- 4. a. Hypothetical experience in lieu of actual experience is no real test.
 - b. People will not complain if they think they understand the form.
 - c. The real ballot differs from the sample in that the position of holes did not appear.
- 5. It is very often true that for something that is obvious to one but may not be so for the others.

Summarised Lessons learnt from the use of Information Technology

- Actual user acceptance
- Common sense design
- Communication
- Error impact
- Prototypes
- Test

Rotary Information

The rules and regulation of Rotary are changing once every three years at the Council on Legislation. There are confusions existing in our club regarding the Club Assembly. In order to have a clear picture of the existing requirement for Club Assembly, PDG Peter had a conversation with the incumbent district governor John Wan which is recorded hereunder for general information:

- Q. How many club assemblies should be held in one Rotary year?
- A. As often as necessary, but one should be held in connection with the Governor's official visit or the Assistant Governor's visit, and after the District Conference. In practice, clubs normally hold 4 to 6 club assemblies each Rotary year.
- Q. What is the assembly for?
- A. Club assemblies are meetings of all club officers, directors and committee chairmen for the purpose of discussing programmes and activities of the Club. All other members can and are urged to attend.
- Q. How should it be carried out, during the regular meeting or better be in a separate venue?
- A. There is no fixed format. Each club can decide what is best for its members. The problem with holding it during the regular meeting is that there may be visitors, but that is not fundamental.
- Q. Who should attend the club assembly?
- A. All club members. See also answer to Question 2.

President Devlyn to attend the Tournament of Roses Parade

RI President Frank J. Devlyn will be among the many Rotarians attending the 112th Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, USA, on 1 January 2001. For more than 20 years, Rotarians have participated in this tradition-rich New Year's festival of flowers, music and sports by entering a float as a major public relations project of U.S. Rotary clubs.

With "Recognizing Tomorrow's Leaders" as it theme, the 2001 Rotary float will celebrate the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), an intensive, all-expenses-paid leadership training program, through which RI has imparted leadership skills to thousands of promising young leaders throughout the world.

Ten recent RYLA participants will ride on the 2001 Rotary float, a 35-foot long, 18-foot wide and 24-foot high deck depicting Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn, two characters in *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, Mark Twain's world-famous novel, on a raft. The float, whose motif fits into "The Fabric of America," the overall theme of the tournament, will be 26th in the long line of parade entries on 1 January. The event will be broadcast live to millions of television viewers across the world.

"The tournament is more than just a parade," said Steve Garrett, chairman of the Rotary Rose Float Committee, in a recent press release. "It's America's New Year celebration, a greeting to the world on the first day of the year, and a salute to the community spirit and love of pageantry that have thrived in pasadena for more than a century."

This year, hundreds of RYLArians, Rotaractors, Interactors and Youth Exchange students are joining thousands of Rotarian volunteers across the United States who for decades have paid their way to Pasadena to decorate the float.

Permanent Fund raised at past RI president's birthday party

Hundreds of Rotarians and friends, representing 84 Rotary districts, celebrated the 75th birthday of Past RI President Cliff Dochterman in San Jose, California, USA, on 10 December.

Organized by the "Red Coat Governors" of Rotary year 1992-93 to raise funds for the President Cliff Dochterman Red Coat Endowment for the Permanent Fund of the Rotary Foundation, the dinner event raised more than US\$65,000 for the endowment fund, which has now reached a total of \$260,000. Greetings and contributions came from Red Coat Governors from all parts of the world.

A special feature of the evening was a video production reviewing the life and activities of Past RI President Dochterman. All who attended the party had a good time, and everyone agreed that it was a "fun way to raise funds!"

Q: What is the difference between men and women?


A: A woman wants one man to satisfy her every need... A man wants every woman to satisfy his one need.
