Spotlight On - Casablanca - A true story



The whole world knows Casablanca from film starring Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman. A romantic story of love, set in the city of Casablanca as it was in the crossfire during the 2nd World War. Romy Serfaty, who grew up in Casablanca, began by sharing with us her family history, including some genuine old photos of her ancestors, who can be traced back hundreds of years. Today Casablanca is a modern metropolis, and the financial and economic port of Morocco. Probably it is the least historical city in Morocco. Morocco is at the tip of North Africa and most Moroccon people would make sure you don't get confused between the culture of North Africa and the culture of the Middle East. Morocco in context is a country at the crossroads of two continents and two cultures. It was historically the last country on earth where Jews

and Muslims could co-exist peacefully Sephardic Jews are the Jews expulsed from Europe, chased and exterminated, they took their belongings and left the country. In 1492 at the end of the fifteenth century they were expelled from Spain. Some of them came down to Morocco. They started constituting community while being integrated into the society and the economy of Morocco. How could they do that in Morocco where everywhere else in the world there were addicts forbidding to the Jewish left in Spain? In Spain you had to convert, or leave or be burned. That has been the history and unfortunately up to the twentieth century and the Holocaust in Germany where Jews were persecuted and exterminated. So how come they found peace and cohabitation in a Kingdom of Morocco that was actually Muslim? Morocco is a country that practices a tolerant and inclusive Islam, a very hospitable society who practices Islam like a very sweet and tolerant religion, the only country who tries very hard to keep its identity, to keep away of what is happening from external radical influence in particularly the status of women, they can be anything they want, they are not tied down by law, by regulation. Through fashion, through cuisine, through thinking and through all the cultural aspects, the Jews and Muslim have integrated with each other particularly because the Kings throughout the ages were protecting the Jews, making sure the Jews were not massacred or chased away. They were living in their own section of the city, very near the King's Palace. They became involved in Finance, in trading. Mutual tolerance impregnated every aspect of life to the point that you could not recognize people with the naked eyes. Which is all really extraordinary when you think most synagogues have been destroyed or closed or bombed throughout the second world war in many many places in the world, and you see at the heart of a Muslim country in Casablanca, a world temple was being inaugurated in 2015 presided by the King of Morocco.

Nowadays there are less Jews in Morocco than there are in H.K., only 4,000 left. The Jewish populations integrate well and are very strong where they are. The prosperity of the Jewish presence was in the nineteenth century, with the creation of the State of Israel in 1948, many Jews thought they have their own land and emigrate out of the country. All in all, this was a very educational story, which gave us a very different perspective on a place we know so well from the movies!


Insurance...
