

# Last Week's Proceedings (6th April, 2005)

Visiting Rotarians: Pres. Elect Eddy Wong, acting as President of our Club on behalf of Pres. Rudy who was otherwise engaged in Mainland China, welcomed visiting Rotarians AG: Ada Cheng of Rotary Club of Wanchai; and PP Peter Tse of Rotary Club of Tsimshatsui East; and our guests Ms. Eileen Ho, (wife of Pres. Rudy Law, who has been away from Hong Kong in Singapore of five months and has just returned to Hong Kong); Mr. Charles Lam (guest of Pres. Rudy) and Mr. Brady Sidwell (Rotary International Ambassadorial Scholar 2004-2005).

Celebration of the 51st Birthday of our Club: All PP rose and joined Pres. Elect Eddy Wong and our Birthday Boy PP Tajwar Shadikhan for the cake-cutting ceremony on this joyous occasion for the celebration of the 51st Birthday of our Club and of the birthday of our PP Tajwar Shadikhan.

Announcement: Pres.Elect Eddy Wong announced that:

- (1) our District Assembly will be held on Saturday, 16th April 2005 at Miramar Hotel, Tsimshatsui, Kowloon and invited all incoming directors to attend the District Assembly accordingly; and
- (2) the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the network of computers donated to Zhongshan Primary School (the "School") will be held on 28th April 2005. PP John Kwok proposed that the attendees shall arrive at the School by taking the 8:20 a.m. Ferry to attend the ceremony and thereafter proceed to the golf club for the games of golf. Attendees who may return to Hong Kong after dinner. Those who are interested to play further rounds of golf in Zhuhai may take the Ferry to Zhuhai after dinner and play golf in Zhuhai on the following day; and
- (3) Intercity meeting for RI Past President on behalf of our District will be hosted and organized by our Club and held on 18th May 2005.

Red Box Collection: PDG Uncle Peter reported that the collection of the day was HK\$1,810.00.

Speaker of the day: PP David Li introduced our Speaker Mr. Brady Sidwell, Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship Program 2004-2005. As a recent graduate of Oklahoma State University, Brady is pursuing a Masters degree in Economics at the University of Hong Kong during his Rotary year abroad. In the next few years, he intends to work in the region while improving his putonghua before plans to attend law school in the United States. Brady is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Enid, Oklahoma, in District 5750 led by President Hugh Sage and hosted in District 3450 by the Rotary Club of Mid-Levels under the leadership of President Millie Chun.

Mr. Brady Sidwell introduced himself to the audience through his answers to two questions that he posed, namely: "Where I'm from?" and "How I got here?" and his concluding remarks.

In answer to his first question, Mr. Sidwell indicated that Oklahoma City, Oklahoma has a population of approximately 506,132, which brought to mind the well-known Broadway show of "Oklahoma!" opened at St. James Theatre on Broadway in 1943. The show "Oklahoma!" was performed in every state for an unprecedented 10 and a half years to over 10 million people and received a special Tony Award, and was the first Broadway show to be honoured with a US postage stamp issued in New York and Oklahoma. The State of Oklahoma has a population of 3.5 million and is the 18th largest State in USA and achieved its Statehood in 1907 (being part of the 1803 Louisianna Purchase). Native Americans in Oklahoma are Red Indians from which the State of Oklahoma acquired its name - Red people "Okla-Humma".

In response to his second question, Mr. Sidwell pointed out that he lives in Goltry, Oklahoma with a population of approximately 295 (or, as Mr. Brady Sidwell is presently outside of Goltry, 294). The sponsor club for the Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship Program 2004-2005 of Mr. Sidwell is Enid Rotary Club, which is 88 years old and chartered as the 29th Rotary Club in 1911. There are 40 Clubs in Rotary District 5750 with approximately 2,108 Rotarians. The Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship Program is the largest privately funded international scholarship program in the world for furthering international understanding and friendly relationships among people of different countries, with three types of ambassadorial programs, namely, Academic Year, Multi-Year and Cultural programs. Mr. Sidwell has travelled to various other parts of the world, including Bangkok, Thailand; Nakornnayok, Thailand and Taiwan, before arriving in Hong Kong.

In his concluding remarks, Mr. Sidwell quoted a remark from Sir Winston Churchill: "All thinking men recognize the moral and spiritual value of Rotary... The farther back you can look, the farther forward you are likely to see." Mr. Sidwell further jokingly remarked that the "Lonely Planet" described Oklahoma City as such: "Its fistful of attraction transform the flat, fairly treeless city into a pretty good place to spend a day or two".

Meeting Adjourned: Pres.Elect Eddy Wong adjourned the meeting with a toast to RI coupled with Rotary Clubs of Wanchai and Tsimshatsui East.

#### **District Assembly**

What is a District Assembly and who should attend?

There are 529 Rotary districts worldwide and each district will hold its annual district assembly to train the leaders of the clubs for the coming Rotary year. It will be a whole day session, including the 1st Plenary Session to introduce the incoming RI President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar and his theme - "Service Above Self"; District Plan and Goals; Membership Development and also the Rotary Foundation.

There will be six break-up sessions in groups for the discussion of the following topics:

- 1. Club Presidents & Secretaries
- 2. The Rotary Foundation
- 3. New Generation
- 4. The Rotary Image & Service
- 5. Membership Development & Retention
- 6. Strategic Planning

The most important feature of a district assembly is the voting for a district fund for the ensuing year. Only the incoming presidents are entitled to vote on behalf of their clubs.

The amount of any per capita levy on clubs for a district fund should be decided by the district assembly after the approval of three-fourths of the incoming presidents present.

When a president-elect is excused from attending the district assembly in accordance with the regulations stipulated in the standard Rotary Club Constitution, the appointed representative of the president-elect shall be entitled to vote on behalf of the president-elect.
