Rotarians rally to the aid of earthquake victims in India

In the wake of the massive earthquake that struck India's Gujarat State on 26 January, Rotarians from clubs in Gujarat and around the world are responding by delivering medical attention and aid packages to the needy.

The earthquake, which may have claimed at least 30,000 lives, also left 150,00 injured and a million homeless, largely due to poorly or cheaply constructed buildings. The Rotary Club of Raikot Midtown, India, visited the severely damaged town of Morvi, where 600 buildings were reduced to rubble.

"We decided that the most urgent and immediate need was to erect temporary shelters for the homeless," said Vikram Sanghani, President-elect of the Rotary Club of Rajkot Midtown and coordinator of the aid team. Rotarians worked with affected residents to clean up and bulldoze a new refuge area. So far, the campaign has set up 600 tents, with an additional 1,000 scheduled for delivery.

The city of Bhuj, 43 miles northeast of the epicenter, was one of the hardest hit in the area. Hospitals in Bhuj and surrounding communities that were not razed or damaged were filled with casualties, making it necessary to set up temporary medical centers in the field. Rotarians were among the first relief groups to arrive on the scene at Bhuj, when a seven-person team made up of doctors and an environmental consultant from the Rotary Club of Anand Mid Town visited 44 hours after the quake. The team partnered with medics from the local medical college to treat 200 casualties in the first two days. Another team went to the small village of Mokhana, bringing tents, utensils, clothing and food for the 300 families there.

Local Rotarians are also responding to the disaster by pooling their efforts with other non-governmental organizations to help the victims in Gujarat. The Rotary clubs in Ahmedabad have worked with other groups to help set up a camp outside the city where a free kitchen has been organized to feed some 5,000 survivors there. Dr. Shashank Rathod, governor of District 3050, is also helping to coordinate the efforts of a six-member medical team from Malaysia.

Rotarians worldwide are also contributing to the relief efforts in Gujarat. Members of the Rotary Club of Derby, England, are sending 240 Aquabox water purification systems. Each box can purify enough water for a family of four for three months. They plan to send another 1,000 boxes of standard humanitarian aid, including clothing, cooking utensils, candles and torches. The Rotary Club of the North Cotswolds, England, is raising aid funds and plans to send Aquaboxes, clothes, hygiene items and tools. The Rotary Club of Norman, Oklahoma, USA, donated US\$750 to University of Oklahoma's Indian Student Association's earthquake relief fund.

Australia recognizes Past RI president for international service

Past RI President Royce Abbey has been named as an Officer in the General Division of the Order of Australia (AO), in recognition of his contribution towards making the world a better place to live in.

Conferred on the past RI president on Australia Day (26 January), the award is one the several the Australian government bestows on its citizens for outstanding service every January when the nation celebrates its history and diversity.

According to the official citation, Abbey was honored "for service to the community, particularly through The Rotary Foundation's support for health and humanitarian projects in overseas countries, and through programs aimed at providing funding for health care and research facilities."
