President Desmond then welcomed PE Tajwar back from his trip to Indonesia.

#### Announcements:

 VP Stephen gave a report on the recent visit to our sister club, Kowasaki North. (This report can be seen as a separate feature in this issue.) Stephen also informed members that there is a delegation consisting of PDG Uncle Peter, PP John Kwok, Rtn Rudy and family, and VP Stephen going to visit RC of Negata on the coming weekend.

- President Desmond said that the delegation from Makati North left behind gifts for the club members who helped to host them. These he distributed to those members involved. He also notified members that there would be no meeting next week due to the Easter break.
- IPP C.Y. informed members that Rtn Henry Chan's father had recently passed away and a service would be held on 24 April, 8:00 p.m. at the Universal Funeral House, Hung Hom. Members were invited to attend to represent the Club. IPP C.Y. also said that only four members had nominated to attend the PP Dinner on 29 April. More support would be appreciated. Finally, as acting Sergeant, C.Y. reported that there were 19 members present and \$760 had been collected.

The only problem this week was that there was no guest speaker available. The problem was solved by Rtn Malcolm who managed an impromptu discourse on the meaning Rotary has for various members and the part secretaries can play in supporting their boss' involvement.

Malcolm asked several members why they come to their Rotary meetings:

IPP C.Y. was very honest in admitting that if he missed the meeting he would have PP John on his back, and it was less traumatic to attend regularly. Edmund Tao advised that he has been a member since 1954, and after 46 years, it is just part of life to come to his meeting every week. Rtn Manolo opined that it is an important part of his weekly routine. He feels that the membership is like a brotherhood, and that his club is just like a family that he likes to see regularly.

Malcolm read out the four rules to the Rotary Four Way Test. He said that the secretaries should be aware of these rules and might try to ensure that their bosses do not inadvertently breach these.

To involve the secretaries further, Malcolm asked a number of members how they thought their secretaries might be able to assist them to be good Rotarians. PE Tajwar said that his wife would not allow him to have a secretary (We can only speculate on this.) but he thought that they might be able to ensure that the meeting time on Wednesdays was kept free of appointments.

President Desmond admitted that his secretary Ida was his brain because he is absent-minded. She ensures that he fulfils his obligations on time. Rtn Rudy said that his secretary has been invaluable in actually organizing many of the duties that he took on, like the export licence for the relief equipment sent to Turkey. PP John Luk advised that his secretary reminds him to return phone calls; and she was a big help to him during the busy period of his Presidency.

In concluding this session, President Desmond said that his view on being a Rotarian was that it contributed to something worthwhile for the community, rather than to the commercial interests of each member.

He then closed the meeting by proposing a toast to the Rotary Club of Hong Kong North East.

## Report for Niigata Rotary Club Visit

The Rotary Club of Hong Kong Island East had a team of four to attend the Niigata's  $60^{th}$  anniversary between April 22 - 26, 2000.

The HK delegation was led by PDG Peter Hall, and assisted by VP Stephen Liu, PP John Kwok, and Rtn Rudy Law (together with Rotarianne Eileen and her daughter Jacqueline). The delegation stayed in the famous Italia-Ken Hotel, same venue for the anniversary event.

Day One

The delegation was warmly received by IPP Tateo Koyama of Niigata R.C. and their international liason officer - Ms Michiko Okura at the Narita airport. It took 2.5 hours of express train and Shinkansen to get to Niigata. President Jun-Ichiro Ogi and a group of Rotarians of Niigata R.C. (Rtn Fukuchi, Kobayashi and Kato) welcomed the HK delegation at a Japanese restaurant. Some of them visited HK before (e.g. Rtn Yoshiro Yokoyama, their famous flutist) in the Island East Annual Dinner in 1998. The delegation had a wonderful time and also the first taste of the famous Niigata rice and saki.

Day Two

Niigata R.C. organised a sight seeing tour for the HK delegation and their visiting Rotarians from Khabarovsk R.C. from Russia (close to Haiben of China). The group visited a historical manor house / Japanese gardens of the late Itoh Bunkichi VII, (who happened to be a charter member of Niigata R.C. and then District Governor) one of the 1880's wealthiest land owners in Japan. The group was greeted by Itoh Bunkichi VIII (the son who spoke many languages and traveled widely) and had a special viewing of private rooms and Triangular House, not normally open to public. Then the group had a taste of Zen at a Buddhist temple down the slope of a snowy mountain, surrounding by towering Pine trees and a rapid stream. There were still some relic of the snow piling in the courtyards. PP John and VP Stephen had a blessing by a monk's rod (kyosaku) on their right shoulders after they sat for a 3-minute meditation facing the wall. There was finally a visit to the Niigata botanical garden to see their plants in the green house, and many colors of their city flower - Tulip, before passing by the bay of Japan Sea. An international welcoming dinner was held in the Japanese hotel / restaurant owned by IPP Koyama.

Day Three

There was a golf competition at the Niitsu golf club. The weather was fine and cherry blossoms still blooming, and 17 of us finished the first 9-holes before lunch. The second 9-holes were completed by 3:30pm and the HK delegation had a chance of a hot bath in the pool before heading to Kinsu Hotel for an award presentation. PDG Uncle Peter finished five overall (due to his consistency in most golf tournaments) and PP John scored the nearest to the pin at Hole 3. All members of HK delegation got a souvenir after all. Day Four







It was a wonderful trip to our sister club and we all enjoyed very much of it.


