by both state and federal agencies.
- 3. Both RI and the Foundation have strong cash balances, and year-to-date revenues from sources other than investments are ahead of last year.
- 4. All money in the PolioPlus Fund is invested in U.S. treasuries, the safest securities available.
- 5. Both RI and the Foundation have adequate reserves to operate without having to sell investment securities at a loss.

Last week, The Rotary Foundation Investment Advisory Committee met with Rotary's independent investment consultant and several money managers for its regular investment review.

The committee confirmed that the current investment policies set by the RI Board and Foundation Trustees continue to be appropriate for the long term. The committee advised the Trustees to continue diversifying the portfolio to further mitigate the impact of losses in any particular market.

You can be assured that Rotary's senior leaders, the general secretary, the Financial Services staff, and Rotary's investment consultant are monitoring this situation very closely. We are confident our investment and reserve policies will allow the good work of Rotary to continue around the world.
