What Happened Last Week

PP. Edwin Tao reported that he had returned that morning from a trip to San Francisco.

PP. Joop addressed the gathering on the subject of Membership Development. Total Rotary membership was going down and President King wanted a reversal. Our District Governor wanted every Club in our District to have a net gain of five members by the end of this Rotary year. Apparently, HKI East had started the year with 45 members, and increased to a net gain of 46 by October. HKI East could consider accepting lady members. In his club their 12 lady members did 90% of the work.

PP Hubert announced that his company would be listed on the Stock Exchange on 9^{th} Nov. Any member who wanted to buy shares could see him after the meeting.

The Sgt. At Arms report was given by Sec. Eddy Wong, who reported \$1400 HK for the red box and 24 members present.

Rtn. Heron then introduced the speaker who was D. Turbileg, Head of the Political and Economic Section of the Consulate of Mangolia in Hong Kong. His talk was entitled: "General information about the Beautiful Country of Mangolia with a facus an Business Opportunities".

Outer Mongolia was an independent country of 1.5 m sq kilometers. It is the 18th largest country in world and has the highest average altitude. It was landlocked, being 700 km. from the Yellow Sea. It had four seasons with a harsh winter and hot summer. Its population was 2.4 m. Ghenghis Khan unified the country in a 1206, and in the following 50 yrs it was extended and expanded. In 1227 he divided it into four amongst his sons and grandsons.

After years of internecine dispute, the Manchus occupied the southern part. In 1911, it was declared an independent Mongolian People Republic. Russian influence eliminated ownership and religious freedom. It developed its own language, based on the cyrillic script.

Chartered on 6 April, 1954 by Charter President PDG (Uncle) John Yuen In 1961 it entered the UN and maintained close ties with socialist countries. After the collapse of the Eastern Bloc in 1989, it introduced free elections and a new coalition government was set up. The economy moved from central planning to a market orientation. Mangalia has developed economic relationships with over 160 countries.

Mongolia is already a member state of WTO. The private sector holds 70% of the 60P. It has its own constitution which protects ownership, religious freedom and human rights. It has legal protection of foreign investment.

Mongolia has huge potential mineral reserves. In the first half of this year, 1600 countries invested \$ US440m into the economy in the form of JVs and solely owned enterprises. The country had also signed multinational and bilateral agreements with 32 countries.

HK businesses had invested \$US22 million this year, and altogether had 22 JVs and 11 solely owned businesses. Next year there would be 3 charter flights for businessmen to visit the country.

In response to questions from the floor, he added that despite the Gobi Desert, the country had many beautiful areas and was rich in flora and fauna. It also had rich mineral reserves.

In response to a question from Rtn. Bill Lamport, he said that the population was low because the people worked hard to promote the country. He declined a kind offer from Bill to assist in remedying that situation.

Thanks were given in the traditional manner by PP. Edwin Tao, who reminisced that Senyang was looted by the Russians one week after the dropping of the second atomic bomb on Japan.

Acting President Chris closed the meeting with a Toost to RI coupled with the Rotory Club of Downtown Saginaw, Michigan.

1. What is anthrox?

Anthrax is an acute infectious disease caused by the spore-farming bacterium Bacillus anthracis. It most commonly occurs in mammals such as cottle, sheep, goats, camels and antelopes, but can also occur in humans when they are exposed to infected animals or tissue from infected animals.

2. How common is anthrax and who can get 1??

Anthrox is most common in agricultural regions where it occurs in animals. Humans infected with anthrox usually have been exposed to infected animals or their products through their occupations. Workers who are exposed to dead animals and animal products from other countries where anthrox is more common may become infected with Bacillus anthrocis.

3. How is anthrox transmitted?

Anthrax infection can occur in three forms: cutaneous (skin), inhalation, and gastrointestinal. Spores can live in the soil for years, and humans can become infected with anthrax by handling products from infected animals or by inhaling anthrax spores from contaminated animal products. Eating undercooked meat from infected animals also can spread the disease. It is rare to find infected animals in the United States.

4. What are the symptoms of anthrox?

They vary depending on how the disease was contracted, but symptoms usually occur within seven days.

- Cutaneous: About 95 percent of onthrox infections occur when the bacterium enters a cut or obvosion on the skin, such as when handling contaminated wool, hides, leather or hair products of infected animals. It begins as a raised itchy bump that resembles an insect bite, but soon turns into a painless ulcer, usually one to three centimeters in diameter, usually with a black center in the middle. Lymph glands in the adjacent area may swell. About 20 percent of untreated cases result in death. The employee at NBC who contracted anthrox has cutaneous anthrox.
- Inhalation: Initial symptoms may resemble a common cold, but lead to severe breathing problems and shock after several days. Inhalation anthrox is usually fatal. An employee of a Florida tabloid publishing company contracted inhalation anthrox and died.
- Intestinal: This form of anthrax may follow the consumption of contaminated meat and is characterized by an acute
 inflammation of the intestinal tract. Initial signs include nausea, loss of appetite, vamiting and fever, followed by
 abdominal pain, vamiting blood and severe diarrhea. Between 25 percent and 60 percent of cases are fatal,

5. Where is anthrox usually found?

Anthrax is global. It is more common in developing countries or countries without veterinary public health programs. Certain regions of the world (South and Central America, Southern and Eastern Europe, Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, and the Middle East) report more anthrax in animals than elsewhere.

6. Can anthrox be spread from person to person?

Direct, person-to-person spread of anthrox is extremely unlikely. It is not contagious.

7. Is there a treatment for anthrox?

Doctors can prescribe effective antibiatics. To be effective, treatment should be initiated early. If left untreated, the disease can be fatal.

8. Is there a way to prevent infection?

In countries where anthrax is common and vaccination levels of animal herds are low, humans should avoid contact with livestock and animal products and not eat meat that has not been properly prepared.

Also, on anthrex vaccine has been licensed for use in humans. It is reported to be 93 percent effective.

9. What is the anthrex voccine?

It is manufactured and distributed by BioPort Corp. of Lansing, Michigan. It is a cell-free filtrate vaccine, which means it contains no dead or live bacteria in the preparation. Anthrax vaccines intended for animals should not be used in humans.

10. Who should get vaccinated against enthrox?

The CDCP's advisory committee on immunization practices recommends vaccination for the following:

- People who work directly with the organism in the laboratory
- People who work with imported animal hides or furs in areas where standards are insufficient to prevent exposure to anthrex spores.
- People who handle potentially infected animal products in high-incidence areas. Incidence is low in the United States, but veterinarians who travel to work in other countries where incidence is higher should consider getting vaccinated.)
- Military personnel deployed to areas with high risk for exposure to the organism (as when it is used as a biological warfare weapon).

Pregnant women should be vaccinated only if absolutely necessary.


