VP Stephen also reported on the availability of two CDRom's for HKIE Tung Feng Bulletin Collection (1954-1999) - a treasure well kept by PDG Uncle Peter. Many thanks for work done by PP John, for photocopying and VP Stephen for transcribing it on to CDRom's and the cover design.

Hon Secretary Ates introduced the speaker - Rtn Samual Chung Kai Wai from HK Harbour on the topic of "Intelligent Qi Gung". Rtn Samual was a versatile ex-government staff, now engaging in undergarment business for export.

Rtn Samual gave a personal account for his Qi Gung experience. He has been practicing this art since 1990 for health reason; an art he learnt from his meeting with some friends whom he play Mah Jong with.

Intelligent Qi Gung was said to be more than an exercise for breathing and meditation and particularly good for :

- -blood circulation
- -better digestion and respiration
- -clear mind and relaxation.

Rtn Samual had experienced that beginners may feel the difference in a few months time if they practice a cycle for 7-10 minutes every day.

The basic requirement simple, just a space 3 feet \times 3 feet.

His tips for the beginners is to focus on the simple movements and controlled breathing, and not so much on the exactness of movements, but on Chinese teachings for the internal nerve system.

Rtn Samual studied the exercise for 10 years and even spent one month in Hepei, China to join a big school with a class of 3-4,000 people for practicing of Qi Gung. He said there were at least 26 styles of Qi Gong that were approved by the Chinese Government sponsored by the National Sport Committee.

Rtn Samual suggested that the best time for practicing is early in the morning, before taking of food, or at least one hour after dinning, or at least half an hour before going to bed.

Rtn Samual then demonstrated a simple routine, by standing 4 inches in front of a wall; close the knee and squat up & down gently a few times.

The secret was, by turning the arms inside out and breath relaxed.

- also it might help if you can act as if someone pulls you up by your hair.
- transfer the weight to the middle of the feet.

A vote of thanks was proposed by PE Tajwar by quoting the saying of "Mind Over the Matter".

Pres. Desmond then closed the meeting by proposing a toast to the Rotary Club of Hong Kong Harbour.

Rotarian leads effort to revitalize Heruvian clinic

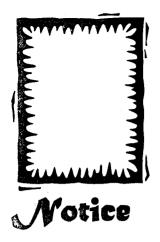
An unused clinic in the highlands city of Huanaco, Peru, is about to get a new life. Oscar DeClercq, a Belgian physician, built it to serve the poor who make up a big chunk of the city's 200,000 residents. But he died seven years ago before it could open.

Declercy's vision has been adopted by Operation Condor, a five-year-old humanitarian project that sends medical professionals from the United States and Europe to Huanuco annually. John Dekeyser, president of the Rotary Club of Wheaton and chairman of Operation Condor, said that an estimated US\$500,000 is required to rehabilitate, expand, and equip the clinic. He was optimistic that the money will be raised by the end of this year.

"It will probably be the largest physical therapy facility in the region," the Rotarian said.

To jumpstart the process of revitalizing the clinic, Dekeyser arranged for three nurses from Huanuco to be trained in the United States. So last October, Elizabeth Martel, Frida Vasquez and Neri Calero started a six-week course at Marianjoy Rehabilitation Hospital in Wheaton. In December, they returned to Huanuco armed with tranning in rehabilitation therapy.

Though their training was basic, the three nurses took home the kind of knowledge that is critical for the recovery of poor patients with no access to hospitals in Huanuco. They will soon be conducting short courses to impart what they learned in Wheaton to other nurses in Huanuco. At some point, specialist doctors will join them at the clinic.

"Do you want a packet of six, eight, or twelve?" asked the chemist.

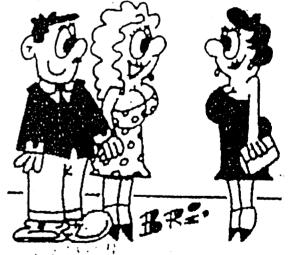
"I only want one," said the guy, "I'm not as young as I used to be. One will do me fine for tonight, thank you very much."
