Then our Sergeant At Arm William Leung announced the Red Box collection of today being HK\$2,200.

PE Nancy introduced our guest speaker for today being Dr. Miranda Chin who is Artistic Director and Choreographer, and her topic is Innovation and Creativity: "When Tai Chi meets Dance".

Since 1970s, Dr. Miranda Chin has engaged in more than 100 pieces of dance works, serving as dancer, choreographer and coordinator. From 1981 to 1986, she studied Chinese dance and modern dance-the Laban Movement Analysis in Beijing and New York respectively. Her subsequent productions, built upon the uniqueness of Hong Kong culture and known for their originality, smoothly blend the essence of Eastern and Western dances.

Dr. Chin founded the Danceland and the Miranda Chin Dance Company in 1981and 1989 respectively. Her dance works have been staged in London, New York, Canada, Beijing, Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines, Cyprus and Seoul. Chin won the Dancer of the Year Award from the Hong Kong Artists' Guild in 1989. She was listed in the Who's Who of Contemporary Achievement and received the World Lifetime Achievement Award by the American Biographical Institute. She also received the Twentieth Century Award for Achievement from the International Biographical Centre of Cambridge, the United Kingdom.

Dr. Chin obtained her Doctorate degree in Business Administration upon graduation from Newport University of the United States. In 2000, the Beijing Dance Academy appointed her as a senior dance instructor for Hong Kong.

In 2001, Chin was considered a modern dance choreographer of the first generation in Hong Kong by a book entitled Dance History of Hong Kong. In 2003, she is considered an outstanding achievement in dance as well as significant contribution towards the Hong Kong Dance scene by Hong Kong Dance Hall of Fame.

Since 2001, Dr. Chin has created a series of Chinese cultural modern dance of "Martial Arts & Tai Chi". She was a senior Visiting Scholar at the Beijing Sport University in 2004. In 2010, with the support of the Hong Kong Arts Development Council, Chin wrote a book to share with readers the process and experience of her exploration, realization and experimentation during the creation of the dances for Wuji in 2001-2008. Wuji comprises of seven episodes, and each episode makes use of one creative plot around wushu taichi

Miranda gave a detail explanation on the journey she created the dance series integrating Tai Chi and Modern Dance as follows:

The Creation of the Chinese Martial Arts Dance Series

- I. Chinese Martial Arts Dance I
- i) Martial Arts and Dance a traditional interpretation
- ii) Wuji and Tai Chi a modern creation

II. Chinese Martial Arts Dance II

- A combination of magic, martial arts and Tai Chi; variations in attack and defence; shuttling and intersecting; reciprocity between Yin and Yang.

III. Chinese Martial Arts Dance III

- The Tai Chi Chant resonates, moves and envelopes mountains and river

IV. Chinese Martial Arts Dance IV

- The whole piece of dance is a mix of the continuous actions of "Neijiaquan" (a kind of Tai Chi Boxing), the quick and forceful Tai Chi staff and the spiral force of Chen style Tai Chi, all of which interacts wonderfully with the musical movements.

V. Chinese Martial Arts Dance V

- Eight Trigrams of the I Ching Yin Yang and Five Elements Striking the writhe of the "Tao" of Dance

VI. Chinese Martial Arts Dance VI

- The Transitional Changes of the Five Elements as demonstrated in Martial Arts Dance and the Elusiveness of Oi

VII. Chinese Martial Arts Dance VII

- Exploring the Origin of the Chinese Culture of Nourishing Life, Dancing to the Rhythm of Life of the Five Organs

To further extend the integration of Ancient philosophy of Dao Tu Cheng, Tai Chi and Laban Movement, she further created a brand new series relating Tai Chi and Water stated in Dao Tu Cheng presenting with Laban movement. The performance will be featured on Nov 25 and Nov 26 in Sai Wan Ho Cultural Center.

Rtn Dr Tony Loy was then asked to give a vote of thanks to Dr. Miranda Chin.

Finally, Pres. Eric announced that our next week's speaker is PP Grace Yen, the chairperson of the District 'The One' committee and asked everyone to come to listen to her. He then adjourned the meeting by proposing a toast to RI couple with the Rotary Club of St. Ives and the Rotary Club of Hong Kong Island East.

106 Trees Planting Day to Celebrate RI 106th Anniversary

Dear Fellow Members and school partners,

Since the inauguration of President Eric, it was announced that there will be a signature project, Tree Planting Day to be held this year during which DG David Harilela will participate. After a site visit on Oct 23rd, the details of this event are at last confirmed. A total of expected 100 participants will have a chance to adopt a sapling in Dan Shan River natural environmental conservation region in Fanling. Every participant will dig and make ready the soil, touch and plant the sapling intimately by hand, cover the root with soil again, and water them carefully.

After all these hand on experiences, all participants will be able to perceive and realize the difficulty of planting and growing a tree from a sapling and the importance of restoring and preserving green trees in our natural environment. They are expected to learn to care, protect and respect every tree and plant they can come across in their lives, and most importantly spread this message in their schools and community.

120 participants are expected. St. James Settlement will bring 30 "Teens' group primary school pupils who are beneficiaries of Sham Shui Po Pupils After-School Learning and Support Programme". 20 volunteer students from Holy Carpenter Secondary School will also join and 12 parents and students from our school partner, Choi Jun School will also join.

Then we will have lunch together at Lavender Garden (香薰園) in Hok Tau (鶴藪) Fanling which is 20 minutes walk from the tree planting site. The menu is traditional "Poon Choi" (盆菜). I hope all of you will enjoy it. For Rotarians, spouses and friends, it is HK\$150 per person.

It is a great chance to visit the natural environment if you are often busy in cosmopolitan city. Your participation and support to Rotary and trees conservation are important. Deadline is close. Please enroll to me or HS Jonathan asap. Thank you very much.

The following is a wonderful story of Rotary 10 K Race narrated by our Rotaractor runner Stacy Ho, our 2nd generation members:

Our day started bright and early. The race was to start at 7:40am sharp. Our HKIE club registered 5 teams (20 runners) and was awarded for top participation. All of us runners were supported by our cheerleaders who had loud clappers and gave lots of encouragement. When the horn blew, all smiles and all together, we cheered and punched our fists in the air "Yay! We can do it we can do it!" and we started our run.

The trail was very scenic and peaceful. It was also very hilly; imagine an equivalent of a 20-30% incline on a treadmill! That is the gradient we had to run up. I personally had very little training, and so I was very fortunate to have Rotarian Kevin running with me. Rotarian Kevin said he would keep me company and take care of me during the race, so while PP Heman and President Eric ran ahead, Rotarian Kevin stepped back his pace and kept with mines.

Probably about 2.5KM in the race, we were half jogging-half walking, when another runner (in his late 60s early 70s) was running alongside us. And this runner had his hand on his chest, and I turned to him and said (in Cantonese) "Uncle, how are you? Are you okay?"

To which he replied, "I'm great!!!" and increased his speed! He ran ahead of us! It was quite amusing (and motivating) to be overtaken by him.

Around 500 meters afterwards, a whole bunch of us runners slowed our pace, walked talked, and made new friends. Laughing and joking we teased, "Where is the water?? Where is the midpoint?? How much further??"

One man out of the bunch, then changed our attitudes, he rallied, saying "Come on guys! We can do this! We can run! Okay?? Okay let's start! Ready...go!!! Ka yau! Ka yau!" Then he and the rest of the men started to jog, punching their fists in the air.

I looked at Rotarian Kevin, gave him the "Seriously????" look, and Rotarian Kevin nodded. So, we started to jog again, but already were trailing behind. Then suddenly right in front of us, someone tripped and fell face down. Literally PK-ed (sorry for lack of a better term)! Rotarian Kevin and I rushed to the man, turned him over. Lo and behold, this fallen man was the "I'm GREAT!!" Uncle! His face was covered with blood because he had cut his left eyebrow. Thankfully I had a tissue packet and a water bottle on me. So Rotarian Kevin placed tissues on the wound, wet some of the tissues to help the fallen Uncle clean off blood. The men who ran ahead of us, ran back to come help this fallen Uncle. And we called for help. The fallen Uncle was still so cheery, and told us (in Cantonese) "No problem, no problem" whilst he had his hand over 5 pieces of bloody tissue! What a sight!

A policeman also came to help. One of the men said he would stay with the fallen Uncle and urged all 5-6 of us to run ahead and complete the race. Maybe at that point we all wanted to stay behind and sit in the comfortable air-condition ambulance ride back to the starting point, but at the same time we knew that we had to complete the race. So we said our goodbyes and well-wishes and started running again.

At that time, Rotarian Kevin and I were joined with Rotarian Eddy. We were just approaching another hill when Rotarian Eddy said, "Hey let's start running! Come on! We can do it!"

I personally didn't think it was a very good strategy, to burn all our accumulated energy (that we gathered up from our walking strategy) to run up this hill with gradient of 30%! Rotarian Eddy ran ahead... way ahead, and then Rotarian Kevin and I again just shrugged our shoulders, laughed and followed too. Rotarian Eddy ran so much ahead that we didn't see him passed the curve. But again, lo and behold, once we passed the curve, Rotarian Eddy was there walking! I exclaimed, "See!
