

Last week's Proceedings -

10th June, 2009

Bill Lamport's son Jonathan Lamport and Jonathan's friend Henry Cheung, together with our two Rotaractors from the Lingnan University, Karen Lai and Kathy Ng. They all received big rounds of applause from our attending 15 members.

Our President Andy then made the following announcements:

Then the highlight of the day was our Club's First Lady, Angela to speak to us on her recent project "Equal Pay, Equal Value". Angela, apart from her capacity as the wife of our President Andy, was a former project consultant for EOC (Equal Opportunity Commission) for this project and has over 10 years working experience in the Human Resources field with the HK Airport Authority. Her speech is summarized as follows:-

Equal pay between men and women

The Hong Kong SAR government has obligations under a number of international human rights covenants to prevent sex discrimination in pay. Equal pay is enshrined under the Sex Discrimination Ordinance (SDO). Section 11 of the SDO states that "it is unlawful for a person, in relation to employment by him at an establishment in Hong Kong, to discriminate against a woman.... in the terms on which he offers her that employment....".

The concept of equal pay

Sex discrimination in pay includes not only a situation in which a woman is paid less than a man doing precisely the same job (EPEW - equal pay for equal work), but also a situation in which a woman is paid less than a man performing a different job that is comparable in terms of the contents of the job and the demand on workers (EPEV - equal pay for work of equal value). The concept of equal pay applies equally to men and women.

Measuring job values

Work that are different can be assessed to be equal by comparing job contents and the demands on workers such as skills, efforts, responsibilities and working conditions. It is the responsibility of the employer to establish job values using analytical job evaluation or non-analytical methods that are objective and free of sex bias.

Determination of individual pay

Pay is affected by many factors. It is necessary for organizations to differentiate individual pay in order to attract, retain and motivate individuals. However, employers should not be influenced by gender stereotypes and the sex of the job holders when making pay decisions. Individual pay may be differentiated by objective factors that are free of sex bias such as performance, service length and market situations. Equal pay covers all elements of pay, regardless in cash or in kind, which the worker receives directly or indirectly in respect of employment.

A set of publications has been developed to help the public to understand the concept of equal pay and to help employers as practical guide lines. These are available at the Equal Opportunities Commission's website at www.eoc.org.hk.

The sharing of the project experience from our First Lady Angela aroused a few rounds of enthusiastic and interesting questions and

answers from the floor and we all gave a big round of applause to her after IPP Laurence thanked her again on behalf of our Club for her clear elaboration of such a controversial topic in a concise and informative manner.

President Andy then closed the meeting at 2:09 pm after proposing a toast to RI coupled with the RC of Hong Kong Island East.


Morale of the Story:
