After our delicious lunch, PE Andy formally introduced our guest speaker Ms. Wu Wing Yee. She is an enthusiastic, sweet, charming lady dedicated to Youth Services. She currently works at the Salvation Army under the Social Service Department serving the Chai Wan Integrated Services Centre for Youth. She has been awarded the 12th Outstanding Social Worker in the Junior Section. One of her most outstanding achievements was winning the 2007 Truancy Preventive Program.

Truancy Preventive Program was a program providing for 50 students from F3 who did not attend school. The one month intensive program consisted of inter-personality training, interviewing skills training, team building training and job placement. One of the most effective tools that lead to the success of this program was bringing the students to work at the company. This made them realized that studying is far more relaxing than work as well as the important of responsibility. As a result, 70% of these students attended the school more regularly and have a better performance.

"Angel" Wu dedicated a vary range of services at Chai Wan Centre. Her services covered several areas of Community & Centre Services

- 1. Children & Youth:
 - o provide Volunteer and Leadership Training; such as visiting elderly, low-income family, single parent family ... etc
 - o provide Interest Developmental Classes
 - o provide Supportive Services to school; such as Understanding Adolescent Project and PATHS which enhance adolescent s resilience
- 2. School Social Works:
 - o 3 School Social Workers stationed in each of the school; Two Primary and one Secondary
 - o provide Counseling and Supportive Services
 - handle crises cases and family problems
- 3. Family Services:
 - o provide Parent Education to enhance parent-child relationship
 - o provide Parent Volunteer; 60 peer parent counselors are being trained to provide counseling to those parents in need or sharing their experiences in the workshops or seminars
 - o provide Family Counseling to those families in need
 - ° provide Men & Fatherhood Service
 - Parental Workshop at Disco made them experience the feel and excitement of disco fever as a result having a better understanding of what tee na gers like

 - o regular visits at TV game centre, basketball court shopping arcades to meet at-risk youth
 - o provide Pilot Project such as drug, truancy, crime and girl s self harm prevention program

 - Community Care in Narrative Way Project has been carried out from 2005 -2007
 - Life Bank Project sponsored by Beat Drugs Fund from 2007 2009

Only by getting trust, better communication and understanding from the youth could she get closer to them in order to handle their problem. On top of that, it is also important to let the parent and the youth to learn from games and apply them to their daily life. Last but not the least; she said that it is getting more difficult for them to raise funds for their special project as more and more Service Centers are being their competitors.

Her brilliant work touched our members and after a few rounds of questions and answers, PE Andy delivered a thankful speech to her.
