Eulogy

It has never been our intention that we gather together today for this particular purpose. Saying goodbye to someone as dear as Uncle Peter Hall is not an easy task. While we mourn his passing, we do give thanks for all that he has shared with and done for us.

Uncle was a giant of his generation. All of us here are made richer for having had him amongst us. For those who knew him, he will be fondly remembered as a generous and compassionate gentleman, with wit, incisive insight, and wide-ranging interest in the world around him. No problem was too small to be discussed and solved; every person was given his time and consideration. He was truly a teacher in the highest sense of the word.

As a Rotary leader, he was feared and revered. As I travel internationally on Rotary business, Rotarians often asked after "Uncle Peter" and gave their own personal testimonies about the influence he had on their Rotary career. There can be few Rotarians in this region who inspired such affection and esteem, and who had made such profound and lasting contribution on others in so many ways.

Uncle Peter was born on 6 September 1925. He attended Wah Yan College and graduated in 1941 when Hong Kong was going through difficult times. He was grateful for the fine education that he had received and chose to give back to his alma mater whenever he could. He was active in Wah Yan alumni affairs, having served for 8 terms as president of the alumni association. Uncle was active in community service being a Board member of the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals for 1960-61, Po Leung Kuk for 1961-62, and Pok Oi Hospital for 1961-63.

Uncle was in shipping and restaurant business, and had raised a wonderful family. I am sure you all know Anastasia, Teresa, Isabel & Emily and their extended families well. Uncle was a devout Catholic, and maintained regular attendance at mass.

Uncle joined the Rotary Club of Hong Kong Island East on 8 June 1960 and was Club President in 1964-65. He grew with the Club and was pivotal in helping the Club to repeatedly scale new heights. Uncle admitted that he was fortunate to have the opportunity to serve with giants like Uncle John Yuen and the founders of our Club, and the only way he could say "thank you" to them was to better train those Rotarians who came after him.

He had an extremely academic approach to Rotary, insisting that to enjoy Rotary one must acquire a sound knowledge of it. Driven by curiosity and intellect, his pursuit of Rotary knowledge was singleminded to an unusual degree coupled with consummate seriousness and great enthusiasm. Hence, he was crowned the nickname of "encyclopedia" by those who knew him for his knowledge in Rotary practice, procedures and protocol.

At Hong Kong Island East, Uncle made everyone felt welcome and appreciated. Indeed, his generous spirit reached out to Rotarians of all ranks. Uncle's passion for justice, compassion for all things human, and humility in the discharge of his responsibility afford an example to us all. I know that I can speak for every member of our Club that I count it a privilege of my life to have shared Rotary with him. We salute Uncle Peter: thank you for providing us a road map, and for lighting the way.

Uncle went on to serve our District with loyalty and distinction, culminating as Governor in 1981-82. Prior to that, he served for 3 terms as District Secretary of the then District 345 covering Hong Kong, Macao and part of Taiwan. In those days, there was only one District Secretary looking after well over 100 clubs. Taiwanese Rotarians of his vintage were grateful to him for serving as a bridge with Evanston. He had been a tower of strength. That our District was able to survive and thrive was due in no small measure to his sterling effort and inspiration over the years.

He taught us, and he made us wiser and better Rotarians and persons. Though we were initially attracted to Uncle by his leadership and Rotary resourcefulness, our continuing admiration of him derives not only from his intellect but by his character. Uncle's dedication to the causes which he has professed to admire is thoroughly matched by his warmth to his family, friends, and fellow Rotarians. I, for one, have never known a more devoted mentor.

Uncle enjoyed Rotary fellowship and the away trips. Annual Rotary conventions and institutes gave him perfect excuse to visit many places which otherwise would have remained a perpetual distance to all of us. This led to many interesting stories. Examples were the 1990 Manila Zone Institute which coincided with a military coup, and the 1995 Council on Legislation in Caracas, Venezuela when voting delegates had to be escorted by guards with machine guns wherever they went. I had the good fortune of visiting Japan with Uncle on no less than 5 occasions. His knowledge of Japan and its culture enabled all of us to enjoy the trips to the fullest. Uncle was a keen golfer, despite not the biggest hitter. He did not lose too many balls too often either! Afterall, it is the fellowship that counts!

Rotary honors were many: Service Above Self Award by Rotary International in 1996, and the Citation for Meritorious Service in 1983 and Distinguished Service Award in 1994 by the Rotary Foundation, to name but a few, for his outstanding achievement and service.

Uncle has left us Rotarians an enduring legacy. He had lived respected and he dies regretted. We owe it to his memory to continue his work, to build on the foundations that he had laid, to follow the course that he set for us, and to fulfill his vision of a strong future. May he rest in everlasting peace.

"Uncle Peter's funeral was honoured with a Boy Scout's bag-piper, which Uncle Peter truly deserved it as he did a lot for the WYC and their scout movement. I attended the TW Kowloon No. 1 Primary School for 6 years, and all tuition fees were waived because the TW schools were all funded by donors like Uncle Peter. During school days, I went in through the main entrance, and passed through the hallway never knowing that Uncle Peter's photo was up in the wall. Uncle Peter was with the TW board of directors in 1960, and was involved with donations to rebuild the Wen Wu Temple in that year so his name was shown in the door entrance columns the 1960 and his photo was shown in the hall way."

"I still remember my first time I was introduced to Uncle Peter, the walking encyclopedia of Rotary, in the year 1999 and from then onwards have learnt a lot from him about Rotary, inspiring me to join the Rotary family afterwards.

There could hardly be anything left unsaid about this paradigm as a fine gentlemen. My first participation in a HKIE activity was back some 30 years ago in a family outing organized by the Club in the New Territories . I had the fortune that Uncle also joined . It almost defied belief to for me to find this Rotary icon to be such a warm and accessible person. The vivid memory of that function was imprinted on my mind a few days later when I received a card via post , hand-written and signed by Uncle , saying how pleased that he was that I could join and what a wonderful time that we had together.

Some people say a gentleman is one who writes. This nearly lost and forgotten etiquette certainly did not elude Uncle, a true and fine gentleman. It was the first card and not the last that I had received from Uncle; I am still keeping and treasuring each of them."

Tribute to PDG Peter Hall by PP Roger Nicandro

I met Uncle Peter for the first time when Makati North sent a delegation to HongKong in 1980 to reciprocate RCHKIE's visit during the signing of the sisterhood pact between RCHKIE and RCMN, with then President Sam Lam and President Edwin Andrews signing on behalf of their respective clubs.

The first day of our visit, Uncle Peter treated the whole Makati North delegation to a sumptuous lunch in his own restaurant, Pak Lee. His hospitality to our club members was matchless.

While we usually call other Rotarians here and abroad by their Rotary nicknames, I have always called PDG Peter Hall "Uncle Peter" as a sign of respect and affection. I never felt more at home than when in the company of Uncle Peter and the other Rotarians of HKIE. That is why Makati North Rotarians always looked forward to their club visits to HongKong.

I have never met any Rotarian who had more enthusiasm for Rotary than Uncle Peter. And his knowledge of Rotary was beyond compare. He was very familiar with the history, the tenets and the practices of Rotary and had one of the best attendance records of any Rotarian not only in HongKong but also internationally. The appellation given him by his fellow Rotarians, Mr. Rotary, was well-deserved. My first attendance at an RI convention in Las Vegas during my term as President of Makati North way back in 1986 was made more meaningful by the orientation and guidance that Uncle Peter gave to me. He even said he has a standing offer to help if I ever became interested to move up in the Rotary International hierarchy.

Uncle Peter was almost always a part of the visiting delegation from HongKong during our inductions. And he was almost always part of the welcoming group at the airport every time we in Makati North visited HongKong. He was a very enthusiastic golfer and I had the pleasure of playing with him in the Philippines and also in HongKong. He would always look for PDG Moses Cheng whenever he sees me in HongKong because he knows that Moses and I were the ones who worked on the sealing of the twin club relationship between HKIE and Makati North. He readily recounts his happy times in Manila such as the time he tasted "bulalo" in a local restaurant called "Bakahan and Manukan."

The last time I saw Uncle Peter was during the HKIE ball in 2014 when I greeted him but he could no longer recognize me because of his ailment. I was heartbroken.

Uncle Peter will live on in the hearts and minds of Rotarians not only in HKIE but also internationally. He was really like a real uncle to me and he will always be an indelible part of my Rotary memories.
