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

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
President's Message - From the heart

SPOTLIGHT ON - Introduction to Economic Diversity in Germany



Speaker Lisa Büttner is a Rotary Foundation Scholar, so her heart is very much with Rotary and she had contacted us to come and do a talk for our club. We welcomed her and it was well worth it because she gave a fascinating insight into her country of birth, outlining first the key regions across Germany and what they stand for. She talked about the changes since reunification, and what challenges and opportunities this has brought to the country over the years, feeding us some key facts and figures.

Some key points included:

Efficiency: Despite the common cliché that German people are hard workers, statistics on the [average annual hours actually worked per worker](#) show that Germans actually work the least hours of any OECD country!

Beer: German people are the second biggest consumers of beer in the world (after the Czechs), with an average of 107 litres per person per year in 2010 (or 0.30 l per day). There are more than 1,200 breweries producing over 5,000 brands of beer.

Autobahn: The German *Autobahn* is the oldest motorway network in the world (first section completed in 1932), as well as one of the densest (12,000 km for a country of 357,021 km²). It is also the only one in Europe to have no general speed limit.

Recycling: Germans are among the most avid recyclers. According to a BBC survey, Germany had the third highest recycling rate (48% of waste recycled), only just surpassed by its Swiss and Austrian neighbours.

Berlin is of course the biggest city in Germany and probably the most known. This is where the government is but also numerous start ups. Despite being famous for a lot of headquarters of big companies, Berlin is not a productive centre in Germany. It is rather characterized as a creative pool with a lot young and upcoming branches. Berlin attracts numerous tourists as well, of course, not only as the capital but also due to its history. There are several places where one can still see the wall that divided Germany in two countries. Very popular for Chinese tourists is the largest shopping mall in continental Europe is the [KaDeWe](#) (*Kaufhaus des Westens*) in Berlin, with over 60,000 square metres. Over 300 bunkers and hundreds of kilometres of underground tunnels built during the Nazi-era still remain under the modern city of Berlin - although mostly inaccessible due to crumbling and floods from water tables. The biggest train station in Europe opened in Berlin in 2006. According to [World City Millionaire Rankings](#), the Frankfurt urban area has more millionaires per capita than in other city surveyed worldwide. Munich comes second.

Automotive industry: Germany is one of the world's largest car producers – selling 5.9 million cars in 2011. Top-selling car brands like Porsche, Mercedes, Audi and BMW have production centres in southern Germany.

In 2005 Germany produced approximately 35% of the world's wind energy. There are over 20,000 wind turbines off the coast of northern Germany, the largest of which reach 200 metres in height. Germany is a leader in climate and energy policies – it made a decision in 2011 to decommission all nuclear power stations (then producing around 18 percent of electricity consumed) by 2022 and to replace them with renewable energies and new storage for green electricity.

Lisa did also talk about some of the challenges Germany is now facing, including an ageing population and shrinking workforce, as well as how to integrate the millions of migrants who have now arrived in the country. After the talk she answered a number of questions from the interested members and guests present.

About the speaker

Lisa Büttner was a scholar of The Rotary Foundation for her Master Studies. She born in 1987 in Eastern Germany, and grew up on the Baltic Coast. She has a Bachelor degree in Cultural Science, and Master in International Studies. Her work and study experiences include countries such as Portugal, Sweden and Denmark, and she has been working in international relations for non-profit networking organisation BVL International.


The One International award ceremony
