We celebrated the birthday of PP David Li.

President Bonnie Yeung introduced our speaker Mr. Charles Wong.



Charles shared how heritage and archive management evolved from being his subject of study to a personal interest, and ultimately, to his career."

On 16 October 1834, the Palace of Westminster, a medieval royal palace that served as the home of the British Parliament, was largely destroyed by fire. The blaze was caused by negligence during the burning of small wooden tally sticks, which had been used as part of the Exchequer's accounting procedures until 1826.

Archives can exist in various formats. After



records have served their purposes, some may be disposed of, while others may hold historical or reference value and are therefore archived. In 1838, the Public Records Act was enacted by the British government. By 1851, a new library was established to ensure proper archiving of government records.

After graduating with a degree in the History of International Relations, Charles took on the role of Museum Trainee in Hong Kong. His academic background in paleography helped him develop a deeper understanding of the significance of historical written records. During this time, he had the opportunity to contribute to significant projects, such as work related to the Terra-Cotta Army of the ancient Qin Dynasty. Subsequently, he worked with the Hong Kong Government, the Hong Kong Jockey Club, and K11 in the fields of archives, history, and museum management.

The basics of archival management involve physical control, ensuring that objects of archival value are preserved properly. Tools commonly used include acid-free paper, plastic containers, gloves, and pH testers to minimize media damage over time. The Record Life Cycle typically includes documents used for activities and decision-making, such as meeting minutes, photographs, and drafts. Once their useful life has ended, active records become inactive records, which are retained for a period for reference. Subsequently, they are professionally classified to determine if they hold value and should be preserved as historical records. The official definition in the UK is: 'Information created, received, and maintained as evidence and information for transactions and business,' with 'business' referring to activities in a broader scope. The value of such documents is often determined by the decisions made during these activities, and their value may change over time, especially for historical or sentimental reasons, as they provide a direct window into the context of those decisions. Importantly, documents do not need to be old to possess archival value.

Charles proceeded to showcase examples of projects he had participated in. One notable case involved a public utility company in Hong Kong celebrating its 160th anniversary. In addition to showcasing items used by their staff over a century ago, memorandums issued by senior management in the U.K. highlighted how they valued their loyal staff in Hong Kong. The bookkeeping records also revealed how the company managed its operations and incidents, which were found to hold significant value for enhancing the company's public image.

Another transportation company, with a similar heritage and age, focused on improving their storage systems to enhance humidity control, a critical factor in record preservation. In a third case, an NGO with historical artifacts required the repair and conservation of these items to ensure their longevity.

PE Lawrence Lui gave the vote of thanks and announced the red box amount of HK\$780.
